

SAN JOAQUIN VALLEY UNIFIED AIR POLLUTION CONTROL DISTRICT CLEAN VEHICLE FUELING INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM FUNDING AGREEMENT

This Agreement, made this <u>23rd</u> day of <u>October</u>, <u>2025</u>, between San Joaquin Valley Unified Air Pollution Control District ("District") and **El Tejon Unified School District** ("Participant").

This Agreement is not effective until all signatures and dates are placed on the signature page.

In consideration of their mutual promises, covenants, conditions, and the funds awarded under this Agreement and in compliance with the Carl Moyer Program Guidelines and the Community Air Protection Incentives Guidelines criteria, this project shall meet all program requirements for the full term of the Agreement, therefore the parties agree as follows:

1. PROGRAM

The purpose of this Agreement is to provide incentives to Participants in the District's Clean Vehicle Fueling Infrastructure Program ("Program"), which will assist the District in attaining federal and state air quality standards. Under this program, the District provides cash incentives to be used towards the purchase and implementation of electric battery charging and hydrogen fueling infrastructure that provide fuel or power for heavy-duty vehicles within the District, a map of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as **Exhibit A**. Participant has agreed to undertake such participation.

2. DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT

Funding under this Agreement shall be utilized by Participant to complete the construction of a new, private use electric battery charging station at the location of 4337 Lebec RD Lebec, CA 93243 as set forth in the Participant's application; attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit B. For the duration of the Agreement, charging infrastructure anticipates to provide annual usage in the amount of 10,000 kW and support an estimated 4 vehicles. For an electric battery charging station, the project will have 4 ports and 4 connectors. Projects with Solar/Wind Power Systems must have at least 50 percent of the energy provided to covered sources be generated from solar or wind. Participant agrees to furnish all labor, materials, equipment, licenses, permits, fees, and other incidentals necessary to perform and complete per schedule, in a professional manner, the project described herein. Participant agrees to comply with prevailing wage laws as set for in Labor Code section 1720 et.seq. In addition, if any



subcontract entered into as a result of this agreement qualifies as a public works contract as defined in California Civil Code section 8038 or Public Contract Code section 1101, Participant agrees to comply with any applicable bond requirements pursuant to California Civil Code section 9550 et.seq. Participant represents that Participant has the expertise, match funding, and resources necessary to adequately perform and complete the project specified in and in accordance with this Agreement and the exhibits incorporated herein.

In the event of any conflict between or among the terms and conditions of this Agreement or the exhibit incorporated herein, such conflict shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order of priority:

- A. The text of this Agreement
- B. **Exhibit C** to this Agreement
- C. **Exhibit B** to this Agreement

3. DESCRIPTION OF ELIGIBLE COSTS

A. Funding under this Agreement shall be utilized by Participant toward the purchase and installation of the new charging/fueling equipment listed in **Exhibit C**; hereinafter the "new equipment". The new equipment must meet all requirements as listed in the program Guidelines.

4. AGREEMENT TERMS

- A. Project Completion Terms:
 - 1. Project Term: Shall be completed within **eighteen (18) months** from the date of this Agreement execution. Participant shall:
 - i. Complete the project in its entirety and in accordance with the scope of work specified in **Exhibit B**.
 - ii. Be responsible for and comply with meeting and obtaining all local, state, and/or federal permitting, licensing, and/or certifying requirements necessary to complete the project in accordance with the implementation schedule identified in **Exhibit B**.
 - Claim for Payment Request for Reimbursement: District shall reimburse Participant after receipt and verification of a properly supported claim for payment. A properly supported financial claim shall include the following:
 - i. Clean Vehicle Fueling Infrastructure Program Claim for Payment Form (CFP), included in the Program's Payment Procedure Packet. The CFP must be completed and signed by the contract signing authority, or a designee.

- ii. Verification that the necessary infrastructure has been installed and connected to the power generation equipment (i.e., solar panels, wind turbine) and/or electricity grid and has been demonstrated fully operational during postinspection.
- iii. Documentation that supports completion of work: Supporting documentation may include, but is not limited to, copies of invoices, checks, and receipts for work completed that are specific to the project as described in **Exhibit B**.

If the Participant cannot meet the Project Completion Terms, the Participant must notify the District in writing with justification explaining why the Project Completion Terms cannot be met. Participant agrees to amend the Agreement as necessary, if requested by the District, to ensure the project is completed in a timely manner. Participant understands that even with written justification; the District does not guarantee an amendment will be made to the Agreement to adjust Project Completion Terms. Participant may be subject to conditions in Paragraph 11 for noncompliance with Project Completion Terms.

B. Project Implementation Phase – Participant shall own, operate, and maintain the new fueling infrastructure according to the terms of this Agreement for not less than ten (10) years. Operation years will be calculated from the date the District inspects and confirms that the new fueling infrastructure is operational. Upon the expiration of ten (10) years of operation, this Agreement shall be terminated.

5. OBLIGATIONS OF DISTRICT

- A. District shall provide **up to \$409,572.00** not to exceed **100%** of the maximum percentage of eligible cost, to Participant to be used toward the purchase and installation of the new equipment listed in **Exhibit C**. In the event that the final total invoice amount is less than the quoted amount, the incentive amount will be reduced accordingly.
- B. Advanced payments shall not be permitted. District shall make payment directly to Participant upon receipt and verification of a properly supported claim for payment request. A properly supported financial claim shall include the following:
 - 1. Clean Vehicle Fueling Infrastructure Program Claim for Payment Form (CFP), included in the Program's Payment Procedure Packet. The CFP must be completed and signed by the contract signing authority, or a designee.
 - 2. Verification that the necessary infrastructure has been installed and connected to the power generation equipment (i.e., solar panels, wind turbine) and/or electricity grid and has been demonstrated fully operational during a post-inspection performed by District staff only after receipt and verification of a properly supported and completed CFP.

- 3. Documentation that supports completion of work: Supporting documentation may include, but is not limited to, copies of invoices, checks, and receipts for work completed that are specific to the project as described in **Exhibit B**.
- 4. Participant shall include an itemized list of all charges and copies of all receipts or invoices necessary to document these charges, such as vendors' invoices, checks, receipts, and the like, to demonstrate that complete payment has been made or invoiced for expenses authorized for the project as defined in this Agreement and as set forth in **Exhibit B**.
- C. Payment will be issued to Participant within **sixty (60) working days** of a completed post-inspection which includes:
 - Verification that the necessary infrastructure and new equipment has been installed and connected to the power generation equipment (i.e., solar panels, wind turbine) and/or electricity grid and has been demonstrated fully operational during post-inspection.


6. OBLIGATIONS OF PARTICIPANT

- A. **Prior** to performing any electrical vehicle infrastructure or equipment installation work funded or authorized under this agreement, Participant must provide the District a completed Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Training Program (EVITP) Certification Form with the EVITP Certification Numbers of each EVITP certified electrician that will install electric vehicle charging infrastructure or equipment, as required in Paragraphs 9(J) and 9(K).
- B. Participant certifies by signature on this Agreement that the Participant will comply with all applicable recordkeeping and reporting requirements of AB 2061 (2022; Pub. Resources Code §25231.5), and any and all related uptime recordkeeping and reporting standards. This section shall remain in effect until January 1, 2035.
- C. Participant agrees that the new equipment purchased through this program will be used at the facility identified in Paragraph 2 to fuel heavy-duty vehicles.
- D. It is the responsibility of the Participant to ensure the new equipment purchased through this Agreement meets all program eligibility requirements. If the Participant purchases a piece of new equipment that is not eligible or does not meet program requirements, the District may deny the disbursement of project incentive funds.
- E. Participant shall submit all final claims no later than **60 days after the new equipment becomes fully operational**. No action will be taken by District on claims submitted beyond the closeout period without written authorization.
- F. The Participant must ensure that the station maintain a 95 percent uptime with 24/7 customer service available on site, via toll free telephone number. Also, if the facility

becomes not functional, Participant reports the status of the fueling infrastructure to the District within fifteen (15) business days and works with the District promptly to ensure infrastructure equipment is operational.

- G. If the fuel/energy meter fails for any reason it must be repaired or replaced as soon as possible and is considered a maintenance expense, therefore not an eligible cost for reimbursement by the District.
- H. For publicly accessible electric battery charging station projects, Participant must report all battery charging station installations to the Department of Energy and Alternative Fuel Data Center located at http://www.afdc.energy.gov/locator/stations.
- I. For hydrogen fueling station projects, Participant must register and report to the Station Online Status System (SOSS) maintained by the California Fuel Cell Partnership (www.h2fcp.org) and abide the requirement of the reporting system.
- J. In the event the Participant does not operate the new equipment for the duration of the Project Implementation Phase as specified in Paragraph 4(B), Participant shall refund to District a pro-rated amount or agree to amend the Agreement if requested by the District.
- K. For projects with Solar/Wind Power Systems, **at least** 50 percent of the energy provided to covered sources by the project must be generated from solar or wind.
- L. The Participant takes sole responsibility for ensuring that the new equipment is in operational condition throughout the Project Implementation Phase. The Participant shall maintain the new equipment according to the manufacturer's specifications for the full term of the Agreement. Tampering or any attempt to modify the new equipment is not allowed. Maintenance or repair costs related to the operation of the new equipment are not eligible for funding.
- M. If necessary, Participant shall obtain through other sources sufficient additional funds to purchase and install the new equipment. In the event Participant cannot obtain sufficient funds to complete the purchase, District reserves the right to terminate this Agreement. In that event, if requested by District, Participant shall return any District funds received.
- N. If the Participant intends to sell or transfer ownership of the facility or the new equipment during the Project Implementation Phase specified in Paragraph 4(B), the District must be notified by the Participant in writing of the intent and the District must approve the sale or transfer of ownership prior to the transaction. In the event Participant sells or transfers ownership of said facility and new equipment during the Project Deployment Phase, Participant shall return, if requested by District, pro-rated funds to the District.

- O. Participant certifies by signature on this Agreement that the Participant has disclosed all other public funds that Participant has applied for or received for the purchase of the new equipment in this Agreement. Participant also agrees to disclose to District the receipt of any public funds after the execution of this Agreement for the purchase and installation of the new equipment. Participant must meet all criteria associated with each funding source used to fund the project.
- P. Participant agrees to maintain compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local air quality rules and regulations for the full term of the Agreement as specified in Paragraph 4(B).
- Q. Participant certifies by signature on this Agreement that the Participant's fleet, engine(s), or equipment/vehicle is in compliance with all applicable federal, State, and local air quality rules at time of Agreement execution.
- R. Participant agrees that funds under this award cannot be used for emissions reductions that are mandated under federal, state, or local law. This refers to specific compliance dates within the mandate, not when the mandate is passed. Voluntary or elective emissions reductions measures shall not be considered to be "mandated," regardless of whether the reductions are included in the state implementation plan of a state.
- S. Participant agrees and represents that the purchase and installation of infrastructure equipment subject to this Agreement is not required by or to be used for compliance with any local, state, federal rule, regulation, settlement agreement, mitigation agreement, memorandum of understanding (MOU), memorandum of agreement (MOA), or other legal mandate currently in effect.
- T. Participant agrees to have the "Funded in part by the Valley Air District" sticker attached to each new charging/fueling dispenser (sticker will be provided and attached by a District inspector during the post-inspection prior to receiving incentive reimbursement. Funding will not be disbursed if the aforementioned sticker is not attached and visible for the post-inspection pictures. See below for a picture of an example 4"x5" sticker:



- U. Participant shall acknowledge the District as a funder and/or administrator on equipment purchased under the project and in all public communications, outreach materials, and media related to the project. This includes, but is not limited to, press releases, promotional materials, social media, posts, reports, and signage.
- V. Participant shall adhere to the District's <u>Messaging, Brand, and Communications</u> <u>Guide</u> when referencing the District in any communications or promotional efforts (located online www.valleyair.org/brand).
- W. At least 24 hours prior to public release, all outreach materials (including but not limited to flyers, press releases, social media, posts, etc.) featuring the District's name, logo, or funding acknowledgement must be submitted to the District at public.education@valleyair.org for recording keeping purposes.
- X. Failure to comply with the aforementioned Obligations of Participant may be deemed a material breach of this agreement.

7. STANDARD OF PERFORMANCE

- A. Participant, its subcontractors and their employees, in the performance of Participant's work under this Agreement shall be responsible for exercising the degree of skill and care required by customarily accepted good professional practices and procedures used in the Participant's field.
- B. Any costs for failure to meet the foregoing standard or to correct otherwise defective work that requires duplicate performance of the work, as directed by District, shall be borne in total by Participant and not District. The failure of a project to achieve the performance goals and objectives stated in this Agreement is not a basis for requesting duplicate performance unless the work conducted by Participant and/or its subcontractors is deemed by District to have failed the foregoing standard of performance.
- C. In the event Participant or its subcontractors fail to perform in accordance with the above standard:
 - 1. Participant will perform again, at its own expense, any task which was not performed to the reasonable satisfaction of District. Any duplicate performance pursuant to this paragraph shall be completed within the time limitations originally set forth for the specific task involved. Participant shall incur any overtime required to meet the deadline for the task at no additional cost to District:
 - 2. District shall provide a new schedule for the duplicate performance of any task pursuant to this paragraph in the event that such performance of a task within the original time limitations is not feasible; and
 - 3. District shall have the option to direct Participant not to repeat the performance

of any task which was not performed to the reasonable satisfaction of District and/or California Air Resources Board (CARB) pursuant to application of (1) and (2) above. In the event District directs Participant not to repeat the performance of a task, District and Participant shall negotiate in good faith to attempt to reach a reasonable settlement for satisfactory work performed. If both parties cannot reach a reasonable settlement, this project may be subject to conditions in Paragraph 11 for noncompliance with Project Completion Terms. No previous payment shall be considered a waiver of District's right to reimbursement.

D. Nothing contained in this section is intended to limit any of the rights or remedies which District may have under law.

8. ANNUAL REPORTING

- A. Participant is required to submit annual reports to the District. Participant shall submit annual reports on the new fueling infrastructure such as:
 - 1. Annual usage (standard cubic feet, therms, kilowatt-hour, etc.):
 - 2. Any unscheduled downtime, including the duration of downtime and causes of downtime;
 - 3. The number of plug-in events;
 - 4. Qualitative description of private uses for chargers or dispensers;
 - 5. The project's viability; include, if completed, any study(ies) and/or reports that document the project's success and contribution to improving air quality, public service(s), and/or its tangible benefit to Environmental Justice communities;
 - 6. Any other information that the District deems pertinent and identifies on the Annual Report Form to be provided to Participant by the District for the duration of the Project Implementation Phase of ten (10) years as specified in Paragraph 4(B).
- B. The first-year annual report is due no later than eighteen (18) months after the project post-inspection and annually thereafter for the full term of the Agreement.
- C. Noncompliance with the annual reporting requirements shall require on-site monitoring by the District and/or CARB and will impact the Participant's ability to receive funding from the District and/or CARB for future projects. In particular, Participants with reports that are more than six (6) months late will not be awarded any additional grant funds from the District until all reports are satisfactorily submitted.

