


Country Place Leadership Academy

Leadership Focus-Aligning Academics and The 4 Disciplines of Execution. What is up with and the talk about WIGs, PIGs and Mountains? Our staff had the opportunity to work for a day with Franklin Covey Consultant Mike Suto on Aligning our Academic Instruction. The staff learned The 4 Disciplines of Execution Process for enhancing our ability to execute our goals. The process will be practiced by our students and staff this year. Step 1: Identify your Wildly Important Goals or WIGs. Research has shown that by focusing on the Wildly Important (2 or 3 goals) greatly increase our chances of success. Step 2: Identify Lead Measures. Determine and measure what actions you can take that will increase the likelihood of reaching your goal. Step 3: Create a Compelling Scoreboard. Keep a simple and visible scoreboard to track your results. Step 4: Create a Cadence of Accountability. Setup an appointment with an accountability partner to discuss your progress. This process should help our students and staff be more focused and successful in reaching their goals this year and into the future! A PIG is a Pretty Important Goal.





The first part in the process is to focus on the Wildly Important. Research into effectiveness has shown that people can only focus on one to three goals at one time if they want to execute them with excellence. There are two types of goals, Wildly Important (WIG) and Pretty Important (PIG). There is also the Whirlwind, which is all of the things that people need to do in their jobs or lives on a daily basis to make it through their day. What makes a WIG stand out is that without it none of the other goals would matter. For the 1st Quarter, our Lighthouse Team has selected to focus on our school culture and student engagement. On a survey given to our student body, 73% of students strongly agreed or agreed that adults at me school care about me. Our WIG is to increase this percentage to 94% by the end of Quarter 1.



AVONDALE, Ariz. - One day, Principal *Richard Ramos* went into a classroom for a series of questions with some of his students, one student asked if he was like the "other principals who left after one year on the job." It was that day that *Ramos* realized he was at that school to stay.



Exciting news! Quentin boys' basketball team finished in a tie for first place and they are ready for the play-offs!


The American Dream Academy held their informational meetings with our families for 30 parents confirming they will commit to the program.






Collier Elementary



Teaching and Learning

The Math Curriculum Adoption process is underway in Teaching and Learning Services. Members of the Curriculum Action Team (CAT) have started to review the programs submitted by publishers. Review teams are

using rubrics focused on the Arizona Mathematics Standards adopted in December of 2016, which will be fully implemented in the 2018-2019 school year. The publishers supporting the following pilot programs: enVisions, Investigations, Go Math, and My Math will be providing short presentations on their programs to CAT in October and November. Once the CAT makes recommendations on programs, expected in late November early December voting will occur. Littleton employees, parents and community members will have the opportunity to review materials and vote for the program they would recommend for purchase. Technology

This school year, the Technology Department has really been pushing to automate as many systems as possible. We are happy to report that Synergy; the student information system is now pushing data into VersaTrans which cuts down data entry for transportation. On the flip side, VersaTrans is sending data back in to Synergy. This means that front office staff can log into Synergy and see student information that includes bus number, color and pick up and drop off times. These fields are being automatically populated by VersaTrans each night. Thanks to all who worked on this project as it has created efficiencies across the District and helps us deliver better customer service to these types of inquiries.

Currently, we have 4 volunteers from Estrella Mountain Community College putting in a few hours a week trying to get us out from under the 300+ tickets in the system and also helping with needed repairs of the hundreds of computers that need to be assessed and repaired or retired. We also recently had an intern from Estrella Mountain Community College also start with the department. During his time with us, *Mr. Dalton Herring* will spend time working with computer techs, help desk and the network techs to get experience in all areas.

Students in the 1:1 program are now able to get into StudentVue with ease and check their grades and attendance. We can also see that some of our parents are going in often. We are working on a handout for conferences so all can promote these features for our families during conferences. Parents and students now have an easy way to monitor progress which promotes partnerships. Teachers are using the communication area in the gradebook to reach out to families.

Transportation

Emergency bus evacuations were performed at Littleton, Quentin and Fine Arts this week. The rest of the schools are scheduled for the end of this week. Emergency bus evacuations are performed twice a year. We thank the schools for being organized and our students are awesome and eager to learn how to be safe. Our drivers are

Red Ribbon Week led to many creative displays across all grades. Despite the grueling pace of the curriculum, our staff always finds a way to make time for things that matter to children.



In the unit students will work to design experiments to test a strategy for liquefaction mitigation. The grant monies awarded will help ensure that our Estrella Vista students in the 2018-2019 school year will have the opportunity to participate in this problem based learning unit.

Estrella Vista Clubs Updates ~ K-2 Book Club.

Thank you to *Ms. Mallory Moore*, Kindergarten teacher, for offering more after school opportunities to K-2 students by sponsoring a K-2 Book Club. *Ms. Moore* offers the club on Tuesdays to 15 of our K-2nd grade students. Each week, she reads a book and the students complete a STEM activity based on the story.

To kick off the club this year, *Ms. Moore* introduced the students in the club to the idea of problem solving and idea building. She did this by reading books, "What Do You Do With a Problem?" and "What Do You Do With an Idea?" by Kobi Yamada. After reading and discussing problem solving she followed the next week by reading the book "The Best Nest" by P.D. Eastman. Students then used materials like cups, strings, and straws to build their own "best nest." After the nests were built *Ms. Moore* had students create an egg drop experiment outside. This experiment was a great way to introduce early science concepts like force of gravity. Some students added parachutes to their nests and others did not. After the experiment *Ms. Moore* led students in a conversation about the benefits of using a parachute for a softer landing compared to using extra paper to soften the landing.

Our K-2 students are enjoying solving real life problems related to literature and making ideas come to life. Another example of STEM learning was a gate building activity.

The main focus of the K-2 Book Club is to get students excited about reading and realize that books have endless possibilities! So far this club has been a great experience for the students of Estrella Vista and *Ms. Moore* to find ways to connect STEM learning and reading. Thank you *Ms. Mallory Moore* for offering the Book Club with STEM Connections to our students.





Gray and Green shirt responses:


- I thought it was awesome, I wasn't on step this time



TECHNOLOGY

Over Winter Break we were able to install new technology in Collier classrooms. Collier was next on the rotation for a technology upgrade as outlined in the technology plan. This technology includes the replacement of projectors that were on carts, with 70-inch flat screen displays (TVs). The TVs are also equipped with a box that allows the teacher, and even students, to project their laptop screen, wirelessly, onto the TV. This technology supports mobility throughout the classroom leads to a number of additional applications to support collaboration and learning. Another major addition to each room is a voice enhancement system. Four speakers were added in the ceiling of each room. The teacher puts on a microphone so his/her voice is evenly distributed throughout the classroom. This is done so that students have a better chance to hear no matter where they are sitting and it is also great to help our teachers avoid vocal strain. A big thank you to the Operations Department as well as the IT Department for their cooperation in pulling off this major upgrade at a time that would not interrupt instruction. Also thanks to the Collier staff who started using the technology the first day back.

The week of May 11th, Estrella Vista students were very excited to participate in field day events. Activities




