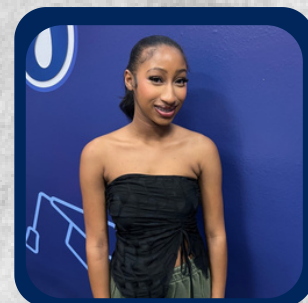
Dream Brooks

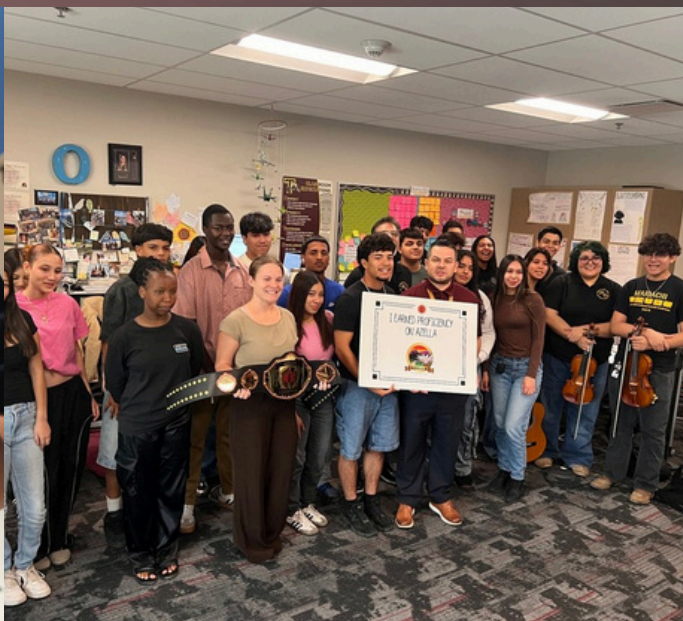
Melany is proud to share that she will be the first person from her family to attend college. She was accepted to Brown University with a full-ride scholarship.

AZELLA or Arizona English Language Learner Assessment is a standards-based test that meets both state and federal requirements to measure a student's English language proficiency. The test acknowledges a student's growth in learning English and in some cases students exit the program because they have mastered the language.

TUHSD BREAKS GROUND ON New Training and Learning Center in Glendale

The Tolleson Union High School District broke ground on its new 90,000-square-foot Training and Learning Center (TLC), to be located along 99th Avenue north of Camelback Road. With DLR Group as the architect, supported by Root Architects, and McCarthy Building Companies, Inc. as the general contractor, the facility will serve as a hub for the district's 780 educators and residents within the District's West Valley community.

The TLC will provide district educators with training and gathering space, while offering families access to community services.

Expected to be completed in June 2027 because of an accelerated construction schedule, the facility will boast multiple large training rooms as well as an outdoor terrace for use in teacher and administrator trainings, community meetings, and large-scale gatherings. In addition, TLC will provide office and administrative space for key district departments, such as Information Technology and Human Resources.

Another exciting addition to the TLC is a Family Resource Center (FRC) that will be installed on the ground floor of the facility. The FRC will be able to offer a variety of services to our families and connect them with partners to help them with whatever they may need, including connecting with social services and outside agencies that can provide assistance.

"We are very excited about adding a new Training and Learning Center in Glendale, Arizona," said Superintendent Jeremy Calles. "This new facility will allow professional development opportunities for our staff so that they can better serve our students in the classroom. Additionally, this facility will provide space for our Distance Learning Academy staff and house several of our departments."



NEW EXCEPTIONAL STUDENT SERVICES BUILDING AT TUHS

Tolleson Union High School recently celebrated the opening of its new **Exceptional Student Services (ESS)** building with a ribbon-cutting ceremony, marking an important investment in spaces designed to support students with diverse learning needs.

After approximately 18 months of planning and construction, the new facility is now open for instruction. Built specifically for ESS students, the space includes sensory areas, therapy rooms, flexible classroom seating, a dedicated pick-up and drop-off area, and updated learning environments tailored to student needs.

District leaders shared that ESS teachers and staff helped shape the design so the building would best serve students and families. One standout feature is the T-Town Cafe, where students can build transitional and life skills through hands-on experiences.

“This building reflects our commitment to providing opportunities and supportive learning spaces for all students,” Principal Martin Perez said during the ceremony. The ribbon-cutting on March 20th brought together district leaders, campus staff, community partners, and students to celebrate the new space. The event highlighted the district’s continued focus on creating inclusive learning environments where every student can thrive.

