A Unified Effort of Volunteers

Seven years

of the Angel Tree

For years now, staff at the District Office have fulfilled Angel Tree wishes for our students. This season we teamed up with Geodis, a local e-commerce company, to give even more.

Typically, the district works with our school social workers to provide 20-25 students with gifts for the holidays. The partnership with Geodis nearly doubled our ability to give – 40 students received packages.

Students remain anonymous but provide a list of wants. Volunteers shop from those lists then wrap the presents and deliver them to DO, where they are then distributed to students.

"The Angel Tree was my favorite part of the holiday season," said Lisseth Ramirez, a former member of TUHSD's Human Resources team and current Geodis employee. "I was always first in line to try to get an Angel every year. When I moved over to Geodis, I found that same holiday spirit with my new team."

Lisseth mentioned the project to her manager, who encouraged her to reach out to TUHSD.





What did students want this year? A lot of needs.

"I know one of the top items that we saw this year was socks," said Lena Bradley, an operations manager at Geodis. Clothing gift cards and food requests were also high on the list.

"It's nice to accommodate them with not only their needs but their wants too," said Angela Williams, district receptionist. She added the employees made sure to gift special items, too.

"Of course we want to give people things they need, but it's also exciting to receive something that you just want," Lisseth said. "Maybe you don't need that, but that doesn't mean you shouldn't have that."

We are thankful for everyone who helped make the Angel Tree project a success and we are grateful to our new partnership with Geodis, too!


