2025-26 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT INITIATIVE (CEI) PEER LEADING AND LEARNING NETWORK (PLLN) DISTRICT/LEA AGREEMENT COHORT V AND/OR COHORT VI

This AGREEMENT is made by and among the Marin County Superintendent of Schools and the Marin County Office of Education (collectively, "Administrative Agent"), acting on behalf of the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence ("CCEE"), and El Tejon Unified ("DISTRICT"). Hereinafter, the Administrative Agent (on behalf of the CCEE) and DISTRICT shall be referred to collectively as "PARTIES."

Background

The Community Engagement Initiative ("CEI") was established by the California State Legislature and the Governor on June 27, 2018 (Section 140 of Assembly Bill No. 1808 ("AB 1808"), Chapter 32 of the Statutes of 2018) for the purpose of all of the following:

- Building capacity in communities and school districts to have difficult conversations with each other and build trust, with a focus on improving outcomes for pupils.
- Identifying effective models of community engagement and metrics to evaluate those models.
- (3) Developing effective peer-to-peer partnerships between school districts and county offices of education, utilizing the existing professional learning networks structure administered by the CCEE, to deepen community engagement using lessons learned from the work identified in paragraph (1) and the models identified in paragraph (2).
- (4) Scaling up the work identified in paragraphs (1), (2), and (3) to improve community engagement statewide and incorporate practices that prove effective towards school district and county office of education continuous improvement efforts.

Pursuant to AB 1808 and the resulting Request for Applications ("RFA"), the California Department of Education ("CDE") and the CCEE, with approval from the executive director of the State Board of Education ("SBE") selected the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools ("SBCSS"), Families In Schools ("FIS"), and the California Association for Bilingual Education ("CABE") as the expert Lead Agency Consortium, consistent with Section 52073.1 of the Education Code, to co-administer the CEI with the CCEE.

The CCEE and the Lead Agency Consortium were charged with soliciting teams to participate in the CEI and included professional learning networks. For the first professional learning network, they were required to select four to six geographically diverse teams that represent different regions of the state and include community members, pupils, school site staff and leadership, school district staff and leadership, and county office of education staff and leadership affiliated with a common single school district. In the selection process, AB 1808 required positive consideration be given to teams that are engaging in activities consistent with building capacity in communities and school districts to have difficult conversations with each other and build trust, with a focus on improving outcomes for pupils, and teams that have been successful in engaging community members that have not historically been engaged with their school district.

The 2022-23 Education Omnibus Budget Trailer Bill (Assembly Bill 181, Chapter 52 of the Statutes of 2022) funded and established an expansion of the CEI (now known as CEI 2.0). The initiative's next phase will be led by the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence (CCEE) in partnership with the San Diego County Office of Education (SDCOE), the University of San Diego (USD), and Eskolta School Research and Design, as the Lead Agency Consortium. The expansion will build on CEI 1.0's foundation to reach more California districts, schools, county offices, community partners, families, and students.

The PARTIES hereby agree as follows:

SECTION I: Privileges and Obligations of DISTRICT and DISTRICT TEAM MEMBERS, to be enforced by DISTRICT

- A. <u>Peer Leading and Learning Network</u>. DISTRICT agrees to participate in Cohort V and/or Cohort VI PLLN in pursuit of the statutorily-defined goals set forth above. Participating in the PLLN includes, but is not limited to, the following:
 - Organizing a team to participate in the Cohort V and/or Cohort VI PLLN through June 30, 2026, with a minimum of eight meetings per year. DISTRICT shall provide CCEE and LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM with a list of all 2025-26 DISTRICT TEAM MEMBERS no later than September 1, 2025. All DISTRICT TEAM MEMBERS shall participate in all PLLN meetings.
 - o If a DISTRICT TEAM MEMBER has a reasonable and irreconcilable conflict that prevents attendance at a meeting, the DISTRICT shall inform the CCEE (info@californiaengage.org) and LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM immediately and seek a replacement who can fill the vacated role. DISTRICT shall secure a replacement for any DISTRICT TEAM MEMBER who is unable to continue participating in the PLLN within one month of the TEAM MEMBER providing notice of withdrawal, and, in such a circumstance, shall notify the CCEE and LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM of any proposed replacement with sufficient time for them to ensure the proposed replacement meets all participant requirements.
 - o If a DISTRICT TEAM misses a meeting, the DISTRICT shall confer with the CCEE and LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM to determine whether continued participation in the PLLN is appropriate or if this AGREEMENT should be terminated. If a DISTRICT TEAM misses two meetings, this AGREEMENT shall be terminated pursuant to Section III.E below unless the CCEE and LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM determines an exception is warranted.
 - Communicating regularly with the CCEE and LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM regarding the PLLN, including reading, and responding promptly to, all PLLN-related communications from the CCEE and LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM.
 - Responding to all research inquiries regarding the CEI and the PLLN from, or facilitated by, the CCEE, the LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM, or anyone conducting an evaluation on behalf of the CCEE and/or LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM. Inquiries may include, but are not limited to, surveys, focus groups, and end-of-year reflection documents.
 - Permitting any CCEE or LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM staff member or representative to attend all
 or part of any DISTRICT team meeting.
 - Sharing resources developed through engagement in the PLLN with the CCEE, LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM and future CEI PLLNs.

- Engaging in open dialogue on issues related to improving local pupil outcomes. Individual DISTRICT TEAM MEMBERS will be expected to share professional and personal experiences related to topics within the scope of the CEI and its goals to support the success of the PLLN.
- Partnering with other communities and school districts on improving community engagement.
- Actively supporting the goals and objectives of the PLLN.
- Keeping DISTRICT's governing board regularly informed of the DISTRICT's engagement in the PLLN as needed.
- Providing meeting space at a DISTRICT school site (or a nearby location accessible to all TEAM MEMBERS) for PLLN meetings that is video-conference capable at no cost for any participant, when necessary.
- Pursuant to Education Code Section 52073.3 (f)(3A), the CEI shall support the districts/LEA's Community Engagement/Community School efforts, and team members' participation in the CEI (including internal staff, family/caregivers, community-based organizations, etc.)
- B. <u>Content License</u>. DISTRICT agrees to grant CCEE, LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM, and all participants in current and future CEI PLLNs a free, transferable, non-exclusive license to use, reproduce, and distribute all information and content created by the DISTRICT or DISTRICT TEAM MEMBERS and presented or distributed at a PLLN meeting or as part of communications with or between PLLN participants provided (i) the use, reproduction, and distribution is limited to educational and training purposes, (ii) the information and content is not sold, reproduced, or used, in whole or in part, as part of any fee-generating activity or product, and (iii) the DISTRICT or TEAM MEMBER, as appropriate, is identified as the creator and/or owner of the information and content by including the appropriate name or logo on the information or content. The information and content produced, either in whole or in part, by a DISTRICT or TEAM MEMBER and presented or distributed at a PLLN meeting or as part of communications with or between PLLN participants shall not be copyrighted or patented by anyone other than the owner.
- C. <u>Assignment</u>. Neither this AGREEMENT nor any duties or obligations under this AGREEMENT may be assigned by DISTRICT without the prior written consent of CCEE. Any assignment or purported assignment of this AGREEMENT by DISTRICT without prior written consent of CCEE will be deemed void and of no force or effect.
- D. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>. DISTRICT covenants, by itself and on behalf of its officers and directors, that it presently has no financial interest, including but not limited to, other projects or independent contracts, and shall not acquire any such interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the satisfaction of the obligations under this AGREEMENT. DISTRICT further covenants, by itself and on behalf of its officers and directors, that in satisfying this AGREEMENT, no person having any such interest shall knowingly be employed or retained by it under this AGREEMENT.
- E. Non-Discrimination. Neither DISTRICT, nor any officer, agent, employee, or subcontractor of DISTRICT shall discriminate in the provision of services, allocation of benefits, accommodation in facilities, or employment of personnel on the basis of ethnic group identification, race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, military and veteran status, or any other characteristic protected by law, in the performance of this AGREEMENT. To the extent they shall be found to be applicable hereto, DISTRICT and any officer, agent, employee, or subcontractor of DISTRICT shall comply with the provisions of Section 508 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Federal Civil

Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 88-352), the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. §1210 et seq.), and the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Gov. Code §12900 et seq.), the regulations promulgated thereunder (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 2, §11000 et seq.), the provisions of Article 9.5, Chapter 1, Part 1, Division 3, Title 2 of the Government Code (Gov. Code §§11135-11139.5), and the regulations or standards adopted by the awarding state agency to implement such article.

F. <u>Insurance Requirements</u>. DISTRICT shall, at DISTRICT'S expense, procure and maintain for the duration of this AGREEMENT general liability, workers' compensation, if required by applicable law, automobile liability and other insurance to protect against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the Services or this AGREEMENT by DISTRICT and DISTRICT'S Subcontractors, officers, employees, agents, or representatives. MCOE/CCEE in no way represents or warrants that the insurance required under this Section F is sufficient to protect DISTRICT for liabilities that may arise from or relate to this AGREEMENT.

The general liability insurance shall have a per-occurrence limit of not less than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000). All such insurance will be equivalent to coverage offered by a commercial general liability form, including, without implied limitation, personal injury and contractual liability coverage for the performance by Provider of the indemnity provisions set forth in this AGREEMENT.

The workers' compensation insurance, if required by applicable law, shall insure DISTRICT'S obligations and liabilities under the workers' compensation laws of California, including, without implied limitation, employer's liability insurance in the limits required by the laws of California.

- G. <u>Invoicing</u>. To defray some of the costs of DISTRICT TEAM MEMBERS, including family/caregivers, students, community partners, and other non-district employees on the TEAM, participating in the Cohort V and/or Cohort VI PLLN meetings, DISTRICT may submit a quarterly invoice, along with supporting documentation, pursuant to activities outlined in Section I.A. of this AGREEMENT, which include the following:
 - Participation in Cohort V and/or Cohort VI PLLN Meetings
 - Provide resources and compensation for team members' participation in the CEI (including internal staff, family/caregivers, community-based organizations, etc.) pursuant to Education Code Section 52073.3 (f)(3A)

The sum of all invoices submitted by DISTRICT under this AGREEMENT shall not exceed \$70,000 for the 2025-2026 fiscal year. CCEE will provide an invoice template aligned with the following participation rate structure, applicable to eight meeting days total:

In Person and Virtual Participation Level	Rate per Cohort V and/or Cohort VI PLLN Meeting Day	Rate Description
Full Participation (70-100%)	\$8,750	At least 70% attendance and engagement with tools, resources, and activities (i.e. note catcher, end- of-year tracking)
Prorated Participation (<70%)	\$6,125	Partial attendance of team members per meeting and limited engagement

Invoices may be submitted at any time, but no later than 30 days after each quarter. The final invoice must be submitted within 30 calendar days after the termination date of this AGREEMENT and must be marked "FINAL"

by the DISTRICT. No payments will be made to the DISTRICT after this period. All invoices shall state the total amount for the invoice and be submitted via email to CCEE Accounts Payable at ap_ccee@ccee-ca.org. If requested by the Administrative Agent, DISTRICT shall provide additional documentation supporting an invoice.

SECTION II: Privileges and Obligations of CCEE/Administrative Agent

- A. <u>Funding</u>. In accordance with the invoicing provisions and requirements set forth in Section I.G. above, CCEE/Administrative Agent shall provide DISTRICT up to \$70,000, for satisfactory participation in the 2025-26 Cohort V and/or Cohort VI PLLN meetings.
 - Associated costs of services (e.g., copying and printing) shall be borne by DISTRICT or DISTRICT TEAM MEMBERS within the existing contract budget will not reimburse DISTRICT or DISTRICT TEAM MEMBERS for such expenses. Neither the Administrative Agent, nor the CCEE, nor the LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM has any financial obligation to DISTRICT or DISTRICT TEAM MEMBERS other than those detailed in this AGREEMENT. It is agreed between the PARTIES that this total amount may only be amended in writing by mutual agreement of the PARTIES. DISTRICT will be responsible for any costs related to satisfying this AGREEMENT beyond this sum.
- B. <u>Content License</u>. CCEE agrees to grant DISTRICT a free, non-transferable, non-assignable, non-exclusive license with respect to all information and content CCEE develops with or for use by LEAD AGENCY CONSORTIUM MEMBERS and/or PLLN participants provided (i) the use, reproduction, and distribution is limited to educational and training purposes and (ii) the information and content is not sold, reproduced, or used, in whole or in part, as part of any fee-generating activity or product.

SECTION III: Further agreement by all PARTIES

- A. Term. The term of this AGREEMENT shall be from <u>September 1, 2025</u> through <u>June 30, 2026</u>.
- B. <u>Partial Satisfaction</u>. Acceptance by all PARTIES of some obligations to be satisfied under this AGREEMENT does not operate as a release from any remaining obligations under this AGREEMENT.
- C. Independent Contractor. It is agreed that DISTRICT and all officers, employees and agents of DISTRICT are acting as an independent contractor of CCEE/Administrative Agent and not as a partner, joint venturer, agent or employee of Administrative Agent or CCEE. Personnel tasked by each DISTRICT with ensuring satisfaction of the obligations under this AGREEMENT shall at all times be under the DISTRICT'S exclusive direction and control. DISTRICT shall pay all the wages, salaries and other amounts due such personnel in connection with satisfying its obligations under this AGREEMENT and as required by law. DISTRICT shall be responsible for all reports and obligations respecting such personnel, including but not limited to, social security taxes, income tax withholdings, unemployment insurance, and workers' compensation insurance. It is further understood and agreed by the PARTIES hereto that DISTRICT in the satisfaction of its obligations hereunder is subject to the control or direction of CCEE/Administrative Agent merely as to the result to be accomplished by the obligations hereunder agreed to be rendered, performed, and satisfied, and not as to the means and methods for accomplishing the results. It is agreed that Administrative Agent/CCEE will not withhold any federal or state income tax from payment made pursuant to this AGREEMENT but will provide DISTRICT with a statement of payments upon request if necessary.
- D. No Third Party Beneficiaries. Nothing contained in this AGREEMENT shall create a contractual relationship with or a cause of action in favor of any third party against one or more of the PARTIES.