9. GENERAL CONDITIONS

- A. At the date of execution of this Agreement, the Participant has not yet purchased, made payment(s) toward, taken possession of, or installed the new equipment listed in **Exhibit C**.
- B. For the full term of this Agreement, the District, CARB, or their designee(s), shall be allowed to inspect the new equipment and all records relating to the facility and the new equipment.
- C. District and CARB reserve the right to monitor and enforce the terms of this Agreement at any time during the Project Implementation Phase specified in Paragraph 4(B) of the Agreement.
- D. If the Participant is not a public entity, Participant must provide at least 15 percent of a project's Moyer eligible costs from non-public sources. The Participant cannot receive grants and other funds that exceed the total project cost.
- E. The District reserves the right to reduce the incentive amount if it is determined that the actual costs paid by Participant are less than the costs indicated on the application. Additionally, District reserves the right to disallow certain ineligible costs submitted on the claim for payment request and thereby reduce the incentive amount. A determination of cost eligibility will be at the sole discretion of the District.
- F. An itemized invoice for a project must be received by the District before payment shall be made. A project invoice shall include enough detail to ensure only eligible project costs are being reimbursed, yet clear and concise enough to be understandable. The District shall review the itemized invoice and only pay for eligible expenses. The District will not reimburse the Participant for any costs on the invoice which exceed the project incentive amount indicated in this Agreement in Paragraph 5(A). The District will pay the Participant the lower of the contract amount or the final invoice amount of eligible costs.
- G. Payment will be issued to Participant upon the following:
 - 1. All required documents for a complete claim for payment request have been submitted to the District for approval.
 - 2. Verification that the new equipment and facility are eligible and operational.
- H. Any compensation not expended by Participant pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement by the Project Term end date shall automatically revert to District. Only expenditures incurred by Participant in the direct performance of this Agreement within the Project Term as identified in Paragraph 4(A) will be reimbursed by District. Allowable expenditures under this Agreement are specifically established and identified in the Program Guidelines.

- I. All Electric Vehicle (EV) infrastructure and equipment on the customer side of the electrical meter must meet specified labor certification requirements (i.e. installed by contractors with the appropriate license classification as determined by the Contractors State License Board). Specifically:
 - 1. At least one electrician on each crew, at any given time, must hold an Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Training Program (EVITP) certification; and
 - 2. Projects funded or authorized, in whole or in part, by CARB that install a charging port supplying 25 kilowatts (kW) or more, must have at least 25 percent of the total electricians working on the crew for the project, at any given time, hold an Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Training Program (EVITP) certification; and
 - 3. One member of each crew may be both the contractor and an EVITP certified electrician.
- J. The requirements stated in Section I., do not apply to any of the following:
 - 1. Electric vehicle charging infrastructure installed by employees of an electrical corporation or local publicly owned electric utility.
 - 2. Electric vehicle charging infrastructure funded by moneys derived from credits generated from the Low Carbon Fuel Standard Program (Subarticle 7 (commencing with Section 95480) of Article 4 of Subchapter 10 of Chapter 1 of Division 3 of Title 17 of the California Code of Regulations).
 - 3. Single-family home residential electric vehicle chargers that can use an existing 208/240-volt outlet.

10. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

In performance of the work, duties, and obligations assumed by Participant under this Agreement, it is mutually understood and agreed that Participant, including any and all of Participant's subcontractors, officers, agents, and employees, will at all times be acting and performing as an independent contractor and shall act in an independent capacity and not as an officer, agent, servant, employee, joint venture, partner, or associate of District. Furthermore, District shall have no right to control or supervise or direct the manner or method by which Participant shall perform its work and function. However, District shall retain the right to administer this Agreement so as to verify that Participant is performing its obligations in accordance with the terms and conditions thereof. Participant and District shall comply with all applicable provisions of law and the rules and regulations, if any, of governmental authorities having jurisdiction over matters the subject thereof.

Due to its status as an independent contractor, Participant shall have absolutely no right to employment rights and benefits available to District employees. Participant shall be solely liable and responsible for providing to, or on behalf of, itself all legally required employee benefits. In addition, Participant shall be solely responsible and save District harmless from all matters relating to payment of Participant's employees, including compliance with social security, withholding, and all other regulations governing such matters. It is acknowledged that during the Project Term of this Agreement, Participant may be providing services to others, unrelated to District or to this Agreement.

11. REPERCUSSIONS FOR NONPERFORMANCE

- A. The Participant must operate the facility and new equipment purchased through this Agreement according to the terms of the Agreement and cooperate with the District and CARB in implementation, monitoring, enforcement, and other efforts to assure the emission benefits are real, quantifiable, surplus, and enforceable.
- B. Repercussions for noncompliance with the requirements, terms, and conditions set forth in this Agreement shall result in, including but not limited to, the District cancelling the Agreement with Participant and recapturing project funds in proportion to any loss of emissions reductions as agreed to in this Agreement.
- C. District and/or CARB reserve the right to seek any remedies available under the law for noncompliance with Program requirements and nonperformance with the Agreement.
- D. CARB, as an intended third-party beneficiary, reserves the right to enforce the terms of this Agreement at any time during the contract term to ensure emission reductions are obtained.

12. INSURANCE

- A. Without limiting District's right to obtain indemnification from Participant or any third parties, Participant, at its sole expense, shall maintain, in full force and effect, the following insurance policies throughout the term of this Agreement:
 - 1. Commercial general liability insurance with minimum limits of coverage in the amount of five million dollars (\$5,000,000) per occurrence;
 - Commercial automobile liability insurance which covers bodily injury and property damage with a combined single limit with minimum limits of coverage in the amount of five million dollars (\$5,000,000) per occurrence.
 - 3. Workers' compensation insurance for all of its employees who will be engaged in the performance of this Agreement in accordance with California law.

- B. Except for workers' compensation insurance, such insurance policies shall name District, its officers, agents, and employees, individually and collectively, as additional insureds. Such additional insured coverage shall apply as primary insurance and any other insurance, or self-insurance, maintained by District, its officers, agents, and employees, shall be excess only and not contributing with insurance provided under Participant's policies herein. These insurances shall not be canceled or changed without providing District written notice at least thirty (30) days prior to such cancelation or change taking effect.
- C. Prior to the commencement of performing its obligations under this Agreement, Participant shall provide certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements on the foregoing policies, as required herein, to District, stating that such insurance coverages have been obtained and are in full force; that District, its officers, agents, and employees will not be responsible for any premiums on the policy. This insurance shall not be canceled or changed without a minimum of thirty (30) days' advance, written notice given to District.
- D. In the event Participant fails to keep in effect at all times insurance coverage as herein provided, District may, in addition to other remedies it may have, suspend or terminate this Agreement upon the occurrence of such event.

13. FUNDING OUT

The terms of this Agreement and the services to be provided herein are contingent on the approval and receipt of funds by the District from the appropriating government agency. Should sufficient funds not be allocated to District, the services provided may be modified or this Agreement terminated at any time by District by giving Participant 30 days' prior written notice.

14. <u>NON-ASSIGNMENT</u>

Neither party shall assign, transfer, or subcontract this Agreement, nor their rights or duties under this Agreement, without the prior express, written consent of the other party.

15. TERMINATION

- A. **Breach of Agreement**: District may immediately suspend or terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, where in the determination of District there is:
 - 1. An uncured, failure to comply with any term of this Agreement including **Exhibit B** and **Exhibit C** by Participant;
 - 2. An uncured, substantially incorrect or incomplete report or deliverable submitted to District by Participant; or
 - 3. An uncured, improperly performed service and/or improperly completed project.

Prior to the suspension or termination of this Agreement or any part thereof, District, pursuant to this section 15(A), will provide Participant written notice of the condition for which the Agreement will be terminated or suspended ("Cure Notice"). If Participant is unable to cure the condition within thirty (30) days of receipt of the Cure Notice, District may exercise its right to suspend or terminate all or part of the agreement pursuant to this Agreement immediately where, in the determination of District and/or CARB, there has been an illegal use of funds.

In no event shall any payment by District constitute a waiver by District of any breach of this Agreement or any default, which may then exist on the part of Participant. Neither shall such payment impair or prejudice any remedy available to District with respect to the breach or default. District shall have the right to demand of Participant the repayment to District of any funds disbursed to Participant under this Agreement, which, in the judgment of District, were not expended in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. Participant shall promptly refund any such funds upon demand. In addition to immediate suspension or termination, the District has the authority to fine the Participant or seek any other remedies under law, in equity, or otherwise specified in this Agreement.

B. **Without Cause**: The terms of this contract are contingent on the approval of funds by the appropriating governmental agency or agencies. Should funds not be allocated, this contract may be terminated at any time by giving thirty days prior written notice.

16. <u>INDEMNIFICATION</u>

Participant agrees to indemnify, save, hold harmless, and at District's request, defend District, its boards, committees, representatives, officers, agents, and employees from and against any and all costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and litigation costs), damages, liabilities, claims, and losses (whether in agreement, tort, or strict liability, including, but not limited to, personal injury, death, and property damage) occurring or resulting to District which arises from any negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of Participant, its officers, agents, subcontractors, or employees in their performance of this Agreement.

17. RECORD KEEPING

Participant shall retain all Project records and data for activities performed under this Agreement, including financial and service revenue records, progress reports, and payment requests, for a minimum of three (3) years after the final payment has been received or three (3) years after the end of the Project Term or until all state audits are completed for that fiscal year, whichever is later, unless otherwise specified in the funding Agreement.

18. NOTICES

Any and all notices between District and Participant provided for or permitted under this Agreement or by law shall be in writing and shall be deemed duly served when personally delivered to one of the parties, or in lieu of such personal service, when deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to such party.

19. GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action arising out of this Agreement shall only be in Fresno County, California.

20. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

Participant and its subcontractors shall comply will all federal and state laws, statutes, regulations, rules, and guidelines that apply to performance under this Agreement and obtain any and all permits required to its performance under this Agreement and those specified in **Exhibit B**, including California driving eligibility, financial liability, prevailing wage and/or public works laws.

21. TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE

It is understood that for Participant's performance under this Agreement, time is of the essence. The parties reasonably anticipate that Participant will, to the reasonable satisfaction of District, complete all activities provided herein within the time schedule outlined in **Exhibit B**, provided that Participant is not caused unreasonable delay in such performance due to circumstances beyond the Participant's control.

22. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between Participant and District with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all previous negotiations, proposals, commitments, writings, advertisements, publications, and understandings of any nature whatsoever unless expressly included in this Agreement.

23. MODIFICATION

Any matters of this Agreement may be modified from time to time by the written consent of all the parties without in any way affecting the remainder. Determination of whether a change to the Agreement is significant or non-significant will be at the discretion of the District.

- A. **Significant Changes to the Agreement:** Significant changes to this Agreement must be approved by District through a formal amendment. The determination of a significant change is at the sole discretion of the District and/or CARB. Significant changes include, but are not limited to:
 - 1. Change of Participant's legal name;
 - Change of Participant and Sub-Contractor(s);
 - 3. Changes in order to disencumber funds;
 - 4. Changes to the Project that reasonably modify **Exhibit B**;

Participant shall submit a request in writing to District for any significant change. District will notify Participant of the appropriate action within ten (10) business days.

- B. **Non-significant Changes to the Agreement:** Changes that are not significant to the Agreement may not need to be approved through a formal amendment as determined by the District. Request for changes to the Agreement believed to be non-significant shall be submitted by Participant to District in writing. Changes to the Agreement deemed non-significant by District shall be documented in a Letter of Agreement approved by both parties.
- C. **Implementation Schedule:** After the execution of this Agreement, revisions to the schedule of the project as described in **Exhibit B** cannot extend beyond the Project Term end date without a formal amendment. However, the due dates for specific tasks in the **Exhibit B** may be adjusted as necessary to accommodate reasonable and/or unforeseen circumstances that can cause delay in the completion of the tasks. District will work directly with Participant to ensure all adjustments to the Project are reasonable and adequate to complete the Project in a satisfactory manner by the Project Term end date of the Agreement.

24. NO FINANCIAL THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARIES

Notwithstanding anything else stated to the contrary herein, it is understood that Participant's services and activities under this Agreement are being rendered only for the benefit of District, and no other person, firm, corporation, or entity shall be deemed an intended financial third-party beneficiary of this Agreement.

25. AUDIT

The District, CARB or their designee reserves the right to conduct a fiscal audit of the project and/or to inspect the project equipment and associated records during the full term of the Agreement [see Paragraph 4(B)].

26. SEVERABILITY

In the event that one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement shall for any reason be held to be unenforceable in any respect by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect any other provisions of this Agreement, and the Agreement shall then be construed as if such unenforceable provisions are not a part hereof.

27. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between Participant and District with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all previous negotiations, proposals, commitments, writings, advertisements, publications, and understandings of any nature whatsoever unless expressly included in this Agreement.



MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

Kern County Tobacco-Use Prevention Education Tier 2 Consortium Funding Distribution

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is entered into between the Kern County Superintendent of Schools ("KCSOS") and the Kern County Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE) Tier 2 Consortium ("Consortium"), member El Tejon Unified School District that has signed below.

Kern County local educational agencies ("LEAs") have formed the Consortium to apply for TUPE Tier 2 funding from the California Department of Education (CDE). The Consortium consists of 25 school districts serving 78 middle and high schools throughout Kern County, along with KCSOS. KCSOS is the lead agency for the Consortium.

The purpose of this MOU is to distribute Tier 2 TUPE funding received from CDE to Consortium members through KCSOS. Consortium members, in turn, continue to pursue the goal of reducing the number of students in grades six through twelve who begin to use—or continue to use—tobacco, cannabis or vaping products.

KCSOS may be referred to hereinafter as a Party. The school district Consortium member executing this MOU may be referred to hereinafter as either a Party or a District. Together, both may be referred to as Parties or as LEAs.

RECITALS

Proposition 99 (1988) and Proposition 56 (2016), approved by the California voters, taxes tobacco products to fund statewide tobacco, cannabis, and vaping use prevention, intervention and cessation programs. A portion of the tax revenue is earmarked for use by state and local agencies, such as county offices of education and school districts, to participate in this endeavor.

CDE has established the statewide TUPE program, which supports LEA programs that provide students in grades six through twelve with tobacco, cannabis, and vaping use prevention, intervention and cessation specific activities and instruction.

