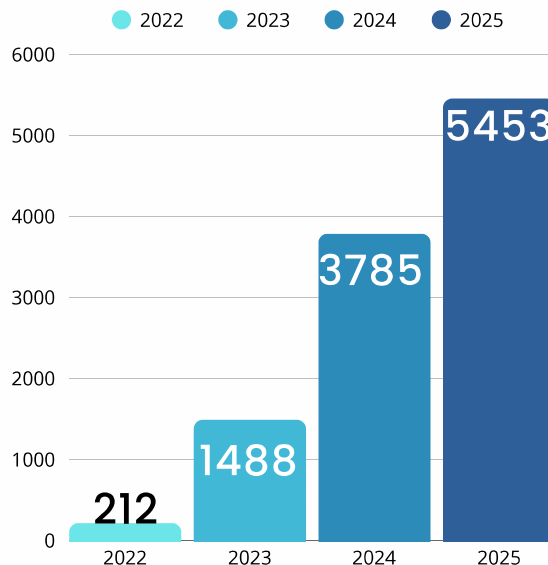

Students across all seven of our campuses took part in 21st Century Community Learning Center Programs throughout both the summer and school year. These programs encouraged students to strengthen their academic performance through tutoring and other academic support services. English Language Arts initiatives—such as La Joya's Booked & Busy Book Club, Sierra Linda's Bulldogs Book Club, and Tolleson's Literary Legends reading improvement club—helped foster a love of reading while also enhancing students' literacy skills.

This year saw an increase in students wanting interactive, in-person gaming activities, such as Dungeons & Dragons. Both La Joya and Tolleson had students start D&D programs at their sites, building lasting friendships, one campaign at a time.



With a strong emphasis on bringing STEM concepts to life, our Gaming from the Ground Up programs, offered in multiple classes throughout the district, teach students how to build and repair computers and gaming consoles. Students then experience the thrill of playing interactive games on the very devices they've created.



Parent engagement continues to be a cornerstone of our programs. All of our sites offered parents a variety of engagement events, from WeGrad at Westview, La Joya, and Sierra Linda, to STEM night at University, the Student Showcase night (complete with Fry Bread!) at West Point, and a delicious TACObout Awesome Family night at Tolleson and University.

Students at University High and Sierra Linda took hands-on learning to the next level by diving into the science of gardening. Throughout the year, they cultivated a variety of vegetables and plants, gaining practical knowledge in biology, environmental science, and sustainability. From seed to harvest, students explored the connections between science and nature while developing teamwork, responsibility, and a deeper appreciation for the environment.