- E. <u>Termination</u>. Any of the PARTIES may terminate this AGREEMENT without cause upon 30 days written notice served upon all other PARTIES stating the effective date of termination. A notice of termination shall be effective when received.
- F. Waiver of Default. Any waiver by any of the PARTIES of any breach of any one or more of the terms of this AGREEMENT shall not be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent or other breach of the same or of any other term hereof. Failure on the part of any of the PARTIES to require exact, full and complete compliance with any terms of this AGREEMENT shall not be construed as in any manner changing the terms hereof, or stopping CCEE from enforcement hereof.

G. Force Majeure.

- In the event any DISTRICT is unable to comply with any provision of this AGREEMENT due to
 causes beyond its control such as acts of God, acts of war, civil disorders, flu pandemics, or
 other similar acts, no DISTRICT shall be held liable to CCEE for such failure to comply.
- In the event CCEE/Administrative Agent is unable to comply with any provision of this AGREEMENT due to causes beyond its control relating to acts of God, acts of war, civil disorders, flu pandemics, or other similar acts, CCEE shall not be held liable to any DISTRICT for such failure to comply.

ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS OF THIS AGREEMENT

5. Indemnification. Contractor agrees to defend, hold harmless, and indemnify Principal (and Principal's officers, employees, trustees, agents, successors, and assigns) against all claims, suits, expenses (including reasonable attorney fees), losses, penalties, fines, costs, and liability whether in contract, tort, or strict liability (including but not limited to personal injury, death at any time, and property damage) arising out of or made necessary by (A) Contractor's breach of the terms of this Agreement, (B) the act or omission of Contractor, its employees, officers, agents, and assigns in connection with performance of this Agreement, and (C) the presence of Contractor, its officers, employees, agents, assigns, or invitees on Principal's premises.

In the event that any action or proceeding is brought against Principal by reason of any claim or demand discussed in this section, upon notice from Principal, Contractor shall defend the action or proceeding at Contractor's expense through counsel reasonably satisfactory to Principal. The obligation to indemnify set forth in this section shall include reasonable attorney fees and investigation costs and all other reasonable costs, expenses, and liabilities from the first notice that any claim or demand is to be made.

Contractor's obligations under this section shall apply regardless of whether Principal (or any of its officers, employees, trustees, or agents) are actively or passively negligent, but shall not apply to any loss, liability, fine, penalty, forfeiture, cost, or damage determined by an arbitrator or court of competent jurisdiction to be caused solely by the active negligence or willful misconduct of Principal, its officers, employees, trustees, or agents.

6. Insurance Requirements. Contractor shall obtain, pay for, and maintain in effect during the life of this Agreement the following policies issued by an insurance company rated not less than "A-:VII" in Best Insurance Rating Guide and admitted to transact insurance business in California: (1) commercial general liability (including contractual, products, and completed operations coverages, bodily injury, and property damage liability) with combined single limits not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and not less than \$2,000,000 in the aggregate; (2) commercial automobile liability for "any auto" with combined single limits not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence; (3) professional liability (errors and omissions) with a limit of liability not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence; and (4) workers' compensation insurance as required under state law.

Each policy shall contain an endorsement naming Principal as an additional insured insofar as this Agreement is concerned, and provide that written notice shall be given to Principal at least 30 days prior to cancellation or material change in the form of the policy or reduction in coverage. Nothing in this section concerning minimum insurance requirements shall reduce Contractor's liability or obligations under the indemnification provisions of this Agreement.

The parties acknowledge that Contractor is permissibly self-insured under California law.

AGREEMENT FOR TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

This Agreement is made between Gorman Joint School District ("GJSD") and El Tejon Unified School District ("ETUSD") and is dated for reference August 20, 2025.

RECITALS

- ETUSD requires transportation services for up to 12 high school students attending ETUSD programs or schools.
- GJSD owns and operates transportation vehicles for student transportation needs.
- GJSD and ETUSD desire to enter into this Agreement for GJSD to provide transportation services for ETUSD students under the terms set forth below.
- This Agreement is intended to be the written agreement between the parties related to the transportation services to be provided during the referenced term.
- All students and parents are required to sign the GJSD transportation contract, and students must adhere to the rules outlined in the contract.
- 6. ETUSD students must sit in their assigned seats and follow the seating rules.

TERMS

1. Scope of Services

- GJSD will provide transportation services for ETUSD students according to mutually agreed-upon schedules and routes.
- Services include morning home-to-school transportation from the Neenach bus stop to ETUSD, and afternoon transportation from Gorman SD to Neenach.
- III. If the scheduled transportation date falls on a non-school day for GJSD, or if GJSD cancels school or transportation due to weather, emergencies, or other operational reasons, ETUSD shall be responsible for providing its own transportation for ETUSD students on those days.
- IV. This agreement shall remain in effect through the 2025-26 school year.

2. Term and Cost

- This Agreement shall be effective for the 2025–2026 school year, beginning July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2026 (180 School Days).
- II. The cost for services under this Agreement shall be \$5,500 per school year.

ETUSD shall furnish ETUSD with a certificate of insurance containing the endorsements required under this section, and ETUSD shall have the right to inspect GJSD 's original insurance policies upon request. Upon notification of receipt of a notice of cancellation, change, or reduction in coverage, ETUSD shall immediately file with ETUSD a certified copy of the required new or renewal policy and certificates for such policy.

III. Nothing in this section concerning minimum insurance requirements shall reduce GJSD's liability or obligations under the indemnification provisions of this Agreement.

<u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement is held by an arbitrator or court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of the Agreement shall continue in full force and effect and shall in no way be impaired or invalidated.

Governing Law. The rights and obligations of the parties and the interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of California, excluding any statute which directs application of the laws of another jurisdiction.

Notices. Any notice under this Agreement shall be in writing, and any written notice or other document shall be deemed to have been duly given on the date of personal service on the parties or on the second business day after mailing if the document is mailed by registered or certified mail, addressed to the parties at the addresses listed on the signature page, or at the most recent address specified by the addressee through written notice under this provision. Failure to conform to the requirement that mailings be by registered or certified mail shall not defeat the effectiveness of notice actually received by the addressee.