CDE's TUPE grant program relies on county offices of education to provide leadership, administrative oversight, training, and technical assistance to assist school districts within their county. KCSOS is one such county office of education. County offices of education and school districts may form a consortium to apply for and receive TUPE Tier 2 funding.

The Consortium members have each met the required assurances and certifications of TUPE grant applicants. Each member has ongoing programs focused on the prevention, intervention, and cessation of tobacco, cannabis, and vaping use.

KCSOS has received—or is expected to receive—TUPE Tier 2 funding from CDE on behalf of the Consortium and is authorized to release such funding to the Consortium members.

TERMS

Disbursement of TUPE Tier 2 Funding by KCSOS to the Districts: 2025-2026 School Year

Total available funding under this MOU is \$500.00 per participating school site within each District/Consortium member. Consortium member districts and participating school sites are listed on Attachment "A". Attachment A is hereby fully incorporated into this MOU.

KCSOS's obligation to provide each District with its allotment of TUPE funding under this MOU is contingent upon receiving the funding award from CDE.

Signed MOUs and invoices are due to KCSOS by Friday, December 19, 2025. Failure to meet this deadline will result in the loss of \$500.00 per participating school site for districts that do not meet the deadline.

The Parties understand that TUPE funding is being distributed in funding cycles. The first distribution has already occurred. The distribution that is the subject of this MOU is the second distribution.

The Parties understand that if TUPE funding received for CDE is reduced, delayed or terminated, each District's disbursement from KCSOS will be similarly reduced, delayed or terminated.

Duration of the MOU

The effective date of this MOU is July 1, 2025. The MOU expires on June 30, 2026.

Record Keeping and Audits

The District agrees to maintain accurate books and records relative to all its activities associated with the TUPE funding that is subject of this MOU. All records shall be maintained in accordance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, all records shall be maintained in an accessible location and in good condition for a period of at least five (5) years from the effective date of this MOU.

KCSOS shall have the right to, and District shall permit, the examination, copying, and auditing of all books, records, documents, accounting procedures, practices, and other evidence that reflect the use of the funding provided pursuant to this MOU. Copies of such records shall be immediately provided to KCSOS upon request.

In the event state regulators require the return of any funds relating to amounts paid under the TUPE program, including unexpended funds, the District is responsible for and shall return such amounts as requested by the regulator.

Early Termination

Either Party may terminate its participation in the Consortium or this MOU for any reason and at any time upon notice to KCSOS. Should a District terminate its participation in the Consortium, all TUPE funding received pursuant to this MOU must be returned to KCSOS and, in turn, CDE.

KCSOS Responsibilities

- 1. Subject to available TUPE funding, identify a KCSOS TUPE Project Coordinator to be responsible to:
 - a. Serve as a liaison with key stakeholders on the Tobacco-Free Coalition of Kern, an office within the Kern County Department of Public Health;
 - b. Provide TUPE funding to each consortium member for a District TUPE Coordinator, School Site TUPE Coordinator, and School Site TUPE Activities Coordinator stipends; purchase research-validated TUPE prevention curriculum; and coordinate training and implementation fidelity checks;
 - c. Convene biannual TUPE advisory meetings with TUPE Project Leads and district/site contacts;
 - d. Provide resources and support necessary to meet the objectives of the TUPE grant;
 - e. Support enforcement and recertification of tobacco-free policies for all Districts;
 - f. Expend funds as designated in the approved TUPE request for application;
 - g. Support sites, that have been selected by KCSOS, to participate in the California Youth Tobacco Survey ("CYTS") administered by the California Department of Public Health ("CDPH");

- h. At selected sites as determined by KCSOS, help to facilitate Students Working Against Tobacco ("SWAT") training and at those selected sites, assist students in creating anti-tobacco public service announcements to be featured in local media and peer-to-peer mentoring.
- 2. Download and keep on file the Assurances and Certifications located on the COE funding portal.

District Responsibilities

- 1. Subject to available TUPE funding, identify a District TUPE Project Contact Person to be responsible to:
 - a. Monitor tobacco-free policy enforcement and support recertification, ensuring that all tobacco- free policy requirements met by the date of recertification:
 - b. Submit necessary data designed to track process and outcome measures to KCSOS TUPE Project Coordinator;
 - c. Attend a minimum of two (2) TUPE Advisory Meetings per year;
 - d. Assist KCSOS with tobacco-free policy recertification and COE report submission by April 30, 2026;
 - e. If chosen, participate in the CYTS administered by CDPH;
 - f. Maintain a current, updated list of TUPE district staff, including school site, phone number, and email
- 2. Identify staff to serve as TUPE School Site Liaisons, who will be responsible for either or both of the following roles/responsibilities:
 - a. Implementing a combination of:
 - a primary research-validated tobacco prevention program,
 - youth development programs (i.e., Friday Night Live, Safe School Ambassadors),
 - intervention and cessation/referral activities,
 - pregnant minor assessment/referral and linkage to services, to address needs identified in the TUPE project needs analysis;
 - b. Receiving additional training in a research-based curriculum to serve as a coach/support at the school site;
 - c. Attend at least one (1) County-Wide TUPE Training and assist in students creating anti-tobacco public service announcements to be featured in local media.

- 3. Work closely with site administrators (Principals, Assistant Principals) to create support for the program and inform campus security and staff of Pre-Cessation/Cessation classes and referral forms.
- 4. Promote Pre-Cessation/Cessation classes as alternatives to in-house suspension, for student tobacco policy violations, and detention as needed.
- 5. Facilitate campus clearance for students participating in peer presentations and field trips for events such as the Drug Free Youth Summit, Kern County Great American Smokeout, Leaders in Life Youth Conference, Students Working Against Tobacco, and No Butts Left Behind Project, etc.
- 6. Provide support for youth development projects to involve Kern County Youth Tobacco Purchase Surveys, including;
 - a. Support for the Tobacco Free Coalition of Kern, Back to School Nights, Resource Fairs, and Parent Tobacco Coalition Development.

ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS OF THIS MOU

Hold Harmless & Indemnification

Each Party agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other Party—including its directors, officers, employees, agents, volunteers, representatives, and subcontractors—from and against any and all claims or causes of action brought by third parties that arise from the negligence, gross negligence, or other malfeasance of its personnel in connection with the subject matter of this MOU, or from a failure to comply with administrative requirements associated with the TUPE Grant Program as imposed by law. This provision shall survive the termination of this MOU.

Insurance

Each Party shall procure and maintain in force during the term of this MOU, at its sole cost and expense, Comprehensive General Liability Insurance, for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage arising out of, or in connection with this MOU. Coverage shall be no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per claim and two million dollars (\$2,000,000) aggregate. Coverage shall not exclude sexual molestation or abuse liability.

Each Party shall also procure and maintain in force during the term of this Agreement, at its sole cost and expense Workers' Compensation coverage as required by law.

Such coverages must be obtained from a carrier admitted to do insurance business in California and listed in the current "Best's Key Rating Guide" publication with a minimum of an "A-; VII" rating. A non-admitted company doing business in the state of California must have a "Best's Rating" of "Excellent A: X," or better. The Parties stipulate that KCSOS is a member of a self-insured pool, known as Self Insured Schools of California and that the quality and amount of coverage is the equivalent to that required herein.

Each Party's policy shall contain an endorsement naming the other Party as an additional insured insofar as this Agreement is concerned. Each Party must approve any exception to these requirements sought by the other Party.

Each Party's policy provision(s) or endorsement(s) must further provide that coverage is primary for claims under that party's general liability policy that are caused, in whole or in part, by that Party in respect to this MOU and not excess over or contributory with any other valid, applicable, and collectible insurance or self-insurance in force for the additional insured.

The Parties shall exchange original certificates of insurance and the endorsements to the policies of insurance.

Exclusion of Certain Damages

In no event shall any Party be liable to the other Party for any direct or indirect, special, incidental, consequential, or punitive damages, however caused and under any theory of liability—whether in contract, tort (including negligence and strict liability) or otherwise — arising out of or related to this MOU, even if advised of the possibility of such damages, and notwithstanding any failure of essential purpose of any limited remedy.

Except for claims based on willful malfeasance, the maximum aggregate liability of any Party to another Party under any theory of law (including breach of contract, tort, and strict liability) shall not exceed the total amount received by the Party from the other Party or the flat amount of five hundred dollars (\$500.00), whichever is greater.

The foregoing limitation of liability shall not apply to claims brought pursuant to the Hold Harmless and Indemnification provision of this Agreement. This provision does not apply to liability for gross negligence, willful injury or fraud, and is not intended to protect nonagent third parties.

Miscellaneous Provision

<u>Entire Agreement.</u> This MOU, including any exhibits or schedules to which it refers, constitutes the final, complete, and exclusive statement of the terms of agreement between the Parties pertaining to the subject matter of the agreement. It supersedes all prior and contemporaneous understandings or agreements of the Parties. No Party has been induced to enter into this agreement by, nor is any party relying on, any representation or warranty outside those expressly set forth in this agreement.

<u>Amendment.</u> The provisions of this MOU may be modified only by mutual agreement of the Parties. No modification shall be binding unless it is in writing and signed by the Party against whom enforcement of the modification is sought.

<u>Waiver.</u> Any of the terms or conditions of this MOU may be waived at any time by the Party entitled to the benefit of the term or condition, but no such waiver shall affect or impair the right of the waiving party to require observance, performance, or satisfaction either of that term or condition as it applies on a subsequent occasion or any other term or condition of this Agreement.

<u>Assignment.</u> Neither Party may assign any rights or benefits or delegate any duties under this Agreement without the written consent of the other Party. Any purported assignment without written consent shall be void.

<u>Parties in Interest.</u> Nothing in this MOU, whether express or implied, is intended to confer any rights or remedies under or by reason of this agreement on any person other than the Parties to it and their respective successors and assigns, nor is anything in this MOU intended to relieve or discharge the obligation or liability of any third person to any Party

to this Agreement, nor shall any provision give any third person any right of subrogation or action against any party to this Agreement.

<u>Severability.</u> If any provision of this MOU is held by an arbitrator or court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of the agreement shall continue in full force and effect and shall in no way be impaired or invalidated.

<u>Governing Law.</u> The rights and obligations of the Parties and the interpretation and performance of this MOU shall be governed by the laws of California, excluding any statute which directs application of the laws of another jurisdiction.

<u>Notices.</u> Any notice under this MOU shall be in writing, and any written notice or other document shall be deemed to have been duly given on the date of personal service on the parties or on the second business day after mailing if the document is mailed by registered or certified mail, addressed to the parties at the addresses listed on the signature page, or at the most recent address specified by the addressee through written notice under this provision. Failure to conform to the requirement that mailings be by registered or certified mail shall not defeat the effectiveness of notice actually received by the addressee.

<u>Authority to Enter Agreement.</u> Each Party to this MOU represents and warrants that it has the full power and authority to enter into this Agreement and to carry out the transactions contemplated by it and has taken all action necessary to authorize the execution, delivery, and performance of the agreement.

<u>Non-Appropriation</u>. KCSOS reserves the right to immediately terminate this Agreement in the event insufficient funds are appropriated or budgeted for in any fiscal year. Upon such termination, each Party will be released from any further financial obligation to any other Party.

<u>Independent Agents</u>. This agreement is by and between independent agents. It is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture, and/or association between the independent agents. Neither Party's employees shall have any rights to the other Party's employee benefits, including pension, retirement, health and welfare, and any other similar benefits as a result of this agreement.

<u>Subcontractors</u>. The District shall notify KCSOS of any subcontractors that will be engaged in the performance of services under this agreement.

<u>Nondiscrimination.</u> During the performance of this agreement, neither Party shall deny benefits to any person on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation,

immigration status or military and veteran status, nor shall they discriminate unlawfully against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, immigration status or military and veteran status.

<u>Execution of Agreement.</u> This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument. Photographic copies of such signed counterparts may be used in lieu of the originals for any purpose.

Regulation 3515.4: Recovery For Property Loss Or Damage

Original Adopted Date: 10/01/1997 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date:

09/01/2025

In order to initiate the process for recovery for property loss or damage, district employees shall report any damage to or loss of school property to the Superintendent or designee immediately after such damage or loss is discovered.

Upon learning of any instance of loss or damage to school property, the Superintendent or designee shall conduct a complete investigation, which includes consulting with law enforcement officials when appropriate.

After the investigation is concluded, the individual causing the damage or loss has been identified, and the costs of repair, replacement, or cleanup determined, the Superintendent or designee shall take all practical and reasonable steps, including consultation with the district's legal counsel and/or insurance carrier, as needed, to recover the district's loss.

Such steps may also include the filing of a civil complaint in a court of competent jurisdiction to recover damages from the responsible person and, if the responsible person is a minor, from the parent/guardian in accordance with law. Damages may include the cost of repair or replacement of the property, the payment of any reward, interest, court costs, and all other damages as provided by law.

If the responsible person is a minor student of the district and the student's parents/guardians are unable to pay for the damages or to return the property, the district shall offer a program of voluntary work for the student in lieu of the payment of monetary damages. The district may offer any other student or former student, with parent/guardian permission, the option to provide service, work, or other alternative, nonmonetary forms of compensation to settle the debt owed as a result of property loss or damage. Service or work exchanged for repayment of a debt shall comply with all provisions of the Labor Code related to youth employment. (Education Code 48904, 49014)

The Superintendent or designee may withhold the student's grades, diploma, and/or transcripts until the student's parents/guardians have paid for the damages or the voluntary work has been completed. Prior to withholding a student's grades, diploma, or transcripts, the student's parent/guardian shall be notified of the alleged misconduct and due process shall be afforded the student in accordance with law. (Education Code 48904)

Additionally, the Superintendent or designee shall initiate appropriate disciplinary procedures against the student.