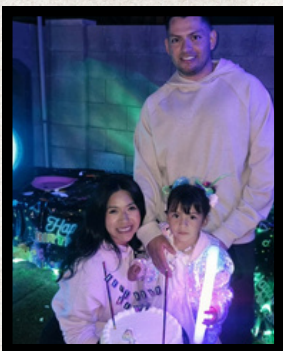
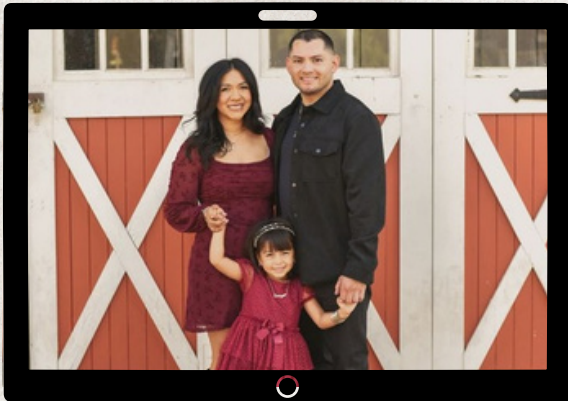
"I've also had the opportunity to partner with community organizations and stakeholders to connect families with valuable resources," Alex said.

Rhonda lives in North Central Phoenix in the Moon Valley neighborhood, near Thunderbird and Central.

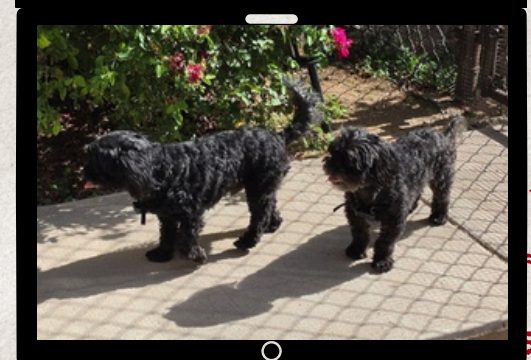
"I have lived in Phoenix since 1993," she said. "Before Phoenix, I lived in New Mexico, South Dakota and North Carolina."

TOLLESON STUDENTS REBUILD BURROWING OWL HABITAT

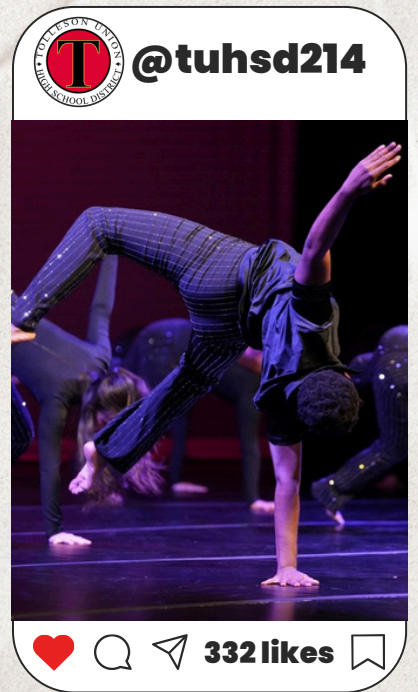

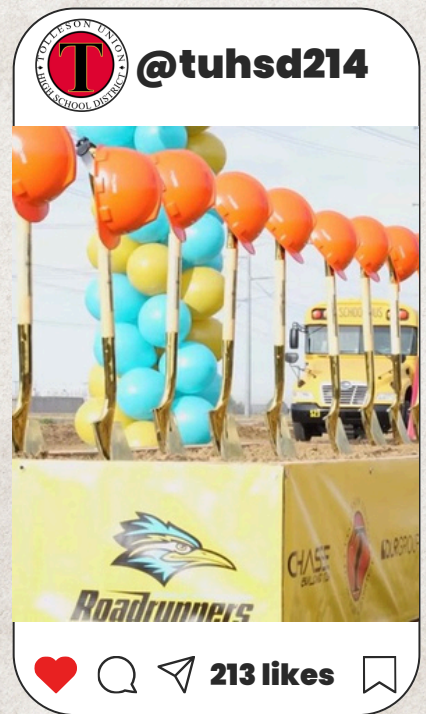

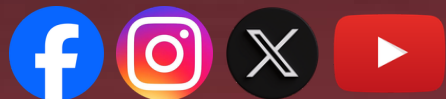