Authority to Enter Into Agreement. Each party to this Agreement represents and warrants that it has the full power and authority to enter into this Agreement and to carry out the transactions contemplated by it, and has taken all action necessary to authorize the execution, delivery, and performance of the Agreement.

Conflict of Interest. The parties to this Agreement have read and are aware of the provisions of Section 1090 and following and 87100 and following of the California Government Code relating to conflict of interest of public officers and employees. Both Parties represent that it is aware of no financial or economic interest of any officer or employee of GJSD and EJUSD, respectably, relating to this Agreement.

It is further understood that if such a financial interest does exist at the inception of this Agreement, either Party may immediately terminate this Agreement by giving written notice to the other Party. Each Party shall comply with the terms of Government Code Section 87100 and following during the term of this Agreement.

<u>Compliance with Law.</u> In the course of performing this Agreement, both Parties shall observe and comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations and ordinances now in effect or subsequently enacted.

Nondiscrimination. Neither Party, nor any of its officers, agents, employees, or subcontractors of each Party shall discriminate in the treatment or employment of any individual or groups of individuals on any ground prohibited by law, nor shall any of them harass any person in the course of performing this Agreement based on gender or any other basis prohibited by applicable law.

Special Rules and/or Restrictions. The parties understand that funding for the referenced programs may involve special restrictions on use and/or other requirements imposed by a funding agency. Any such special restrictions and/or requirements are contained in Attachment B and are incorporated by reference into this Agreement. The parties agree that any such requirements applicable to them will be fulfilled to the satisfaction of the requiring agency.

Non-appropriation of Funds. GJSD reserves the right to terminate this Agreement in the event insufficient funds are appropriated or budgeted for this Agreement in any fiscal year. Upon such termination, GJSD will be released from any further financial obligation to ETUSD, except for services performed prior to the date of termination or any liability due to any default existing at the time this clause is exercised. ETUSD will be given 30 days' written notice in the event that such an action is required by GJSD.

Ownership of Documents. All reports, documents, and other items generated in the course of providing services to ETUSD shall be the property of ETUSD, and shall be provided to ETUSD upon full completion of services, termination of this Agreement, or as otherwise specified in the Agreement.

<u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts with the same effect as if the parties had all signed the same document. All counterparts shall be construed together and shall constitute one agreement.

<u>License and Permits.</u> GJSD represents that GJSD and GJSD's employees who will render services under this Agreement are fully qualified and competent to provide the services called for under the Agreement. GJSD shall secure and maintain in force any permits or licenses required to perform the services called for under this Agreement, at GJSD's expense unless specified otherwise in the Agreement.

Confidentiality. GJSD shall at all times protect the confidentiality of all matters to which GJSD has access under this Agreement, including but not limited to any records pertaining to pupils or employees. GJSD shall not disclose or discuss the facts of any

such matter with any person other than ETUSD's authorized representatives without prior written consent of ETUSD, a court order, judicial subpoena, or other valid legal process. GJSD shall notify ETUSD immediately by telephone and facsimile of any subpoena or court order seeking information covered by this Agreement.

GJSD's Records. GJSD agrees to maintain and make available GJSD accurate books and records relative to all its activities under this Agreement. GJSD shall permit ETUSD to audit, examine, and make excerpts and transcripts from such records, and to conduct audits of all invoices, materials, personnel records, or other data related to all other matters covered by this Agreement. GJSD shall maintain such data and records in an accessible location and condition for a period of not less than 3 years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.

- Upon execution of the Contract, PG&E will begin incurring design fees and costs as my project moves forward;

Offer Description

After careful consideration of the project costs and scope of work, PG&E has determined you are eligible for the Make-Ready Incentive Option. PG&E will design, construct, own, and maintain any necessary EV supply infrastructure to the meter only. El Tejon Unified School District will design, build, own, operate, and maintain the EV supply infrastructure behind the meter, hereafter referred to as customer-owned make-ready infrastructure. PG&E provides an incentive that is equal to the lesser amount of either: (i) 80% of the customer-owned make-ready infrastructure costs or (ii) the incentive cap of \$16,000.00 as described in the table below. Project documentation should be submitted to your Project Manager within 90 days of site activation to initiate the incentive payment process.



By signing the Letter of Commitment and the Contract, El Tejon Unified School District understands that, in accordance with the section titled 'Vehicle Purchase Plans', El Tejon Unified School District is responsible for realizing the number and type of EV Fleet vehicles that have been indicated in Exhibit A of the aforementioned Contract regardless of the decision of granting agencies. These vehicles will be domiciled at 4337 Lebec Road, Lebec, CA 93243.

If El Tejon Unified School District does not put into operation the number of vehicles stated in the section above, PG&E in its sole discretion may require El Tejon Unified School District to reimburse PG&E for costs incurred by PG&E associated with PG&E's reliance on my commitment to install infrastructure, such as costs of equipment, site design, and installation. Additionally, if the first vehicle deployment is planned for 2028, El Tejon Unified School District understands that at least two vehicles must be deployed by **June 30, 2028** in order to meet EV Fleet's minimum eligibility requirements. If this requirement is not met, PG&E in its sole discretion may require El Tejon Unified School District to reimburse PG&E for costs incurred by PG&E associated with PG&E's reliance on my commitment to install infrastructure, such as costs of equipment, site design, and installation.

EV Fleet Program Terms and Conditions ("Contract")

Definitions

As used in this Contract, the following terms have the following meanings:

Disadvantaged Community: Census tracts in PG&E's service territory with a top quartile score according to California Environmental Protection Agency's CalEnviroScreen 3.0.

EV Service Connection: Traditional utility infrastructure from the utility distribution system to the meter, which may include but is not limited to cable, conductors, conduit, transformers, and associated substructures from the utility distribution system. Also referred to as "To the Meter" (TTM) infrastructure.

EV Supply Infrastructure: Infrastructure from the meter ("but not including the meter") to the parking space, which may include an electrical panel, cable, and conduit necessary to deliver power to the parking space. Also referred to as "Behind the Meter" (BTM) infrastructure.

Electric Vehicle Supply Equipment (EVSE): Equipment used for charging EVs. The conductors, including the ungrounded, grounded, and equipment grounding conductors, the electric vehicle chargers, connectors, attachment plugs, and all other fittings, devices, power outlets, or apparatuses installed specifically for the purpose of delivering energy from the Premises wiring to the electric vehicle.

EVSE Package: EVSE hardware, software, and network services.

EV Service Provider (EVSP): A company that provides EV charging solutions to Customer, including but not limited to network services, billing, and customer support.

Operation and Maintenance (O&M): O&M includes, but is not limited to, network fees, resetting of breakers, replacement of parts, and associated services necessary to keep the EVSE and/or EV Supply Infrastructure operational.