Regulation 5141.4: Child Abuse Prevention And Reporting

Definitions

Child abuse or neglect includes the following: (Penal Code 11165.5, 11165.6)

- A physical injury or death inflicted by other than accidental means on a child by another person
- 2. Sexual abuse of a child, including sexual assault or sexual exploitation, as defined in Penal Code 11165.1
- 3. Neglect of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.2
- 4. Willful harming or injuring of a child or the endangering of the person or health of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.3
- 5. Unlawful corporal punishment or injury as defined in Penal Code 11165.4

Child abuse or neglect does not include:

- 1. A mutual affray between minors (Penal Code 11165.6)
- 2. An injury caused by reasonable and necessary force used by a peace officer acting within the course and scope of employment (Penal Code 11165.5, 11165.6)
- 3. An injury resulting from the exercise by a teacher, vice principal, principal, or other certificated employee of the same degree of physical control over a student that a parent/guardian would be legally privileged to exercise, not exceeding the amount of physical control reasonably necessary to maintain order, protect property, protect the health and safety of students, or maintain proper and appropriate conditions conducive to learning (Education Code 44807)
- 4. An injury caused by a district employee's use of force that is reasonable and necessary to quell a disturbance threatening physical injury to persons or damage to property, for purposes of self-defense, or to obtain weapons or other dangerous objects within the control of a student (Education Code 49001)
- 5. Physical pain or discomfort caused by athletic competition or other such recreational activity voluntarily engaged in by a student (Education Code 49001)

Additionally, general neglect does not include: (Penal Code 11165.2)

- 1. A parent/guardian's economic disadvantage
- 2. A child receiving treatment by spiritual means pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 16509.1, or not receiving specified medical treatment for religious reasons

Mandated reporters include, but are not limited to, teachers; instructional aides; teacher's aides or assistants; classified employees; certificated pupil personnel employees; administrative officers or supervisors of child attendance; athletic coaches, administrators, and directors; licensees, administrators, and employees of a licensed child day care facility; Head Start program teachers; district police or security officers; licensed nurses or health care providers; and administrators, presenters, and counselors of a child abuse prevention program. (Penal Code 11165.7)

Reasonable suspicion means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on the person's training and experience, to suspect child abuse or neglect. However, reasonable suspicion does not require certainty that child abuse or neglect has occurred nor does it require a specific medical indication of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Reportable Offenses

Using the procedures provided below, a mandated reporter shall make a report whenever the mandated reporter, while acting in a professional capacity or within the scope of employment, has knowledge of or observes a child whom the mandated reporter knows or reasonably suspects has been the victim of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Any mandated reporter who has knowledge of or who reasonably suspects that a child is suffering serious emotional damage or is at a substantial risk of suffering serious emotional damage, based on evidence of severe anxiety, depression, withdrawal, or untoward aggressive behavior toward self or others, may make a report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11165.9, 11166.05, 11167)

Any district employee who reasonably believes to have observed the commission of a murder, rape, or lewd or lascivious act by use of force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury against a victim who is a child under 14 years of age shall notify a peace officer. (Penal Code 152.3)

The fact that a child is experiencing homelessness or is classified as an unaccompanied minor, as defined in the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 USC 11434a), is not, in and of itself, a sufficient basis for reporting child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11165.15)

Responsibility for Reporting

The reporting duties of mandated reporters are individual and cannot be delegated to another person. (Penal Code 11166)

When two or more mandated reporters jointly have knowledge of a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect, the report may be made by a member of the team selected by mutual agreement and a single report may be made and signed by the selected member of the reporting team. Any member who has knowledge that the member designated to report has failed to do so shall thereafter make the report. (Penal Code 11166)

No supervisor or administrator shall impede or inhibit a mandated reporter from making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

Any person not identified as a mandated reporter who has knowledge of or observes a child whom the person knows or reasonably suspects has been a victim of child abuse or neglect may report the known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Reporting Procedures

1. Initial Telephone Report

Immediately or as soon as practicable after knowing or observing suspected child abuse or neglect, a mandated reporter shall make an initial report by telephone to any police department (excluding a district police/security department), sheriff's department, county probation department if designated by the county to receive such reports, or county welfare department. (Penal Code 11165.9, 11166)

Such reports shall be made to the following agency(ies):

(name of appropriate agency)	
(address)	
(phone number)	

When the initial telephone report is made, the mandated reporter shall note the name of the official contacted, the date and time contacted, and any instructions or advice received.

2. Written Report

Within 36 hours of knowing or observing the information concerning the incident, the mandated reporter shall prepare and either send, fax, or electronically transmit to the appropriate agency a written follow-up report, which includes a completed California Department of Justice (DOJ) form (BCIA 8572). (Penal Code 11166, 11168)

The DOJ form may be obtained from the district office or other appropriate agencies, such as the police department, sheriff's department, or county probation or welfare department.

Reports of suspected child abuse or neglect shall include, if known: (Penal Code 11167)

- a. The name, business address, and telephone number of the person making the report and the capacity that makes the person a mandated reporter
- b. The child's name and address, present location, and, where applicable, school, grade, and class
- c. The names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the child's parents/guardians
- d. The name, address, telephone number, and other relevant personal information about the person(s) who might have abused or neglected the child
- e. The information that gave rise to the reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect and the source(s) of that information

The mandated reporter shall make a report even if some of this information is not known or is uncertain to the mandated reporter. (Penal Code 11167)

The mandated reporter may give to an investigator from an agency investigating the case, including a licensing agency, any information relevant to an incident of child abuse or neglect or to a report made for serious emotional damage pursuant to Penal Code 11166.05. (Penal Code 11167)

3. Internal Reporting

The mandated reporter shall not be required to disclose the mandated reporter's identity to a supervisor, the principal, or the Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166)

However, employees reporting child abuse or neglect to an appropriate agency are encouraged, but not required, to notify the principal as soon as possible after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency. When so notified, the principal shall inform the Superintendent or designee.

The principal so notified shall provide the mandated reporter with any assistance necessary to ensure that reporting procedures are carried out in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. At the mandated reporter's request, the principal may assist in completing and filing the necessary forms.

Reporting the information to an employer, supervisor, principal, school counselor, co-worker,

or other person shall not be a substitute for making a mandated report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Training

Within the first six weeks of each school year, or within the first six weeks of employment if hired during the school year, the Superintendent or designee shall provide training on mandated reporting requirements to district employees and persons working on their behalf who are mandated reporters. (Education Code 44691; Penal Code 11165.7)

The Superintendent or designee shall use the online training module provided by the California Department of Social Services (CDSS). (Education Code 44691)

The training shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, training in identification and reporting of child abuse and neglect. Additionally, the training shall include information that failure to report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect as required by law is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment and/or a fine as specified. (Education Code 44691; Penal Code 11165.7)

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall provide annual training on the prevention of abuse, including sexual abuse, of children on district property, by district staff, or in district-sponsored programs. (Education Code 44691)

The Superintendent or designee shall obtain and retain proof of each mandated reporter's completion of the training. (Education Code 44691)

Victim Interviews by Social Services

Whenever CDSS or another government agency is investigating suspected child abuse or neglect that occurred within the child's home or out-of-home care facility, the student may be interviewed by an agency representative during school hours, on school premises. The Superintendent or designee shall give the student the choice of being interviewed in private or in the presence of any adult school employee or volunteer aide selected by the student. (Penal Code 11174.3)

A staff member or volunteer aide selected by a child may decline to be present at the interview. If the selected person accepts, the principal or designee shall inform the person of the following requirements prior to the interview: (Penal Code 11174.3)

- 1. The purpose of the selected person's presence at the interview is to lend support to the child and enable the child to be as comfortable as possible
- 2. The selected person shall not participate in the interview

- 3. The selected person shall not discuss the facts or circumstances of the case with the child
- 4. The selected person is subject to the confidentiality requirements of the Child Abuse and Neglect

Reporting Act, a violation of which is punishable as specified in Penal Code 11167.5 If a staff member agrees to be present, the interview shall be held at a time during school hours when it does not involve an expense to the school. (Penal Code 11174.3)

Release of Child to Peace Officer

When a child is released to a peace officer and taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse or neglect, the Superintendent or designee and/or principal shall not notify the parent/guardian, but rather shall provide the peace officer with the address and telephone number of the child's parent/guardian. (Education Code 48906)

Parent/Guardian Complaints

Upon request, the Superintendent or designee shall provide parents/guardians with procedures for reporting suspected child abuse occurring on district property to appropriate agencies. For parents/guardians whose primary language is not English, such procedures shall be in their primary language and, when communicating orally regarding those guidelines and/or procedures, an interpreter shall be provided.

To file a complaint against a district employee or other person suspected of child abuse or neglect on district property, parents/guardians may file a report by telephone, in person, or in writing with any appropriate agency identified above under "Reporting Procedures." If a parent/guardian makes a complaint about an employee to any other employee, the employee receiving the information shall notify the parent/guardian of procedures for filing a complaint with the appropriate agency. The employee shall also file a report when obligated to do so pursuant to Penal Code 11166 using the procedures described above for mandated reporters.

In addition, if the child is enrolled in special education, a separate complaint may be filed with the California Department of Education pursuant to 5 CCR 3200-3205.

Notifications

The Superintendent or designee shall provide to all new employees who are mandated reporters a statement that informs them of their status as mandated reporters, their reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166, and their confidentiality rights under Penal Code 11167. Additionally, the district shall provide these new employees with a copy of Penal Code 11165.7, 11166, and 11167. (Penal Code 11165.7, 11166.5)

Before beginning employment, any person who will be a mandated reporter by virtue of the person's position shall sign a statement indicating knowledge of the reporting obligations under

Penal Code 11166 and compliance with such provisions. The signed statement shall be retained by the Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166.5)

Employees who work with dependent adults shall be notified of legal responsibilities and reporting procedures pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 15630-15637.

The Superintendent or designee also shall notify all employees that:

- 1. A mandated reporter who reports a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect shall not be held civilly or criminally liable for making a report and this immunity shall apply even if the mandated reporter acquired the knowledge or reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect outside of the mandated reporter's professional capacity or outside the scope of employment (Penal Code 11172)
 - Any other person making a report shall not incur civil or criminal liability unless it can be proven that the person knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11172)
- 2. If a mandated reporter fails to timely report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect, the mandated reporter may be guilty of a crime punishable by a fine and/or imprisonment (Penal Code 11166)

No employee shall be subject to any sanction by the district for making a report unless it can be shown that the employee knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11166, 11172)

Policy 6141.4: International Baccalaureate Program

Original Adopted Date: 10/01/2015 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date:

To encourage district students to challenge themselves academically, develop intercultural understanding and respect, and be more competitive when applying for admission to postsecondary institutions, the district shall offer opportunities for students to participate in the International Baccalaureate (IB) program. The Superintendent or designee shall provide a challenging, cross-disciplinary curriculum that provides the knowledge, concepts, skills, attitudes, and action that district students need to equip them for successful lives. The district's IB program shall provide structured, purposeful inquiry that engages students in their own learning.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that district students of all ability levels are offered the opportunity to participate in the program if it is available at their school.

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parent/guardian(s) of students in grades 7-12 of any dual enrollment or IB courses offered by the district. (Education Code 48980.6)

In order to construct a rigorous and challenging curriculum, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers and administrators are engaged in the planning process for the IB program. The Superintendent or designee shall coordinate implementation of the IB program with any other advanced learning opportunities offered by the district.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide staff development and support to teachers of IB courses. Such professional development may include, but is not limited to, mentoring for prospective teachers of IB courses, opportunities for teachers to obtain information on the curriculum of specific courses through online workshops, webinars, blended learning and elearning resources, and opportunities for district staff to share course syllabi and teaching practices.

IB Diploma Program or IB Career-related Program

The district's IB Diploma Program shall offer a comprehensive curriculum made up of six subject groups that broadens students' educational experience and challenges students to apply their knowledge and skills. To earn the IB diploma, students shall meet the criteria outlined by IBO, including the following:

1. Completing a specific, intensive, balanced liberal arts course of study

- 2. Passing examinations in six curricular areas, including language and literature, language acquisition, individuals and societies, sciences, mathematics, and the arts
- 3. Demonstrating an understanding of the theory of knowledge through an exhibition and extended essay on an externally assessed, independent research project
- 4. Demonstrating the concepts of creativity, activity, and service through a project that challenges students to show initiative, demonstrate perseverance, and develop skills such as collaboration, problem solving, and decision making

The district shall offer a two-year, rigorous IB Career-related Program to high school students pursuing vocational or career and technical education (CTE). Students participating in the IB Career-related Program shall take a minimum of two IB courses and meet other diploma-level requirements, including performing community service and completing a final project related to their vocational or CTE field.

As necessary, the Superintendent or designee may adjust the number of courses taken and hours of community service performed by students depending on the IB program in which they are participating.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop support systems to encourage students to participate in IB courses and take IB course examinations. Support systems may include, but are not limited to, resource centers, programs to recognize student accomplishments, and parent/guardian involvement through an IB parent/guardian organization group. Additionally, the Superintendent or designee may explore partnerships with colleges and universities to encourage students to pursue postsecondary education.

To the extent feasible, the district shall reduce the cost of IB examination fees for eligible low-income students. The Superintendent or designee shall notify parent(s)/guardian(s) of the availability of funds for this purpose and shall provide information on how students may apply for funding.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually apply to the California Department of Education for federal funds to support the reimbursement of fees for low-income students. Additionally, the Superintendent or designee may recommend the use of district funds, when available and appropriate, to provide additional support for the fee assistance program.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the Governing Board regarding the number of students participating in the IB program and, as applicable, the percentage of participating students who pass the IB examination in each curricular area. Such reports shall include the participation and outcomes of numerically significant student subgroups as defined in Education Code 52052.

Regulation 5113.11: Attendance Supervision

Original Adopted Date: 10/01/2017 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 09/01/2025

The Superintendent or designee shall appoint an attendance supervisor and any assistant attendance supervisor(s) as may be necessary to supervise the attendance of district students. (Education Code 48240, 48242)

Any person appointed as an attendance supervisor shall be appropriately certificated to perform the work. (Education Code 48241, 48245)

Such supervisors shall perform duties related to compulsory full-time education, truancy, compulsory continuation education, work permits, and any additional duties prescribed by the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 48240)

The attendance supervisor shall promote a culture of attendance and establish a system to accurately track student attendance in order to achieve all of the following:

- 1. Raise the awareness of school personnel, parents/guardians, caregivers, community partners, and local businesses of the effects of chronic absenteeism and truancy and other challenges associated with poor attendance
- 2. Identify and respond to grade level or student subgroup patterns of chronic absenteeism or truancy
- 3. Identify and address factors contributing to chronic absenteeism and habitual truancy, including suspension and expulsion
- 4. Ensure that students with attendance problems are identified as early as possible to provide applicable support services and interventions
- 5. Evaluate the effectiveness of strategies implemented to reduce chronic absenteeism rates and truancy rates

The attendance supervisor may provide support services and interventions, including, but not limited to, the following: (Education Code 48240)

1. A conference between school personnel, the student's parent/guardian, and the student

- 2. Promotion of cocurricular and extracurricular activities that increase student connectedness to school, such as tutoring, mentoring, the arts, service learning, or athletics
- 3. Recognition of students who achieve excellent attendance or demonstrate significant improvement in attendance
- 4. Referral of the student to a school nurse, school counselor, school psychologist, school social worker, and other student support personnel for case management and counseling
- 5. Collaboration with child welfare services, law enforcement, courts, public health care agencies, government agencies, or medical, mental health, and oral health care providers to receive necessary services
- 6. Collaboration with school study teams, guidance teams, school attendance review teams, or other intervention-related teams to assess the attendance or behavior problem in partnership with the student and the student's parents/guardians or caregivers
- 7. In schools with significantly higher rates of chronic absenteeism, identification of barriers to attendance that may require schoolwide strategies rather than case management
 - Schoolwide strategies may include the implementation of an attendance recovery program operated in accordance with Board Policy/Administrative Regulation 5133.1 Chronic Absence and Truancy.
- 8. Referral of the student for a comprehensive psychosocial or psychoeducational assessment, including for purposes of creating an individualized education program for a student with disabilities or creating a plan pursuant to Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973
- 9. Referral of the student to a school attendance review board (SARB) established pursuant to Education Code 48321 or to the probation department pursuant to Education Code 48263
- 10. Referral of the student to a truancy mediation program operated by the county's district attorney or probation officer pursuant to Education Code 48260.6

Upon receiving any complaint that a parent/guardian or other person having control or charge of a student has violated Education Code 48200-48341, the state compulsory education laws, the attendance supervisor shall investigate the matter and, if a violation is found, shall recommend referral to the SARB. If the district is subsequently notified by the SARB that the parent/guardian continually and willfully has failed to respond to directives of the SARB or the services provided, the attendance supervisor shall refer the matter for possible prosecution in court in accordance with Education Code 48291-48292, as applicable. (Education Code 48290-48292)

The attendance supervisor shall gather and transmit to the County Superintendent of Schools the number and types of referrals made to the SARB and of requests for petitions made to the juvenile court. (Education Code 48273)

The attendance supervisor shall annually report student attendance data to the Superintendent or designee and the Governing Board. Such data shall include, by school, grade level, and each numerically significant student subgroup as defined in Education Code 52052, rates of school attendance, chronic absence in which students are absent on 10 percent or more of the school days in the school year, and dropout.

