He also refocused the staff on the 4 Disciplines of Execution Process. The first part in the process is to focus on the Wildly Important. Research into effectiveness has shown that people can only focus on one to three goals at one time if they want to execute them with excellence. There are two types of goals, Wildly Important (WIG) and Pretty Important (PIG). There is also the Whirlwind, which is all of the things that people need to do in their jobs or lives on a daily basis to make it through their day. What makes a WIG stand out is that without it none of the other goals would matter.




GOOD NEWS UPDATE

First grade held a parent night that covered daily folders and classroom routines, remind app, expectations for uniforms, school curriculums for ELA and Math and goals for first grade, volunteer forms, and exciting things to happen this school year. It was great to have time to discuss and give a summary of what to expect over the course of the school year. After the presentation, they also had the opportunity to gather resources and were given sheets with strategies to take home that promoted growth in reading, writing, and mathematics.

Something exciting third grade has been working to incorporate is *Open House* night for our students. This opportunity is extremely beneficial for both the students and their families as they get to work alongside each other, dig deeper into their work, and clarify any challenges that may arise. The team looked at a variety of data sources including our AZ Merit scores, our DIBELS








Quentin STEM Academy






Littleton STEM Academy

The program was initiated to support students with their academic progress while at school. All participants were invited to attend a seminar on Monday mornings starting at 7:30 AM. Teacher recommendations were considered when making selections for student participants. During the six-week program, students identified characteristics of fixed and growth mindsets to determine ways to develop their abilities. Student responses and data were collected over the course of the seminar to determine its effectiveness. Students responded positively to the mindset seminar. A seventh grade student reported, "This (seminar) helped me academically. I used to say I couldn't do this because I was too dumb. I came to school with an attitude. I changed from a fixed mindset to a growth mindset. I try harder with work and get a positive outcome." An eighth grade student added, "I have a growth mindset. I was negative about work. My progress has gone up. I treat people better. People have accepted me for who I am. They accept me because I am positive now." A seventh grader summarized his perspective about teachers' mindsets in this way, "Teachers impact our thoughts on school by their attitude toward me. Strict teachers are the most effective. When I give up, they encourage me to do more. Their attitude toward teaching is everything." As responses were generated, students indicated mindsets impact their academic progress.

Due to the success of this seminar, these activities will be replicated at the fifth and sixth grade levels during the third quarter. It was quite an extraordinary experience for all students involved.





Students from our district attended the Stand Up, Speak Up, Save a Life conference at Grand Canyon University. During this conference our students heard from many speakers on topics of bullying, cyberbullying, self-harm and suicide. They learned the importance of putting friend before friendship, meaning even if your friend tells you not to say anything it's important to say something because you value their life more. The students had the chance to work in groups where they identified the issues affecting students currently and ways they could help students on their campuses with these issues. Each group of students will be choosing a project to complete on their individual campuses to help make students aware of the issues. Overall, the conference had a large impact on our students in a positive way to stand up, speak up and save lives. Thank you to *Mr. Antonio Bryant*, Dean of Students and *Ms. Rebekah Smith*, 3rd Grade Teacher, for chaperoning students at this event!








History Comes Alive-In Ms. Penny Nguyen's social studies classroom at Estrella Vista, history comes alive! On this day, students sit in 2 rows of 12, and 1 row of 5, in order to experience what it was like to work in a shirtwaist factory at the turn of the last century. One side, or assembly line, is named the Tri Factory, and the other side is named the Angle Factory. Eventually, the 2 companies merge to become the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory. Students would later learn that the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory of New York was a real place, and how 146 workers died in a tragic fire there on March 25, 1911, leading to new safety regulations for things like sprinklers and easy exits. In order to make the simulation feel as real as possible, *Ms. Penny Nguyen* turns up the classroom air conditioning so workers begin to feel a little sweaty. She plays loud factory noises as students are "producing" their shirtwaist products one step at a time, and then passing it down the line. And, as a typical factory boss or foreman would do, she becomes a little rough on them. She scolds some employees for being too slow, or fires those who don't produce quality work. Many "shirts" not meeting quality standards are rejected and thrown on the floor creating fire hazards. And of course, students are quite aware of the other immigrants (row of 5), standing by, eager to take their place, and work for less pay. At the end of their "shift", students discuss their feelings about their experiences as a factory worker in this time period under these working conditions. Needless to say, most of them weren't too happy working under these conditions for little pay. Students also discuss whether they think the benefits of industrialization outweigh the costs. Through this experiential exercise, many students come to realize the importance of education in the 21st century by experiencing life in the 20th century.





Lastly, we want to congratulate our teacher of the year *Ms. Christine Russell* for her hard work and dedication to the Quentin community.