Premises: Premises includes all of the real property and apparatus employed in a single enterprise on an integral parcel of land undivided, excepting in the case of industrial, agricultural, oil field, resort enterprises, and public or quasi-public institutions, by a dedicated street, highway or public thoroughfare or railway. Automobile parking lots constituting a part of or adjacent to a single enterprise may be separated by an alley from the remainder of the Premises served. All Premises must be reviewed by PG&E to determine where service could be provided and at what cost. PG&E may agree to include some or all of the Premises in the EV Fleet Program, Multiple Premises may be listed in Exhibit A.

Rate Plan: The PG&E electric rate that Customer pays for using EVSE. Detail on PG&E rates and eligibility criteria can be found at www.pge.com/tariffs.

Customer: The entity participating in the EV Fleet Program that owns, leases, or manages the Premises where the EVSE Packages are installed, Customer will receive the bill for the energy delivered to the EVSE Package.

Specific Terms

Acknowledgement and Term: All parties agree to abide by the terms and conditions of this Contract for participation in the EV Fleet Program (part of California Public Utilities Commission, or "CPUC", Decision Number 18-05-040 issued May 31, 2018), including all requirements included by reference. The duration of this Contract (the "Term") will commence on the date Customer's EVSE Package becomes operational and will continue in effect for ten (10) years thereafter (unless otherwise earlier terminated pursuant to the terms herein). PG&E will inform Customer in writing when the EVSE Package becomes operational.

Ownership: Customer has two options for ownership of EV Supply Infrastructure. Ownership of other components is listed below for reference. Sections in this Contract labeled "Customer Owned EV Supply Infrastructure" or "PG&E Owned EV Supply Infrastructure" will apply depending on the ownership option a Customer selects. Customer should indicate their ownership option in the Cover Letter provided to the customer. All other terms are common to both ownership options.


EV Service Connection: PG&E always constructs, owns, operates, and maintains the EV Service Connection when necessary. PG&E may opt to utilize existing infrastructure, including customer-owned conduits, in order to minimize project costs. This will be indicated in the accompanying Preliminary Design. In some cases, the customer may opt to use an existing service connection, in which case no work will be completed by PG&E.

EV Supply Infrastructure: Customer may have two options for EV Supply Infrastructure ownership:

- PG&E Owned: PG&E constructs, owns, and maintains the EV Supply Infrastructure. PG&E covers costs in accordance with CPUC requirements.
- Customer Owned: Customer is responsible for construction and maintenance of EV Supply Infrastructure and receives an incentive in accordance with CPUC requirements.

EV Supply Equipment (EVSE): Customer always installs, owns, operates, and maintains the EVSE.

High level EV infrastructure configuration and terminology



Selection of EVSE Package: Upon approval of application by PG&E, Customer shall select and procure an EVSE Package from the PG&E approved product list. PG&E will share approved product list with Customer. Customer shall install, operate, and maintain the number and type of the EVSE Package, associated equipment, and signage as selected by Customer and approved by PG&E. Customer acknowledges that PG&E makes no representations regarding manufacturers, dealers, contractors, materials, or workmanship of the EVSE Package. Customer agrees that PG&E has no liability whatsoever concerning the quality and safety of such EVSE Package. At PG&E sole discretion, Customer may use an EVSE Package that is not on the approved product list. If EVSE Package is not on the approved product list, EVSE Package must be compliant with minimum requirements. These minimum requirements are attached to this Contract, as applicable. In addition to these requirements, EVSE Package must be ISO15118-ready, with the exception of equipment that will be used to charge off-road vehicles. Customer agrees to provide all information requested by PG&E about non-approved EVSE Packages, including but not limited to technical and safety specifications.

EVSE Rebate: Customer may qualify for a rebate of EVSE, in accordance with the CPUC requirements. Rebate amounts will vary in accordance with the CPUC requirements. Rebates will be paid after (1) Customer provides proof of purchase of EVSE Package, (2) at PG&E discretion PG&E inspects the installation of the EVSE and the physical location, and (3) the EVSE is operational. All EVSE rebate claims must be submitted no later than March 31, 2028. Any EVSE acquired after March 2028 will not be eligible for rebate.

Additional Services from EVSP: Separate and apart from the application and PG&E's obligations under the EV Fleet Program, the EVSP selected by Customer may offer and contract directly with the Customer to provide any additional or complementary services, as long as these services do not interfere with the objectives of the EV Fleet Program as fully described in the CPUC decision. The costs of additional EVSP services, and any cost related to O&M of any additional EVSP services, will not be borne by PG&E, unless they are complementary services necessary to support the EV Fleet Program objectives and are approved by PG&E in writing.

EV Drivers' Right to Access: Customer shall not restrict access to or use of the EVSE for reasons including, but not limited to, race, color, religion, age, sex, national origin, ancestry, physical or mental disability, or any basis prohibited by applicable law. However, Customer may decide to make the EVSE available only to its employees, tenants, or lessors; under the terms of the EV Fleet Program, Customer decides whether to make the EVSE available to other 3rd parties.



Accessibility Requirements: The installation of the EVSE and EV Service Connection is required to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and California Building Standards. Customer understands and accepts that such standards may impact parking layouts and reduce the number of non-accessible parking spaces available. Customer understands and accepts that changes to initial design representations may occur during the design, construction, and operational phases of the EVSE as may be dictated by design constraints, by law or regulation, or by local jurisdictional authorities.

Easement Requirement: An easement may be required to maintain PG&E owned facilities. PG&E will use existing easements when possible to minimize encumbrances on Customer property. If a new easement is required, access rights will follow standard utility requirements for providing electrical service. PG&E will determine if a new easement is required when Customer application is evaluated and will communicate that to Customer. If Customer does not wish to grant an easement for one or more Premises, PG&E may remove those Premises from the EV Fleet program. If Customer accepts easement requirements, Customer agrees to grant PG&E an easement for the installation of EV Service Connection and EV Supply Infrastructure. If the EV Service Connection must cross property owned by a third party to serve Customer, PG&E may, at its option, install such EV Service Connection after appropriate rights of way or easements, satisfactory to PG&E, are obtained without cost to PG&E. Customer is responsible for coordinating attainment of any easements. Customer agrees to sign and return easement to PG&E within 30 days of receipt. If the Customer does not respond within 30 days, PG&E reserves the right to rescind Customer's participation in the EV Fleet Program and recover all costs incurred. Upon termination of the Contract, PG&E shall upon written demand therefore execute and deliver to Customer a good and sufficient quitclaim of said easement and right of way or such portion thereof conveyed in this document, at Customer expense.