Bylaw 9005: Governance Standards

The Governing Board expects itself to act in the best interests of every student in the district within the legal confines established by law and the fiscal confines established by the budget. The Board shall govern the district responsibly and uphold the highest standards of ethical conduct.

In order to set the direction for the district, provide a high quality education to each student, ensure proper accountability and oversight of the district and the Superintendent, and offer community leadership on behalf of the district and public education, the Board expects itself to have a unity of purpose and to:

- 1. Keep the district focused on learning and achievement for all students
- 2. Communicate a common vision
- 3. Operate openly, with trust and integrity
- 4. Govern in a dignified and professional manner, treating everyone with civility and respect
- 5. Govern within Board-adopted policies and procedures
- 6. Take collective responsibility for the Board's performance
- 7. Periodically evaluate its own effectiveness
- 8. Ensure opportunities for the diverse range of views in the community to inform Board deliberations

In fulfilling its role, the Board is responsible for:

- Involving the community, parents/guardians, students, and staff in regularly developing or updating a common vision for the district focused on learning and achievement and responsive to the needs of all students
- 2. Adopting and updating policies consistent with law and the district's vision and goals
- 3. Maintaining accountability for student learning by adopting curricula and monitoring student progress
- 4. Hiring and supporting the Superintendent so that the vision, goals, and policies of the district can be implemented

- 5. Conducting regular and timely evaluations of the Superintendent based on the vision, goals, and performance of the district, and ensuring that the Superintendent holds district personnel accountable
- 6. Adopting a fiscally responsible budget based on the district's vision and goals, and regularly monitoring the fiscal health of the district
- 7. Ensuring that a safe and appropriate educational environment is provided to all students
- 8. Establishing a framework for the district's collective bargaining process and adopting responsible agreements
- 9. Providing community leadership on educational issues and advocating on behalf of students and public education at the local, state, and federal levels

In addition, each individual Board member is expected to:

- 1. Keep learning and achievement for all students as the primary focus
- 2. Value, support, and advocate for public education
- 3. Recognize and respect differences of perspective and style on the Board and among staff, students, parents/guardians, and the community
- 4. Act with dignity, and understand the implications of demeanor and behavior
- 5. Keep confidential matters confidential
- 6. Participate in professional development and commit the time and energy necessary to be an informed and effective leader
- 7. Understand the distinctions between Board and staff roles, and refrain from performing management functions that are the responsibility of the Superintendent and staff
- 8. Understand that authority rests with the Board as a whole and not with individuals

Policy 5141.4: Child Abuse Prevention And Reporting

Original Adopted Date: 07/01/2002 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 09/01/2025

The Governing Board is committed to supporting the safety and well-being of district students and desires to facilitate the prevention of and response to child abuse and neglect. The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement strategies for preventing, recognizing, and promptly reporting known or suspected child abuse and neglect.

The Superintendent or designee may provide a student who is a victim of abuse with school-based mental health services or other support services and/or may refer the student to resources available within the community as needed.

Child Abuse Prevention

The district's instructional program may provide age-appropriate and culturally sensitive child abuse prevention curriculum which explains students' right to live free of abuse, includes instruction in the skills and techniques needed to identify unsafe situations and react appropriately and promptly, informs students of available support resources, and teaches students how to obtain help and disclose incidents of abuse.

The district's program also may include age-appropriate instruction in sexual abuse and sexual assault awareness and prevention. Upon written request of a student's parent/guardian, the student shall be excused from taking such instruction. (Education Code 51900.6)

The Superintendent or designee may display posters, in areas on campus where students frequently congregate, notifying students of the appropriate telephone number to call to report child abuse or neglect. (Education Code 33133.5)

In addition, student identification cards for students in grades 7-12 shall include the National Domestic Violence Hotline telephone number. (Education Code 215.5)

The Superintendent or designee shall, to the extent feasible, seek to incorporate community resources into the district's child abuse prevention programs and may use these resources to provide parents/guardians with instruction in parenting skills and child abuse prevention.

Child Abuse Reporting

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures for the identification and reporting of known and suspected child abuse and neglect in accordance with law.

Procedures for reporting child abuse, as specified in Penal Code 11164-11174.3, shall be included in the district and/or school comprehensive safety plan. (Education Code 32282)

District employees who are mandated reporters, as defined by law and administrative regulation, are obligated to report all known or suspected incidents of child abuse and neglect.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training regarding the duties of mandated reporters as required by law and as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. (Education Code 44691; Penal Code 11165.7)

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Policy 3515.4: Recovery For Property Loss Or Damage

The Governing Board desires to create a safe and secure learning environment and to minimize acts of vandalism and damage to school property. When district property is damaged due to the willful misconduct of a student or other person, the Superintendent or designee shall seek reimbursement of damages, within the limitations specified in law, from the parent/guardian of a minor child or from any other responsible individual.

The district may collect debt owed by a student or former student as a result of vandalism or to cover the replacement cost of district books, supplies, or property loaned to a student that the student fails to return or that is willfully cut, defaced, or otherwise injured. However, the Superintendent or designee shall not collect debt for such damage caused by a current or former student experiencing homelessness or foster child or youth. (Education Code 48904, 49014)

Rewards

The Board may offer and pay a reward for information leading to the determination of the identity of, and the apprehension of, any person who willfully damages or destroys any district property. (Government Code 53069.5)

OPTION 1: (Authorization for Superintendent or designee to offer reward of specified amount)

The Board authorizes the Superintendent or designee to offer a reward in any amount deemed appropriate, not exceeding \$2,500. A reward in excess of \$2,500 shall be authorized in advance by the Board.

OPTION 2: (Board determination of amount of reward)

The Board shall determine the appropriate amount for the reward.

OPTION 2 ENDS HERE

The Superintendent or designee shall disburse the reward when the guilt of the person responsible for the act has been established by a criminal conviction or other appropriate judicial procedure. If more than one person provides information, the reward shall be divided among them as appropriate.

Emergency Contact Information

In order to facilitate contact in case of an emergency or accident, the principal or designee shall annually request that parents/guardians provide the following information:

- 1. Home address and telephone number
- 2. Parent/guardian's business address and telephone number
- 3. Parent/guardian's cell phone number and email address
- 4. Name, address, and telephone number of an alternative contact person to whom the student may be released and who is authorized by the parent/guardian to care for the student in cases of emergency or when the parent/guardian cannot be reached
- 5. Local physician to call in case of emergency

In addition, parents/guardians shall be encouraged to notify the school whenever their emergency contact information changes.

Notification/Consent for Medical Treatment

Whenever a student requires emergency or urgent medical treatment while at school or a district-sponsored activity, the principal or designee shall contact the parent/guardian or, if the parent/guardian cannot be reached, another person identified in the district's student information system as an emergency contact, in order to obtain consent for the medical treatment.

If the student's parent/guardian or other contact person cannot be reached to provide consent, the principal or designee may seek reasonable medical treatment for the student as needed, unless the parent/guardian has previously filed with the district a written objection to any medical treatment other than first aid.

A person who has filed with the district a completed caregiver's authorization affidavit pursuant to Family Code 6550-6552 shall have the right to consent to or refuse school-related medical care on behalf of the minor student. The caregiver's authorization shall be invalid if the district receives notice that the minor student is no longer living with the caregiver or if the Superintendent or designee has actual knowledge of facts contrary to those stated on the affidavit. (Family Code

The caregiver's consent to medical care shall be superseded by any contravening decision of the parent or other person having legal custody of the student, provided that this contravening decision does not jeopardize the student's life, health, or safety. (Family Code 6550)

Automated External Defibrillators

When an automated external defibrillator (AED) is placed in a district school, the Superintendent or designee shall notify an agent of the local emergency medical services agency of the existence, location, and type of AED acquired. (Health and Safety Code 1797.196, 1797.200)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any AED placed at a district school is: (Health and Safety Code 1797.196)

- 1. Maintained and tested according to the operation and maintenance guidelines set forth by the manufacturer
- 2. Tested at least biannually and after each use
- 3. Inspected at least every 90 days for potential issues related to operability of the device, including a blinking light or other obvious defect that may suggest tampering or that another problem has arisen with the functionality of the AED

Additionally, the Superintendent or designee shall comply with all laws and regulations governing the placement of an AED and maintain required records of the AED maintenance and testing. (Health and Safety Code 1797.196)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a written plan which describes the procedures to be followed in the event of a medical emergency, including an emergency that may involve the use of an AED. These procedures shall include, but not be limited to, requirements for immediate notification of the 911 emergency telephone number in the event of an emergency that may involve the use of an AED.

The principal of any district school with an AED shall annually provide information to school employees that describes: (Health and Safety Code 1797.196)

- 1. Sudden cardiac arrest
- 2. The school's emergency response plan
- 3. The proper use of an AED

Instructions on how to use the AED, in no less than 14-point type, shall be posted next to every AED. Additionally, school employees shall be notified annually of the location of all AED units on campus and be provided information about who they can contact if they want to voluntarily take

AED or cardiopulmonary resuscitation training. (Health and Safety Code 1797.196)

The Superintendent or designee shall annually offer a demonstration to at least one school staff member on how to use an AED properly in an emergency. The building owner may arrange for the demonstration or partner with a nonprofit organization to do so. (Health and Safety Code 1797.196)

The principal of any district school serving students in grades 6-12 that has an AED placed in the school shall annually notify students as to the location of all AEDs on campus. (Health and Safety Code 1797.196)

Trauma Kits

Any district school with an occupancy of 200 or more that was constructed on or after January 1, 2023, or was constructed prior to January 1, 2023, and modified or renovated as specified, shall acquire and place at least six trauma kits on the premises of the building in an easily accessible and recognizable container. (Health and Safety Code 19310)

All trauma kits acquired and placed on the premises of a school building or structure shall be inspected every three years to ensure that all materials, supplies, and equipment contained in the trauma kit are not expired, and replace any expired or missing materials, supplies, and equipment as necessary. After a trauma kit is used, it shall be restocked and any materials, supplies, and equipment replaced as necessary to ensure that all materials, supplies, and equipment required to be contained in the trauma kit are contained in the trauma kit. (Health and Safety Code 19310)

Regulation 3515: Campus Security

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a campus security plan for each school site which contributes to a positive school climate, fosters social and emotional learning and student well-being, and includes strategies to:

1. Secure the campus perimeter and school facilities in order to prevent criminal activity

These strategies include a risk management analysis of each campus' security system, lighting system, and fencing. Procedures to ensure unobstructed views and eliminate blind spots caused by doorways and landscaping shall also be considered. Additionally, parking lot design may be studied, including methods to discourage through traffic.

2. Secure buildings and interior spaces from outsiders and discourage trespassing

These strategies may include installing locks, requiring visitor registration, providing staff and student identification tags, and patrolling places used for congregating and loitering.

3. Secure the district's network infrastructure and web applications from cyberattacks

These strategies may include performing an independent security assessment of the district's network infrastructure and selected web applications.

4. Discourage vandalism and graffiti

These strategies may include plans to immediately cover graffiti and implement campus beautification.

- 5. Control access to keys and other school inventory
- Detect and intervene with school crime

These strategies may include creating a school watch program, increasing adult presence and supervision, establishing an anonymous crime reporting system, monitoring suspicious and/or threatening digital media content, analyzing school crime incidents, and collaborating with local law enforcement agencies, including providing for law enforcement presence.

7. Additionally, all staff shall be made aware of their responsibilities regarding the immediate reporting of potential homicidal acts to law enforcement, and receive training in the assessment and reporting of such threats

All staff shall receive training in building and grounds security procedures and emergency response.

Locks

All state-funded new construction and modernization projects shall include locks that allow doors to classrooms and any room with an occupancy of five or more persons to be locked from the inside. Additionally, when the district undertakes an addition, alteration, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or retrofit of a school building, the district shall install interior locks on each door of any room with an occupancy of five or more persons. Such doors shall be capable of being unlocked from the outside with a key or other approved means. Student restrooms and doors that lock from the outside at all times are not required to have locks that can be locked from the inside. (Education Code 17075.50, 17583, 17586; 24 CCR 1010.2, 1010.2.8, 1010.2.8.2)

Keys

The principal or designee shall be responsible for all keys used in a school. Keys shall be issued only to authorized employees who regularly need a key in order to carry out job responsibilities.

The principal or designee shall create a key control system with a record of each key assigned and room(s) or building(s) which the key opens.

Keys shall never be loaned to students, parents/guardians, or volunteers, nor shall the master key ever be loaned.

Any person issued a key shall be responsible for its safekeeping. The duplication of school keys is prohibited. If a key is lost, the person responsible shall immediately report the loss to the principal or designee and shall pay for a replacement key.

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of providing a safe school environment that is conducive to learning and promotes student safety and well-being. Appropriate measures shall be implemented to minimize the risk of harm to students, including, but not limited to, protocols for maintaining safe conditions on school grounds, promoting safe use of school facilities and equipment, and guiding student participation in educational programs and school-sponsored activities.