EVSE O&M: The Customer is required to maintain the EVSE for the Term. Customer will pay all O&M costs associated with the EVSE. Customer shall maintain a consistent uptime at the direction of PG&E for EVSE installed. Customer shall maintain the common area improvements immediately surrounding the EVSE in good condition, ordinary wear and tear excepted, and will promptly notify PG&E of any problems it is aware of related to the EVSE. Such maintenance by Customer of the immediately surrounding common areas shall include, but not be limited to, pavement maintenance and snow removal services, if applicable. Uninterrupted service is not guaranteed, and PG&E may interrupt service when necessary to ensure safety or to perform maintenance on PG&E owned infrastructure. PG&E will use reasonable efforts to notify Customer in advance of interruptions to service, planned maintenance, and physical access to Premises. Customer will immediately shut down chargers if there is a safety issue.

Billing: Customer will be the PG&E Customer and will be served according to the applicable Rate Plan. As the Customer, Customer will be responsible for paying the PG&E bill.

Compensation: Under no conditions shall Customer or EV Drivers receive compensation of any kind (including but not limited to: cash, in-kind services, or otherwise) for any duties or requirements provided for in this Contract or for participation in any way as part of the EV Fleet Program, including but not limited to: easements, use of data for lawful purposes, loss of business activity during construction or maintenance activities, or any other inconvenience or loss, without limitation, related to participation.

Changing Rate Plan: Customer may change Rate Plan during the Term but must remain on a retail PG&E rate for the duration of the Term. If Customer switches to a non-retail PG&E rate during the Term, Customer shall bear the full cost and sole expense, as circumstances may dictate, for losses incurred by PG&E on behalf of ratepayers, such as pro-rated costs of equipment, site design, and installation.

Reliability: PG&E does not guarantee uninterrupted service. Customer may pursue options to ensure that any impact to Customer operations from potential loss of power is sufficiently mitigated. Customer is responsible for the cost of any supplemental solutions to improve reliability.

Expansion of EVSE Installation: Customer may add more charging ports to their installation in the future, in accordance with the provisions of CPUC filed tariffs such as Electric Rule 16. Customer must coordinate with PG&E prior to any approved installation extension. Any installations or related work performed outside of EV Fleet program will be at Customer's expense and its liability.

EVSE Replacement: Customer may replace their EVSE during the Term. Customer must notify PG&E ahead of replacement to ensure infrastructure can accommodate the additional load and new EVSE complies with necessary CPUC requirements for the program. If adequate infrastructure does not exist, Customer must request increased capacity in accordance with the provisions of CPUC filed tariffs such as Electric Rule 16. Any replacements will be at Customer's expense and its liability.

Vehicle Purchase Plans: PG&E will work with Customer to understand its fleet electrification plans and may install



infrastructure to support future vehicle purchases. In Exhibit A, Customer will provide the number, type, and charging levels of electric vehicles that will be used at the Premises over time to justify the requested infrastructure. At PG&E discretion, during the Term PG&E may request evidence that Customer is operating these vehicles and associated charging in accordance with its electrification plan. If Customer is not operating vehicles consistent with its electrification plans, at PG&E discretion, Customer may be responsible for PG&E costs associated with installing the excess infrastructure. This includes costs, as circumstances may dictate, for losses incurred by PG&E on behalf of ratepayers, such as costs of equipment, site design and installation. Customer may, at any time within the Term request from PG&E projected and final costs associated with this. If Customer wishes to change its plan, Customer must provide a modified plan to PG&E. This modified plan must be mutually agreed upon by PG&E and Customer. Customer may opt to replace these vehicles with similar equipment but must operate the number and type of vehicles outlined in the electrification plan. Vehicles that are leased must be replaced with similar equipment upon termination of the lease duration.

If Customer is not the party responsible for purchasing or leasing the vehicles indicated in Exhibit A, they will acquire and provide such proof from the responsible party including the number, type, and charging levels of electric vehicles that will be used at the Premises over time to justify the requested infrastructure. Customer is responsible to provide evidence of vehicle operation and associated charging during this term in accordance with the indicated electrification plans. If vehicles are not operating consistent with the indicated electrification plans, at PG&E discretion, Customer may be responsible for PG&E costs associated with installing the excess infrastructure. This includes costs, as circumstances may dictate, for losses incurred by PG&E on behalf of ratepayers, such as costs of equipment, site design, and installation.

Project Scope: Customer acknowledges that:

- Customer agrees to the high-level project scope listed in Exhibit A;
- Upon execution of this Contract, PG&E will begin incurring design fees and costs as Customer project moves forward:
- If Customer withdraws from the program, then PG&E reserves the right to recover all fees and costs incurred by it
 and its subcontractors after the execution of this Contract including, but not limited to, design cost, site walk costs,
 etc.:
- PG&E will conduct a site walk;
- If the existing infrastructure or physical site or equipment is substantially different than anticipated or described, then PG&E will make reasonable effort to redesign the project in a manner acceptable to both parties, but reserves the right to cancel Customer participation in the program; and
- If Customer does not submit required documentation (e.g., signed easement if needed) in a timely manner, then PG&E may grant extensions by request but reserves the right to waitlist Customer application and/or cancel participation in the program.

External Funding Sources: Customer understands that the total infrastructure and EVSE rebate and incentive amounts the Customer receives from all sources, which may include but is not limited to, utilities, state programs, manufacturer, retailer, or otherwise, cannot exceed Customer's total cost of purchasing the EVSE, installing the EVSE, and constructing the EV Supply infrastructure.

Customer agrees to keep records of all infrastructure and EVSE incentives and rebates received for Customer's EV Fleet project. Customer understands that PG&E may request and review said records up to one year after project completion date. If rebates and incentives received exceed incurred project cost, PG&E may inform all other funding sources, which may include but is not limited to, utilities, state programs, manufacturer, retailer, or other, of the violation, including the name of the Customer, a description of the project, and details regarding the excessive rebates and incentives.

Customer Owned EV Supply Infrastructure Section

EV Supply Infrastructure Incentive: Customer qualifies for an incentive towards the cost of EV Supply Infrastructure if they choose to own and maintain the EV Supply Infrastructure. Incentive amounts will vary in accordance with the CPUC requirements, Incentive will be paid after (1) Customer provides proof of actual EV Supply Infrastructure construction cost, (2) EV Supply Infrastructure construction is complete, (3) the EVSE is operational.

Installation of EV Service Connection: PG&E and/or its contractors shall design and construct the EV Service Connection in compliance with the terms of this Contract, as well as all applicable local, state, and federal laws and regulatory requirements. Customer is responsible for providing all disclosures, including but not limited to hazardous materials located at the site of the installation. If an easement is required, PG&E will provide a preliminary layout of proposed facilities to Customer prior to preparation of easement for Customer review and approval; such approval will not unreasonably be withheld. The easement will be executed and recorded in favor of PG&E so that PG&E may access the EV Service Connection as



needed. It will be the Customer's responsibility to provide a preliminary design of the EV Supply Infrastructure and associated electrical loads so that PG&E can provide the associated EV Service Connection design. PG&E and Customer will approve final design prior to construction beginning. Once design is approved, no material changes will be made without approval from PG&E and Customer. After the EVSE is operational, Customer may request a copy of "as built" designs, which will be provided by PG&E.

Installation of EV Supply Infrastructure: The Customer and/or its contractors shall construct the EV Supply Infrastructure and install the EVSE in compliance with the terms of this Contract, as well as all applicable local, state, and federal laws and regulatory requirements, including PG&E requirements found at www.pge.com/greenbook. The Customer is responsible for (i) the costs to construct the EV Supply Infrastructure, (ii) the purchase of the EVSE Package, and (iii) installation of the EVSE. After the EVSE is operational, Customer receives incentive for EV Supply Infrastructure in accordance with terms of this Contract.

EV Supply Infrastructure O&M: If Customer owns the EV Supply Infrastructure, Customer is responsible for O&M of the EV Supply Infrastructure for the Term. Customer will pay all O&M costs associated with the EV Supply Infrastructure. Customer shall maintain the common area improvements immediately surrounding the EV Supply Infrastructure in good condition, ordinary wear and tear excepted, and will promptly notify PG&E of any problems it is aware of related to the EV Supply Infrastructure. Such maintenance by Customer of the immediately surrounding common areas shall include, but not be limited to, pavement maintenance and snow removal services, if applicable. Uninterrupted service is not guaranteed, and PG&E may interrupt service when necessary to ensure safety or to perform maintenance. PG&E will use reasonable efforts to notify Customer in advance of interruptions to service, planned maintenance, and physical access to Premises.

Access to Customers Premises: PG&E shall at all times have the right to enter and leave the Customer's Premises for any purpose connected with the furnishing of electric service to the EV Service Connection (meter reading, inspection, testing, routine repairs, replacement, maintenance, vegetation management, emergency work, etc.) and the exercise of any and all rights secured to it by law, or under PG&E's applicable tariff schedules. If Customer does not grant PG&E reasonable access to the Premises, then PG&E may deenergize the EV Service Connection until access is granted. PG&E will work closely with Customer to ensure this access does not unreasonably interfere with Customer's property or operations.

End of Term: At the end of the Term, the Customer will have the following options:

- 1. Continue operating EVSE and EV Supply Infrastructure
 - Customer has continued responsibility for O&M of EVSE and EV Supply Infrastructure.
 - If an easement was required for installation, easement remains in place.
 - PG&E continues to own EV Service Connection and will treat this under the standard provisions of CPUC filed tariffs such as Electric Rule 16.
- Stop operating EVSE and EV Supply Infrastructure
 - Remove the EVSE and/or EV Supply Infrastructure at Customer's cost and expense.
 - If an easement was required for installation, PG&E will deliver a quitclaim for the easement and the easement will be removed.
 - PG&E will require access to any energized PG&E facilities. If EV Service Connection serves other load or assets, for example building load or solar, PG&E continues to own EV Service Connection and will treat this under the standard provisions of CPUC filed tariffs such as Electric Rule 16. If EV Service Connection serves only the EVSE installed under this Contract, PG&E will deenergize EV Service Connection and abandon facilities in place.

PG&E Owned EV Supply Infrastructure Section

Installation of Equipment: PG&E and/or its contractors shall design and construct the EV Service Connection and EV Supply Infrastructure in compliance with the terms of this Contract, as well as all applicable local, state, and federal laws and regulatory requirements. Customer is responsible for providing all disclosures, including but not limited to hazardous materials located at the site of the installation. If an easement is required, PG&E will provide a preliminary layout of proposed facilities to Customer prior to preparation of easement for Customer review and approval; such approval will not unreasonably be withheld. The easement will be executed and recorded in favor of PG&E so that PG&E may access the EV Service Connection and EV Supply Infrastructure as needed. After Customer approval of the preliminary design, PG&E will coordinate with the Customer if there are any proposed material changes. A final design with no material changes from the agreed upon design will be provided by PG&E prior to any installation activities. PG&E and Customer will approve final design prior to construction beginning. Once design is approved, no material changes will be made without approval from PG&E and Customer. An estimated installation schedule shall be provided by PG&E after execution of required easement and timely selection of EVSE Package. Should the installation schedule require modification, PG&E shall notify Customer within a reasonable amount of time of such changes. PG&E is responsible for the costs to construct the EV Supply Infrastructure. The Customer is



responsible for (i) the purchase of the EVSE Package and (ii) installation of the EVSE. Upon completion of installation of the EVSE, the Customer understands and acknowledges that it will be responsible for the O&M of the EVSE installed through the EV Fleet Program. After the EVSE is operational, Customer may request a copy of "as built" designs, which will be provided by PG&E.

EV Supply Infrastructure O&M: If PG&E owns the EV Supply Infrastructure, PG&E is responsible for O&M of the EV Supply Infrastructure for the Term. PG&E will pay all O&M costs associated with the EV Supply Infrastructure. Customer shall maintain the common area improvements immediately surrounding the EV Supply Infrastructure in good condition, ordinary wear and tear excepted, and will promptly notify PG&E of any problems it is aware of related to the EV Supply Infrastructure. Such maintenance by Customer of the immediately surrounding common areas shall include, but not be limited to, pavement maintenance and snow removal services, if applicable. Uninterrupted service is not guaranteed, and PG&E may interrupt service when necessary to ensure safety or to perform maintenance. PG&E will use reasonable efforts to notify Customer in advance of interruptions to service, planned maintenance, and physical access to Premises.

Access to Customers Premises: PG&E shall at all times have the right to enter and leave the Customer's Premises for any purpose connected with the furnishing of electric service to the EV Service Connection (meter reading, inspection, testing, routine repairs, replacement, maintenance, vegetation management, emergency work, etc.) and the exercise of any and all rights secured to it by law, or under PG&E's applicable tariff schedules. If Customer does not grant PG&E reasonable access to the Premises, then PG&E may deenergize the EV Service Connection until access is granted. PG&E will work closely with Customer to ensure this access does not unreasonably interfere with Customer's property or operations.

End of Term: At the end of the Term, the Customer will have the following options:

- 1. Continue operating EVSE
 - Customer has continued responsibility for O&M of EVSE,
 - If an easement was required for installation, easement remains in place.
 - PG&E continues to own EV Service Connection and EV Supply Infrastructure and will treat these under the standard provisions of CPUC filed tariffs such as Electric Rule 16.
- Stop operating EVSE
 - Remove the EVSE at Customer's cost and expense.
 - If an easement was required for installation, PG&E will deliver a quitclaim for the easement and the easement will be removed.
 - o PG&E will require access to any energized PG&E facilities. If EV Service Connection and/or EV Supply Infrastructure serves other load or assets, for example solar, PG&E continues to own EV Service Connection and/or EV Supply Infrastructure and will treat these under the standard provisions of CPUC filed tariffs such as Electric Rule 16. If EV Service Connection and/or EV Supply Infrastructure serves only the EVSE installed under this Contract, PG&E will deenergize EV Service Connection and EV Supply Infrastructure and abandon facilities in place.