Additionally, the Superintendent or designee shall regularly review current guidance regarding cybersecurity and digital media awareness and incorporate recommended practices into the district's processes and procedures related to the protection of the district's network infrastructure, and the monitoring and response to suspicious and/or threatening digital media content.

District staff shall be responsible for the proper supervision of students at all times when students are subject to district rules, including, but not limited to, during school hours, district-sponsored activities, before and after-school programs, morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up, and while students are using district provided transportation.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that students receive appropriate instruction on topics related to safety and emergency procedures, as well as injury and disease prevention.

Crossing Guards/Student Safety Patrol

To assist students in safely crossing streets adjacent to or near school sites, the Board may employ crossing guards and/or establish a student safety patrol at any district school. The Superintendent or designee shall periodically examine traffic patterns within school attendance areas in order to identify locations where crossing assistance may be needed.

Policy 5113.12: District School Attendance Review Board

Original Adopted Date: 10/01/2017 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date:

The Governing Board recognizes that poor school attendance and behavior problems negatively impact student learning and achievement and put students at greater risk of dropping out of school. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive and integrated system for the early identification of attendance problems and shall implement strategies to encourage students' attendance. After other interventions have been exhausted, students with a pattern of unexcused absences may be referred to a school attendance review board (SARB), in accordance with applicable law, in order to receive intensive guidance and assistance.

The SARB shall maintain a continuing inventory of community resources, including alternative educational programs.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with the SARB and appropriate community agencies, including, but not limited to, law enforcement agencies, child welfare agencies, and health services, to provide school-based and/or community-based interventions tailored to the specific needs of the student.

The Board shall appoint members to the district's SARB, who may include a parent/guardian, as well as representatives of various agencies including, but not limited to, school districts; the county probation department; the county welfare department; the County Superintendent of Schools; law enforcement agencies; community-based youth service centers; school guidance personnel; child welfare and attendance personnel; school or county health care personnel; school, county, or community mental health personnel; the county district attorney's office; and the county public defender's office. (Education Code 48321)

Each SARB shall, at least annually, consult with students who reflect the diversity of all the schools that are served by the SARB for the purpose of soliciting input that will assist SARB members in gaining a better understanding of, and proposing interventions for, student attendance and behavioral challenges. (Education Code 48321)

The district's SARB shall provide support to improve student attendance and behavior through proactive efforts focused on building positive school environments and improved school connectedness, early identification and immediate intervention to re-engage students with poor attendance or behavior, and intensive intervention with students and families to address severe or persistent attendance or behavior issues.

The district's SARB shall operate in accordance with Board Bylaw 9320 - Meetings and Notices, Board Bylaw 9321 - Closed Session, and Board Bylaw 9322 - Agenda/Meeting Materials; Education Code 48320-48325; applicable rules and regulations of the County Office of Education's SARB; and the Ralph M. Brown Act (open meeting requirements).

The SARB shall collect data and annually report outcomes on SARB referrals to the Board, Superintendent or designee, and County Superintendent. (Education Code 48273)

Excused Absences

Subject to any applicable limitation, condition, or other requirement specified in law, a student's absence shall be excused for any of the following purposes:

- 1. Personal illness, including absence for the benefit of the student's mental or behavioral health (Education Code 48205)
- 2. Quarantine under the direction of a county or city health officer (Education Code 48205)
- 3. Medical, dental, optometrical, or chiropractic service or appointment (Education Code 48205)
- 4. Attendance at funeral services for or grieving the death of a member of the student's immediate family or, as determined by the student's parent/guardian, a person so closely associated with the student as to be considered the student's immediate family (Education Code 48205)
 - A student may be excused for this reason for up to five days for each incident. (Education Code 48205)
- 5. Jury duty in the manner provided for by law (Education Code 48205)
- 6. Illness or medical appointment of a child to whom the student is the custodial parent (Education Code 48205)
- 7. Upon advance written request by the parent/guardian and the approval of the principal or designee, justifiable personal reasons including, but not limited to: (Education Code 48205)
 - a. Attendance or appearance in court
 - b. Attendance at a funeral service
 - c. Observance of a religious holiday or ceremony
 - d. Attendance at religious retreats for no more than one school day each semester

- e. Attendance at an employment conference
- f. Attendance at an educational conference on the legislative or judicial process offered by a nonprofit organization
- 8. Service as a member of a precinct board for an election pursuant to Elections Code 12302 (Education Code 48205)
- 9. To spend time with an immediate family member who is an active duty member of the uniformed services, as defined in Education Code 49701, and has been called to duty for deployment or is on leave from or has immediately returned from such deployment (Education Code 48205)
 - Such absence shall be granted for a period of time to be determined at the discretion of the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 48205)
- 10. Attendance at the student's naturalization ceremony to become a United States citizen (Education Code 48205)
- 11. Participation in a cultural ceremony or event which relates to the habits, practices, beliefs, and traditions of a certain group of people (Education Code 48205)
- 12. For a middle school or high school student, engagement in a civic or political event, provided that the student notifies the school ahead of the absence (Education Code 48205)
 - Unless otherwise permitted by the Superintendent or designee, students shall be limited to one such school day-long absence each school year (Education Code 48205)
- 13. When a student's immediate family member or, as determined by the student's parent/guardian, a person so closely associated with the student as to be considered the student's immediate family has died: (Education Code 48205)
 - a. To access services from a victim services organization or agency
 - b. To access grief support services
 - c. To participate in safety planning or take other actions, including, but not limited to, temporary or permanent relocation, to increase the safety of the student, an immediate family member of the student, or a person determined by the student's parent/guardian to be in such close association with the student as to be considered immediate family

Such absence shall be excused for not more than three days for each incident. (Education Code 48205)

- 14. For a student's participation in military entrance processing
- 15. Participation in religious exercises or to receive moral and religious instruction at the student's place of worship or other suitable place away from school property as designated by the religious group, church, or denomination (Education Code 46014)
 - Absence for student participation in religious exercises or instruction shall not be considered an absence for the purpose of computing average daily attendance if the student attends at least the minimum school day as specified in Administrative Regulation 6112 School Day, and is not excused from school for this purpose on more than four days each school month. (Education Code 46014)
- 16. For a student who holds a work permit authorizing work in the entertainment or allied industries for a period of not more than five consecutive days, work in such industry (Education Code 48225.5)
 - For this purpose, student absence shall be excused for a maximum of up to five absences each school year. (Education Code 48225.5)"
- 17. Participation with a nonprofit performing arts organization in a performance for a public school audience (Education Code 48225.5)
 - A student may be excused for up to five such absences each school year provided that the student's parent/guardian provides a written explanation of such absence to the school. (Education Code 48225.5)
- 18. Other reasons authorized at the discretion of the principal or designee based on the student's specific circumstances (Education Code 48205, 48260)

For the purpose of the absences described above, immediate family means the student's parent/guardian, sibling, grandparent, or any other relative living in the student's household. (Education Code 48205)

Method of Verification

Student absence to care for a child for whom the student is the custodial parent shall not require a physician's note. (Education Code 48205)

For other absences, the student shall, upon returning to school following the absence, present a satisfactory explanation, either in person or by written note, verifying the reason for the absence. Absences shall be verified by the student's parent/guardian, other person having charge or control of the student, or the student if age 18 or older. (Education Code 46012; 5 CCR 306)

When an absence is planned, the principal or designee shall be notified prior to the date of the absence when possible.

Any of the following methods may be used to verify student absences:

- 1. Written, digital, or audio message from parent/guardian or parent representative
- 2. Conversation, in person or by telephone, between the verifying employee and the student's parent/guardian or parent representative

The employee shall subsequently record the following:

- a. Name of student
- b. Name of parent/quardian or parent representative
- c. Name of verifying employee
- d. Date(s) of absence
- e. Reason for absence
- 3. Visit to the student's home by the verifying employee, or any other reasonable method which establishes the fact that the student was absent for the reasons stated

The employee shall document the verification and include the information specified in Item #2 above.

- 4. Physician's verification
 - a. When excusing students for confidential medical services or verifying such appointments, district staff shall not ask the purpose of such appointments but may request a note from the medical office to confirm the time of the appointment
 - b. If a student shows a pattern of chronic absenteeism due to illness, district staff may require physician verification of any further student absences

Parent/Guardian and Student Notifications

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall:

- 1. Notify parents/guardians of the right to excuse a student from school in order to participate in religious exercises or to receive moral and religious instruction at their places of worship, or at other suitable places away from school property designated by a religious group, church, or denomination (Education Code 46014, 48980)
- 2. Notify students in grades 7-12 and the parents/guardians of all students enrolled in the district that school authorities may excuse any student from school to obtain confidential medical services without the consent of the student's parent/guardian (Education Code

46010.1)

3. Notify parents/guardians that a student shall not have a grade reduced or lose academic credit for any excused absence if missed assignments and tests that can reasonably be provided are satisfactorily completed within a reasonable period of time (Education Code 48980)

Such notice shall include the full text of Education Code 48205. (Education Code 48980)

Policy 5141: Health Care And Emergencies

Original Adopted Date: 03/01/2005 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 09/01/2025

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of taking appropriate action whenever an emergency threatens the safety, health, or welfare of a student at school or during district-sponsored activities.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures to ensure that first aid and/or medical attention is provided as quickly as possible when accidents and injuries to students occur and that parents/quardians are notified as appropriate.

The Superintendent or designee shall ask parents/guardians to provide emergency contact information in order to facilitate communication in the event of an accident or illness.

District staff shall appropriately report and document student accidents.

"Do Not Resuscitate" Orders

The Board believes that staff members should not be placed in the position of determining whether to follow any parent/guardian or medical "do not resuscitate" order. Staff shall not accept or follow any such order except under the specific written direction of the Superintendent or designee. The Superintendent or designee may only direct a staff member to follow a "do not resuscitate" order if the Superintendent or designee has received a written authorization from the student's parent/guardian, with an authorized health care provider statement, and an order of an appropriate court.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that parents/guardians who have submitted a "do not resuscitate" order are informed of this policy.

Automated External Defibrillators

The Board authorizes the Superintendent or designee to place automated external defibrillators (AEDs) at designated school sites for use by school employees in an emergency, in accordance with the accompanying administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop guidelines for employees regarding the use of AEDs and shall ensure that employees receive information that describes sudden cardiac arrest, the school's emergency response plan, and the proper use of an AED. Additionally, the guidelines shall specify the placement, security, and maintenance of the AED.

The authorization of AEDs in district schools shall not be deemed to create a guarantee that an AED will be present or will be used in the case of an emergency, or that a trained employee will be present and/or able to use an AED in an emergency, or that the AED will operate properly.

Trauma Kits

Any district school with an occupancy of 200 or more that was constructed on or after January 1, 2023, or was constructed prior to January 1, 2023, and modified or renovated as specified in Health and Safety Code 19310, shall acquire, place, and maintain trauma kits in accordance with the accompanying administrative regulation.

School employees shall be notified annually of the location of the trauma kits and be provided with information regarding training in the use of the trauma kit. (Health and Safety Code 19310)

Regulation 5113.2: Work Permits

Original Adopted Date: 11/01/2004 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date:

Before accepting employment, a student under 18 years of age who is subject to the state's compulsory attendance laws, including a student who has not yet graduated from high school or has not received a certificate of proficiency, shall obtain a work permit.

The district may issue a permit authorizing employment while school is in session, including employment connected with a work experience education program pursuant to Education Code 51760-51769.5, to a student 14-17 years of age. Additionally, the district may issue a permit to any student 12-17 years of age to be employed during a regular school holiday, during a regular or specified occasional public school vacation, and when the student is exempt from compulsory school attendance pursuant to Education Code 48231 because the student arrived from another state within 10 days before the end of the school term. (Education Code 49111, 49113, 49160)

If a student has obtained an offer of employment in the entertainment industry, the student shall request a work permit from the California Department of Industrial Relations, Division of Labor Standards Enforcement, pursuant to Labor Code 1308.5 and 8 CCR 11752-11753.

A work permit shall not be required for a student who meets all of the following criteria: (5 CCR 10121)

- 1. Is not receiving pay or financial reimbursement for services rendered in volunteer services or educational purposes
- 2. Is not in an employer-employee relationship in accordance with the Fair Labor Standards Act, and is serving as an unpaid trainee or volunteer or in an in-school placement
- 3. Has submitted written parent/guardian permission

In addition, a student shall not be required to obtain a work permit if the student is self-employed; is working at odd jobs such as yard work and babysitting in private homes where the student is not regularly employed; is a self-employed news carrier delivering newspapers to consumers on a regular route; is employed in agricultural, horticultural, viticultural, or domestic labor during non-school hours when the work is performed for or under the control of the parent/guardian and is performed upon or in connection with premises the parent/guardian owns, operates, or controls; or is otherwise exempted by law.

Persons Authorized to Issue Work Permits

The following individuals are authorized to issue a work permit to a student in the district: (Education Code 49110)

- 1. The Superintendent
- 2. An employee holding a services credential with a specialization in pupil personnel services or a certificated work experience education teacher or coordinator, when authorized by the Superintendent in writing
- 3. A principal, or another school administrator designated by the principal, provided that the principal or designee:
 - a. Provides a self-certification that the principal or designee understands the requirements of law for issuing a work permit
 - b. Does not issue a work permit to the principal's or designee's own child

If the person designated to issue work permits is not available and delay in issuing a permit would jeopardize a student's ability to secure work, the Superintendent may temporarily authorize another person to issue the permit. (Education Code 49110)

Application

The student's parent/guardian, foster parent, caregiver with whom the student resides, or residential shelter services provider shall file a written request for a work permit. (Education Code 49110)

The request for a work permit shall be submitted to the Superintendent or designee on a form approved by the California Department of Education (CDE).

If the student is applying for a full-time work permit, the student and the student's parent/guardian shall generally be required to appear before, and submit the application to, the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 49132)

The Superintendent or designee shall, before or at the time of signing the work permit, issue the student a document clearly explaining basic labor rights extended to workers, as specified in Education Code 49110.5.

In the event of an extended physical closure of the campus due to a natural disaster, pandemic, or other emergency, the required documentation, including signatures, may be collected electronically. In addition, if the application is for a full-time work permit, the student and parent/guardian shall not be required to appear in person before the Superintendent or designee if the completed application has been successfully submitted electronically and the student and

parent/guardian have attended a video conference with the person issuing the work permit. (Education Code 49132, 49200)

Approval Process

The Superintendent or designee shall have discretion to determine whether to issue the work permit.

In determining whether to approve a work permit, the Superintendent or designee shall verify the student's date of birth, the type of work permit to be issued, and whether the student meets any other criteria established by the Governing Board. The Superintendent or designee may inspect the student's records and/or may confer with at least one of the student's teachers for evidence of satisfactory grades and school attendance and to determine whether the student possesses the motivation and maturity to maintain academic progress while working.

However, a work permit shall not be denied based on a student's grades, grade point average, or school attendance under either of the following circumstances: (Education Code 49120, 49200)

- 1. The student's school has been physically closed for an extended time due to a natural disaster, pandemic, or other emergency
- 2. The student is applying for a work permit in order to participate in a government-administered employment and training program that will occur during the regular summer recess or vacation of the student's school

Students shall not be approved to work in environments declared hazardous or dangerous for young workers or otherwise prohibited by child labor laws. (Labor Code 1290-1298; 29 CFR 570.33, 570.50-570.72)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the requested work hours do not exceed the maximum work hours specified in law based on the student's age and whether the employment will occur while school is in session. (Education Code 49111, 49112, 49116; Labor Code 1391-1391.1; 29 CFR 570.35)

Full-time employment may be authorized for students 14-17 years of age in accordance with Education Code 49130-49135.

All work permits shall be issued on forms provided by or authorized by CDE. (Education Code 49117)

Each permit shall authorize work for a specific employer. Whenever a student changes employers,

the student shall request a new permit.

The student may be issued more than one work permit if the student works concurrently for more than one employer, provided that the total number of hours worked does not exceed the total number of hours allowed by law and the district.

Whenever a work permit is issued by a principal or other designated school administrator, the principal or designee shall submit to the Superintendent a copy of the work permit issued, along with a copy of the application and a self-certification that the principal or designee understands the requirements in existing law for issuing a work permit. (Education Code 49110)

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically inspect the grades and attendance records of students granted work permits to ensure maintenance of academic progress and any additional criteria established in Board policy.

Expiration of Work Permits

Work permits issued during the school year shall expire five days after the opening of the next succeeding school year. (Education Code 49118)

Before the work permit expires, a student may apply for a renewed work permit in accordance with the procedures specified in "Approval Process" above.

Revocation of Work Permits

The Superintendent or designee shall revoke a student's work permit whenever the Superintendent or designee determines that the employment is impairing the health or education of the student, any provision or condition of the permit is being violated, the student is performing work in violation of law, or any condition for the issuance of the permit no longer exists or never existed. (Education Code 49116, 49164; Labor Code 1300)

The Superintendent may revoke a work permit issued by a principal of a public or private school located within the district if the Superintendent becomes aware of any grounds upon which the student may be deemed ineligible for a work permit under law. (Education Code 49110)

Retention of Records

In accordance with Administrative Regulation 3580 - District Records, the Superintendent or designee shall retain a copy of the work permit application and the work permit until the end of the fourth year after the work permit was issued. (5 CCR 16026)

Regulation 6178.1: Work-Based Learning

Work Experience Education

The district's work experience education (WEE) program shall consist of one or more of the following types of unpaid and paid on-the-job experiences: (5 CCR 10071)

- 1. Exploratory WEE, which provides students with a combination of related classroom instruction in WEE and unpaid opportunities to observe and sample systematically a variety of conditions of work for the purpose of ascertaining their interest and suitability for the occupation they are exploring
 - The length of exploratory WEE assignments may vary depending on the aptitude of the student, the occupation being explored, the facilities of the work station, and the job classification. A student may not participate in an exploratory WEE assignment if the student receives pay for like work at the same work station or similar job outside of the WEE program.
- 2. General WEE, which has as its purpose the application of basic skills of reading, writing, and computation and which provides students an opportunity to acquire general and specific occupational skills through a combination of supervised paid employment in any occupational field and related classroom instruction in WEE
- 3. Career technical WEE, which reinforces and extends career learning opportunities for students through a combination of related classroom instruction in WEE and supervised paid or unpaid employment in the occupation for which their career technical course in school prepares them

The student-teacher ratio in any WEE program shall not exceed 125 students per full-time equivalent certificated teacher-coordinator. (Education Code 46300)

The minimum day for students enrolled in a WEE program shall be four periods totaling at least 180 minutes in duration, unless the school or student meets one of the conditions specified in Education Code 46144 or 46147. (Education Code 46144, 46147)

A WEE program offered during the summer shall be conducted in the same time period as the regular summer school program and shall conform to all appropriate laws and regulations applicable to WEE.

Each WEE program shall operate under the supervision of a teacher-coordinator. The teacher-coordinator shall prepare individual training plans, observe and consult with students, and make at least two on-site contacts per semester with each work supervisor and at least one on-site contact during summer school to evaluate student performance. (Education Code 51764; 5 CCR 10074)

Any student who is 16 years of age or older and who satisfactorily completes a WEE program with a minimum of one instructional period per week of related classroom instruction or counseling by a certificated employee, in sessions scheduled intermittently throughout the semester, shall be granted up to 40 semester periods of credit for WEE within the following limits: (Education Code 51760.3; 5 CCR 1635)

- 1. For exploratory WEE, the student may earn 10 semester periods for each semester, with a maximum of 20 semester periods earned in two semesters
- 2. For either general or career technical WEE, the student may earn 10 semester periods for each semester, with a maximum of 40 semester periods

Any student who satisfies the above requirements but is under 16 years of age may be granted credit under any of the following conditions: (Education Code 51760.3)

- 1. The student is enrolled in grade 11 or higher
- 2. The principal certifies that the student is in need of immediate work experience education in order to pursue employment opportunities
- The principal certifies that, without being provided an opportunity to enroll in the WEE program, there is a high probability that the student will no longer be enrolled as a fulltime student
- 4. The student is at least 14 years of age and the principal certifies that such credit is necessary for the student's participation in a career technical education (CTE) program
- 5. The student has an individualized education program that prescribes the type of training for which participation in a WEE program is deemed appropriate

Cooperative Career Technical Education Program/Community Classrooms

To be eligible for program participation, a student shall be concurrently enrolled in a CTE course or program approved by the California Department of Education. (5 CCR 10082, 10103)

Additionally, to be eligible for participation in the cooperative CTE program, a student shall: (5 CCR 10103)

1. Be at least 16 years of age, unless the principal determines that the program is appropriate for a younger student due to the student's financial, motivational, or other exceptional needs

- 2. Be a full-time student, as defined
- 3. Have parent/guardian consent if under 18 years of age

At least one instructional period per week of formal CTE classroom instruction shall be provided to participating students. A minimum of three CTE instructional periods shall be provided per week. Each of the CTE instructional periods shall be at least 50 minutes. (5 CCR 10085, 10106)

Teachers assigned to the program shall locate and select training stations to provide participating students with unpaid on-the-job learning experiences in the specific occupation related to the approved course or program. (5 CCR 10086, 10107)

OPTION 1: (Cooperative CTE Program)

Formal related vocational classroom instruction shall be concurrent and directly related to the paid on-the-job training of students and organized to ensure that each student will have sufficient number of hours of related classroom instruction and on-the-job training experience to provide the student with those competencies necessary for employment and advancement in the occupational area for which training is offered. (5 CCR 10106)

The cooperative CTE program teacher shall make at least one visitation every four weeks to each employer to ensure that the provisions of the training agreement are being met and that students are acquiring the competencies identified in their individual training plans. One out of every two visits to the training station shall include an observation of the student engaged in on-the-job training experiences. (5 CCR 10109)

OPTION 1 ENDS HERE

OPTION 2: (Community Classrooms)

Formal related concurrent vocational classroom instruction shall be based on the skills, knowledges, attitudes, and related performance levels in the occupation for which training is conducted. (5 CCR 10085)

The community classroom teacher shall make at least one visitation every three weeks to consult with the supervisor or manager in accordance with 5 CCR 10088, observe students at the training station, provide instruction, and ensure that students are acquiring the competencies identified in their individual training plans. Each visitation shall include an observation of the student engaged in unpaid on-the-job training experiences. (5 CCR 10088)

OPTION 2 ENDS HERE

Students shall be granted academic credit for satisfactory completion of the program. The teacher shall be responsible for evaluating the student's performance in the CTE course and, with the assistance of the employer, the student's participation at the training station. (5 CCR 10081,

Job Shadowing

The program coordinator shall identify job shadowing placements with the goal of providing students with exposure to a broad range of career options and employment settings.

The program coordinator shall supervise job shadowing activities, including the coordination of the student's and employer's schedules and consultation with the student's other teachers when necessary.

Participating students may attend job shadowing opportunities for three to 25 hours in one semester, intersession, or summer school session. However, a student may be permitted to participate for up to 40 hours in one semester, intersession, or summer school session, if the principal certifies that it is necessary for the student's participation in a CTE program. (Education Code 51769)

Regulation 5142: Safety Status: ADOPTED

At each school, the principal or designee shall establish emergency procedures, rules for student conduct, and rules for the safe and appropriate use of school facilities, equipment, and materials, consistent with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. The rules shall be communicated to students, distributed to parents/guardians, and readily available at the school at all times.

Release of Students

Students shall be released during the school day only to the custody of an adult who is one of the following:

- 1. The student's custodial parent/guardian
- 2. An adult authorized in the district's student information system as an individual to whom the student may be released when the custodial parent/guardian cannot be reached, provided the principal or designee verifies the adult's identity
- 3. An authorized law enforcement officer acting in accordance with law
- 4. An adult taking the student to emergency medical care at the request of the principal or designee

Supervision of Students

Teachers shall be present at their respective rooms and shall open them to admit students not less than 30 minutes before the time that school starts. (5 CCR 5570)

Every teacher shall hold students to a strict account for their conduct on the way to and from school, on the playgrounds, and during recess. (Education Code 44807)

The principal or designee shall require all individuals supervising students to remain alert for unauthorized persons and dangerous conditions, and promptly report any unusual incidents to the principal or designee and file a written report as appropriate.

Any certificated or classified employee, or other school official, whose duties bring the employee or other school official in contact on a regular basis with students in any of grades 6-12, as part of a middle of high school, who are alerted to or observe any threat or perceived threat of a

homicidal act, as defined, shall immediately report the threat or perceived threat to law enforcement in accordance with Education Code 49393. (Education Code 49390, 49393)

Threat or perceived threat means any writing or action of a student that creates a reasonable suspicion that the student is preparing to commit a homicidal act related to school or a school activity. This may include possession, use, or depictions of firearms, ammunition, shootings, or targets in association with infliction of physical harm, destruction, or death in a social media post, journal, class note, or other media associated with the student. It may also include a warning by a parent, student, or other individual. (Education Code 49390)

Additionally, anyone who receives or learns of a health or safety threat related to school or a school activity is encouraged to report the threat to a school or district administrator.

In arranging for appropriate supervision on playgrounds, the principal or designee shall:

- 1. Clearly identify supervision zones and require all playground supervisors to remain at a location from which they can observe their entire zone of supervision and be observed by students in the supervision zone
- 2. Consider the size of the playground area, the number of areas that are obstructed from open view, and the age of the students to determine the ratio of playground supervisors to students

At any school where playground supervision is not otherwise provided, the principal or designee shall provide for certificated employees to supervise the conduct and safety, and direct the play, of students who are on school grounds before and after school and during recess and other intermissions. (5 CCR 5552)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers, teacher aides, playground supervisors, yard aides, and volunteers who supervise students receive training in safety practices and in supervisory techniques that will help prevent problems and resolve conflicts among students. Additionally, all staff and other school officials shall be made aware of their responsibilities regarding the reporting of potential homicidal acts to law enforcement, and receive training in the assessment and reporting of such threats. The training shall be documented and kept on file.

Student Identification Cards and Safety Information

Student identification cards of students in grades 7-12 shall have printed on them the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline and the National Domestic Violence Hotline (1-800-799-7233). Additionally, student identification cards of students in grades 7-12 may have printed on them a quick response (QR) code that links to the county's mental health resources website. (Education Code 215.5)

Student Safety Patrols

A school safety patrol shall be composed of students of the school selected by the principal or designee and shall be allowed to serve only with written consent of the students and the student's

parents/guardians. Patrol members shall be at least 10 years of age and in the fifth grade. (Education Code 49302; 5 CCR 571)

School safety patrols shall be used only at those locations where the nature of traffic will permit their safe operation. The locations where school safety patrols are used should be determined jointly with the local law enforcement agency. (5 CCR 572)

Patrol members shall be under the supervision and control of the principal or designee and shall receive training in proper procedures, including, but not limited to, the operations specified in 5 CCR 573-574. Whenever on duty, patrol members shall wear the standard uniform required by 5 CCR 576.

Playground Safety

Any new playground or any replacement of equipment or modification of components inside an existing playground shall conform to standards set forth by the American Society for Testing and Materials and the guidelines set forth by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission. The Superintendent or designee shall have a playground safety inspector certified by the National Playground Safety Institute conduct an initial inspection to aid compliance with applicable safety standards. (Health and Safety Code 115725)

The Superintendent or designee may permit students to avoid overexposure to sun when they are outdoors and evaluate the adequacy of shade in playground areas in accordance with Board Policy 5141.7 - Sun Safety.

Activities with Safety Risks

Due to concerns about the risk to student safety, the principal or designee shall not permit the following activities on campus or during district-sponsored events unless the activity is properly supervised, students wear protective gear as appropriate, and each participant has insurance coverage:

- 1. Trampolining
- 2. Scuba diving
- 3. Skateboarding or use of scooters
- 4. In-line or roller skating or use of skate shoes
- 5. Sailing, boating, or water skiing
- 6. Cross-country or downhill skiing

- 7. Motorcycling
- 8. Target shooting
- 9. Horseback riding
- 10. Rodeo
- 11. Archery
- 12. Mountain bicycling
- 13. Rock climbing
- 14. Rocketeering
- 15. Surfing
- 16. Body Contact Sports
- 17. Other activities determined by the principal to have a high risk to student safety

As needed, the Superintendent or designee may periodically provide training or instruction to students on the safe use of electric, motorized or nonmotorized bicycles, scooters, skateboards, and roller skates. Any student who rides a bicycle, scooter, skateboard, or roller skates to school shall wear a properly fitted and fastened bicycle helmet.

Events In or Around a Swimming Pool

When any on-campus event that is not part of an interscholastic athletic program is sponsored or hosted by the district and is to be held in or around a swimming pool, at least one adult with a valid certification of cardiopulmonary resuscitation training shall be present throughout the duration of the event. (Education Code 35179.6)

Laboratory Safety

The principal of each school offering laboratory work shall develop procedures for laboratory safety and designate a trained certificated employee to regularly review, update, and implement these procedures.

Students in a laboratory shall be under the supervision of a certificated employee. Students shall be taught laboratory safety, and safety guidelines and procedures shall be posted in science classrooms. Students shall receive continual reminders about general and specific hazards.

Hazardous materials shall be properly used, stored, and disposed of in accordance with law and

the district's chemical hygiene plan.

Bloodborne pathogens shall be handled in accordance with the district's exposure control plan.

The district's emergency plan, emergency contact numbers, and first aid supplies shall be readily accessible.

Parents/guardians shall be made aware of the kinds of laboratory activities that will be conducted during the school year.

Hearing Protection

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor students' exposure to excessive noise in classrooms and provide protection as necessary. The Superintendent or designee may also provide hearing conservation education to teach students ways to protect their hearing.

Eye Safety Devices

The Superintendent or designee shall provide schools with eye safety devices for use whenever students, teachers, or visitors are engaged in or observing an activity or using hazardous substances likely to cause injury to the eyes. Eye safety devices may be sold to students for an amount not to exceed the actual cost to the district. (Education Code 32030, 32031, 32033)

Protection Against Insect Bites

To help protect students against insect bites or stings that may spread disease or cause allergic reactions, students shall be allowed to apply insect repellent provided by their parents/guardians, when engaging in outdoor activities. Any application of insect repellent shall occur under the supervision of school personnel, and in accordance with the manufacturer's directions.

Regulation 5113.12: District School Attendance Review Board

Original Adopted Date: 10/01/2017 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date:

Upon receiving a referral of a student with attendance and/or behavior problems, a designated member of the school attendance review board (SARB) shall review the case and may meet with school personnel to determine whether the school has provided sufficient information about the student's attendance record or behavior. If the referral is complete and is an appropriate matter for the SARB to consider, the SARB chairperson shall provide written notification to the student's parents/guardians stating the reasons a referral has been made, explaining the SARB process, advising whether additional information is needed, and describing school-level interventions that have previously been attempted.

The SARB shall meet with the student and the student's parents/guardians, give them an opportunity to present their understanding of the problem, and discuss the school and/or community resources appropriate for the student's circumstances.

In accordance with Board Bylaw 9321 - Closed Session, any SARB meeting to consider matters related to an individual student shall be held in closed session unless the parent/guardian requests, in writing, that the meeting be held in open session.

The SARB shall have access to relevant student records, but shall not provide access to others without written consent of the student's parent/guardian. (Education Code 49076)

For the limited purpose of making a proper disposition of the referral of a student, the SARB may issue subpoenas pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure 1985-1997, or may request the juvenile court to issue subpoenas to require the attendance of the student, parents/guardians or other person having control of the student, the school authority referring the student, or any other person who has pertinent or material information concerning the matter. The SARB shall not issue any subpoena that includes a request for production of written materials, but may request a juvenile court to issue such subpoena for the production of written materials. (Education Code 48263, 48321.5)

The SARB shall issue written directives stating the responsibilities of all persons involved, detailed resource referrals, and follow-up dates for the school's reports on the student's progress. The written directives shall include an agreement that the student will attend school or improve classroom behavior as applicable, and shall be signed by the student, the student's parents/guardians, the SARB chairperson, and the Superintendent or designee.

When referred by the SARB, a student may be assigned to a community day school or a county community school. (Education Code 1981, 48662)

At any time it deems proper, the SARB may require the student or the student's parents/guardians to furnish satisfactory evidence of participation in any available community services that the student or parents/guardians have been directed to use. (Education Code 48263)

Based on progress reports submitted by the school, the SARB may terminate the agreement upon the successful completion of the terms of the agreement, extend the time for completion of the agreement, or schedule another meeting with the student and the student's parents/guardians.

If the student's attendance or behavior problems cannot be resolved by the SARB, or if the student and/or the student's parents/guardians continually and willfully fail to respond to SARB directives or the services provided, the student or parents/guardians shall be referred to the appropriate agency, including law enforcement agencies when necessary. (Education Code 48263, 48290-48291)

Regulation 3516.1: Fire Drills And Fires

Fire Drills

The principal shall cause the fire alarm signal to be sounded at least once every month. (Education Code 32001)

The principal shall hold the first emergency evacuation drill of each school year within 10 days of the beginning of classes. (24 CCR 403.4.2)

Additionally, the principal shall hold fire drills at least once a month at the elementary level, four times every school year at the intermediate level, and not less than twice every school year at the secondary level. (Education Code 32001)

When the principal conducts a fire drill, all students, teachers, and other employees shall be directed to leave the building, which may include: (5 CCR 550)

- 1. Notifying staff as to the schedule for fire drills
- 2. Ascertaining that no student remains in the building

As appropriate, teachers shall be prepared to select alternate exits and direct their classes to these exits whenever the designated escape route is blocked.

The principal or designee shall keep a record of each fire drill conducted and file a copy of this record with the office of the Superintendent or designee.

Fires

The district shall identify refuge shelters for all students and staff to be used in the event of an evacuation order by local authorities and notify the fire department or other appropriate local authority of such refuge to prioritize the safety of students and staff. (Education Code 32282)

The identification of refuge shelters at schools in a high or very high fire hazard severity zone shall be coordinated with the fire department or other appropriate local authority. Additionally, each school in a high or very high fire hazard severity zone shall prepare a communication and

evacuation plan to be used in the event of an early notice evacuation warning which allows enough time to evacuate all students and staff. (Education Code 32282)

When a fire is discovered in any part of the school, the following actions shall be taken:

- 1. The principal or designee shall sound fire signals, unless the school and/or building is equipped with an automatic fire detection and alarm system (Education Code 32001)
- 2. The principal or designee shall call 911
- 3. All persons shall be directed to leave the building and shall proceed outside to designated assembly areas
- 4. Staff shall give students clear direction and supervision and help maintain a calm and orderly response
- 5. In outside assembly areas, teachers shall take roll, report missing students, and provide assistance to any injured students
- 6. In outside assembly areas, the principal, designee and/or each department head shall account for their staff, report missing staff, and provide assistance to any injured staff
- 7. If the fire is extensive, students shall be taken to an alternate location for protective custody until parents/guardians can pick them up or until they can be safely transported to their homes

Policy 6178.1: Work-Based Learning

Original Adopted Date: 03/01/2008 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 09/01/2025

The Governing Board desires to improve student educational outcomes and successes and support student workforce preparedness by facilitating work-based learning opportunities which link classroom learning with real-world experiences. The district's work-based learning program shall be designed to teach students the skills, attitudes, and knowledge necessary for successful employment and to reinforce mastery of both academic and career technical education (CTE) standards.

The district's work-based learning program may offer opportunities for paid and/or unpaid work experiences, including, but not limited to:

- 1. Work experience education as defined in Education Code 51764
- 2. Cooperative CTE or community classrooms as defined in Education Code 52372.1
- 3. Job shadowing experience as defined in Education Code 51769
- 4. Student internships
- 5. Apprenticeships
- 6. Service learning
- 7. Employment in social/civic or school-based enterprises
- 8. Technology-based or other simulated work experiences

The Superintendent or designee may provide students employment opportunities with public and private employers in areas within or outside the district, including in any contiguous state. (Education Code 51768)

The Board may elect to pay wages to students participating in a work-based learning program, but shall not make payments to or for private employers except for students with disabilities who are participating in work experience education programs funded by the state for such students. (Education Code 51768)

Any district plan for work-based learning shall be submitted to the Board for approval. When required, the plan shall be submitted to the California Department of Education or other state

agency or official.

The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with businesses, government agencies, postsecondary institutions including universities and career technical schools, community organizations, and/or other employers in planning and implementing work-based learning opportunities that support the district's vision and goals for student learning and local workforce development efforts.

At the beginning of the first semester or quarter of the regular school term, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of students in grades 11-12 about local apprenticeship and pre-apprenticeship programs and make the Division of Apprenticeship Standards' database accessible through a direct link on the district's website. (Education Code 48980.5)

In accordance with Board Policy 6178 - Career Technical Education, the district may provide students with opportunities to explore, make career choices, and seek appropriate instruction and training to support those choices, by hosting locally focused apprenticeship and/or career technical education fair events.

As specified in Board Policy 6142.94 - History-Social Science Instruction, the district shall annually observe "Workplace Readiness Week." (Education Code 49110.5)

When required by law, the Superintendent or designee shall develop a written training agreement with the employer that describes the conditions and requirements to be met by all parties and shall develop an individual training plan for each student which outlines the objectives or competencies that the student is expected to accomplish at the work site. (5 CCR 10070-10071, 10087, 10108)

To ensure appropriate guidance and supervision of participating students and maximize the educational benefit from placement in any work-based learning program, district staff shall coordinate with the workplace supervisors or mentors.

A minor student shall be allowed employment through a paid work-based learning program only if the student has been issued a work permit, in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. (Education Code 49113, 49160)

All laws or rules applicable to minors in employment relationships shall be applicable to students enrolled in work-based learning programs. (Education Code 51763)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any student participating in a work-based learning program off school grounds is covered under the employer's or district's insurance, as

applicable, in the event the student is injured.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any teacher-coordinator of a work-based learning program possesses the appropriate experience and credential issued by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing. (5 CCR 10075, 10080, 10100)

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records related to each student's participation in the district's work-based learning program, including, but not limited to, the student's individualized training plan, employment hours and job site, work permit if applicable, the employer's report of student's attendance and job performance, the teacher-coordinator's consultations and observations, and reports of the student's grade and credits earned.

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report to the Board regarding program implementation and effectiveness, including, but not limited to, rates of student participation in work-based learning programs and assessment results of participating students.

Policy 3515: Campus Security

Original Adopted Date: 03/01/2007 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 09/01/2025

The Governing Board is committed to providing a school environment that promotes the safety of students, staff, and visitors to school grounds. The Board also recognizes the importance of protecting district property, facilities, and equipment from vandalism and theft.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop campus security procedures, which may be included in the district's comprehensive safety plan and/or site-level safety plans. Such procedures shall be regularly reviewed to reflect changed circumstances and to assess their effectiveness in achieving safe school objectives.

Additionally, the Superintendent or designee shall regularly review current guidance regarding cybersecurity and digital media awareness and incorporate recommended practices into the district's processes and procedures related to the protection of the district's network infrastructure, and the monitoring and response to suspicious and/or threatening digital media content.

Reporting and Responding to Threats

Any certificated or classified employee, or other school official, whose duties bring the employee or other school official in contact on a regular basis with students in any of grades 6-12, as part of a middle or high school, who are alerted to or observe any threat or perceived threat of a homicidal act, as defined, shall immediately report the threat or perceived threat to law enforcement in accordance with Education Code 49393. (Education Code 49390, 49393)

Threat or perceived threat means any writing or action of a student that creates a reasonable suspicion that the student is preparing to commit a homicidal act related to school or a school activity. This may include possession, use, or depictions of firearms, ammunition, shootings, or targets in association with infliction of physical harm, destruction, or death in a social media post, journal, class note, or other media associated with the student. It may also include a warning by a parent, student, or other individual. (Education Code 49390)

Additionally, anyone who receives or learns of a health or safety threat related to school or a school activity is encouraged to report the threat to a school or district administrator.

The Superintendent or designee may form a multidisciplinary team in order to identify, inquire, assess, and manage potentially threating student behavior.

Surveillance Systems

In consultation with the district's school site council, safety planning committee, other relevant stakeholders, and staff, the Superintendent or designee shall identify appropriate locations for the placement of surveillance cameras. Cameras shall not be placed in areas where students, staff, or community members have a reasonable expectation of privacy. Any audio capability on the district's surveillance equipment shall be disabled so that sounds are not recorded.

Prior to the operation of the surveillance system, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that signs are posted at conspicuous and targeted locations around school buildings and grounds. Such signs shall state that the facility uses video surveillance equipment for security purposes and that the equipment may or may not be actively monitored at any time. The Superintendent or designee shall also provide prior written notice to students and parents/guardians about the district's surveillance system, including the locations where surveillance may occur and that the recordings may be used in disciplinary proceedings and/or referred to local law enforcement, as appropriate.

To the extent that any images from the district's surveillance system create a student or personnel record, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the images are accessed, retained, and disclosed in accordance with law, Board policy, administrative regulation, and any applicable collective bargaining agreement(s).

Policy 5113: Absences And Excuses

Original Adopted Date: 11/01/1999 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 09/01/2025

The Governing Board believes that regular attendance plays an important role in student achievement. The Board shall work with parents/guardians and students to ensure their compliance with all state attendance laws and may use appropriate legal means to correct problems of chronic absence or truancy.

In accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation, absence from school shall be excused only for health reasons, family emergencies, and justifiable personal reasons as specified in Education Code 48205, and work in the entertainment or allied industry as permitted pursuant to Education Code 48225.5.

When a student's absence from school is excused, the student's teacher shall determine identical or reasonably equivalent assignments and tests to those missed during the absence which the student shall be permitted to complete for full credit within a reasonable amount of time as determined by the teacher. (Education Code 48205, 48225.5)

Student absence for religious instruction or participation in religious exercises away from school property may be considered excused subject to law and administrative regulation. (Education Code 46014)

Because school attendance and class participation are integral to students' learning experiences, parents/guardians and students shall be encouraged to schedule medical and other appointments during non-school hours.

Students shall not be absent from school without their parents/guardians' knowledge or consent, except in cases of medical emergency or, as authorized pursuant to Education Code 46010.1, for a confidential medical appointment.

The Board shall, by resolution entered into its minutes, approve reasonable methods that may be used to verify student absences due to illness or quarantine. (5 CCR 421)

Policy 5113.2: Work Permits

Original Adopted Date: 06/01/1995 | Last Revised Date: 09/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 09/01/2025

The Governing Board recognizes that part-time employment can provide students with income, job experience, and valuable life skills and should be permitted to the extent that such employment does not interfere with a student's education. Before accepting any offer of employment, district students who are minors shall obtain work permits from the Superintendent or designee, regardless of whether the employment will occur when school is in session, unless otherwise exempted by law.

Students with work permits shall be exempted from attendance in a full-time day school provided they attend part-time classes. (Education Code 48230)

In determining whether to grant or continue a work permit, the Superintendent or designee shall consider whether employment is likely to significantly interfere with the student's schoolwork. Students granted work permits shall be required to demonstrate and maintain a 2.0 grade point average and satisfactory school attendance, except during periods of extended school closure due to an emergency as described in Education Code 49200 and the accompanying administrative regulation. On a case-by-case basis, the Superintendent or designee may approve a maximum work hour limit that is lower than the limit specified in law and administrative regulation.

Work permits shall be limited to part-time employment as defined by law, except when the Superintendent or designee determines that circumstances warrant the granting of a permit for full-time employment.

Any student authorized to work full time when school is in session shall be enrolled in part-time continuation classes. Additionally, a student 14 or 15 years of age who receives a permit to work full time shall also be enrolled in a work experience education program. (Education Code 49130, 49131, 49135)