General Terms

Permission to Use Data: Customer agrees to allow PG&E and its agents and representatives to use data gathered as part of the EV Fleet Program (including usage data from the EVSE and EVSE performance data supplied directly to PG&E from the EVSP) ("Usage Data") for use in regulatory reporting, ordinary business use, industry forums, case studies, or other similar activities, in accordance with applicable laws and regulations. Usage Data furnished to PG&E by the EVSP will not include any personal information as defined for the purposes of California privacy laws (including the California Privacy Rights Act, as amended("CPRA")). Any such personal data will be deidentified (as defined by CPRA) before it is provided to PG&E. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Customer acknowledges that PG&E is required to disclose location data at census tract or 5-digit zip code level as part of its regulatory obligations to report aggregate data. Although such locations will not be identified as Customer locations in the aggregated and anonymous data disclosed by PG&E, a third party could potentially associate Customer with disclosed locations by reference to other facts and data sources.

Representations: Customer understands that its participation in EV Fleet Program shall not be construed as creating any agency, partnership, or other form of joint enterprise between the Customer, PG&E, or their affiliates, contractors, vendors, representatives, or designees, nor create any obligations or responsibilities on their behalf except as may be expressly granted in writing, nor make any representations of any kind to this effect. Customer represents and warrants that it is either (i) the fee title owner and has the ability to grant an easement (if required), or (ii) it is the authorized manager of the proposed EV Fleet Program site working with the fee title owner, it has the power, authority, and capacity to bind itself to undertake the EV Fleet Program terms and conditions and to perform each and every obligation required of Customer, and such fee title owner has the ability to grant an easement (if needed).



Changes: PG&E may initiate changes to the EV Fleet Program as necessary to comply with CPUC directives. PG&E shall endeavor to provide Customer with advance notice of any such changes. Customer has the option to opt out of the Program subject to section "Customer Removal or Termination" below.

Compliance with Laws: All parties shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local statutes, rules, regulations, laws, orders, and decisions that relate to or govern its participation in the EV Fleet Program and/or Customer's interactions with customers in connection with the EV Fleet Program.

Failure to Comply with Terms and Conditions: Without limitation, and to the greatest extent allowed by law, PG&E and Customer reserve the right to seek damages and recovery for losses incurred due to any breach of this Contract on the part of Customer or PG&E, whether intentional or unintentional.

Relocations: Should Customer request relocation of EVSE or parts thereof, such relocation shall be per mutually agreeable terms and shall be at sole expense of Customer and in accordance with any EV Fleet Program requirements, laws, regulations, or other applicable jurisdictional requirements. Additionally, if applicable and requested by PG&E, Customer shall either amend the easement to include the legal description of the new location or enter into a new easement with PG&E.

PG&E Termination or Suspension: PG&E may terminate, or for any duration suspend, Customer's participation in the EV Fleet Program, with or without cause, at any time, and for any reason, with reasonable advance notice. Such reasons may include but are not limited to failure to provide or maintain terms of easement, failure to abide by EV Fleet Program terms and conditions, permitting issues, exceptional installation costs, environmental concerns, or any other reason(s) not in the best interests of the EV Fleet Program or PG&E's ratepayers.

Customer Removal or Termination: Should Customer request removal or termination of EVSE or parts thereof prior to expiration of the Term, then Customer shall bear the full cost and sole expense of such removal as well as all fees and costs, as circumstances may dictate, for losses incurred by PG&E on behalf of ratepayers, such as pro-rated costs of equipment, site design, and installation. Customer may, at any time within the Term, request from PG&E projected and final costs associated with such a removal request. Such costs will include all amounts paid by PG&E, divided equally over a ten-year period (e.g., if amounts total \$100k and Customer leaves after 1 year it is responsible for \$90k). If the Customer wishes to assign its rights and obligations of this Contract to a new Customer prior to the expiration of the Term, the new Customer may assume all rights and obligations for the remaining Term with PG&E consent. Such consent not to be unreasonably withheld.

Indemnification: Customer shall indemnify, hold harmless, and defend PG&E, its affiliates, subsidiaries, parent company, officers, managers, directors, agents, and employees, from and against all claims, demands, losses, damages, costs, expenses, and liability (legal, contractual, or otherwise), which arise from or are in any way connected with any: (i) injury to or death of persons, including but not limited to employees of PG&E or Customer; (ii) injury to property or other interests of PG&E, Customer, or any third party; (iii) violation of a local, state, or federal common law, statute, or regulation, including but not limited to environmental laws or regulations; or (iv) strict liability imposed by any law or regulation; so long as such injury, violation, or strict liability (as set forth in (i) - (iv) above) arises from or is in any way connected with Customer's performance of, or failure to perform, this Contract. This indemnification obligation shall not apply to the extent that such injury, loss, or damage is caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of PG&E, its officers, managers, or employees.

Customer shall, on PG&E's request, defend any action, claim, or suit asserting a claim which might be covered by this indemnity, using counsel acceptable to PG&E. Customer shall pay all costs and expenses that may be incurred by PG&E in enforcing this indemnity, including reasonable attorney's fees. To the extent necessary, each Party was represented by counsel in the negotiation and execution of this Contract. PG&E represents and warrants that it has indemnification language in its contract with any third party who PG&E may send to perform work on Customer's physical site. PG&E agrees to work closely with Customer on any concerns that may arise related to the party who will perform work on Customer's physical site.

Insurance Requirements: Customer shall procure, carry, and maintain the following insurance coverage, and Customer is also responsible for its Subcontractors maintaining sufficient limits of the appropriate insurance coverage:

A. Personal Liability

 The limit shall not be less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) each occurrence for bodily injury, property damage and personal injury.

Coverage shall: a) By "Additional Insured" endorsement add as insureds PG&E, its directors, officers, agents, and employees with respect to liability arising out of work performed by or for the Customer; b) Be endorsed to specify that the Customer insurance is primary and that any insurance or self-insurance maintained by PG&E shall not contribute with it.



B. Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability

- Workers' Compensation insurance or self-insurance indicating compliance with any applicable labor codes, acts, laws, or statutes, state or federal, where Customer performs Work.
- 2. Employers' Liability insurance shall not be less than \$1,000,000 for injury or death in each accident.

C. Commercial General Liability

 Coverage shall be at least as broad as the Insurance Services Office (ISO) Commercial General Liability Coverage "occurrence" form, with no coverage deletions.

The limit shall not be less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence for bodily injury, property damage and personal injury.

3. Coverage shall: a) by "Additional Insured" endorsement add as insureds PG&E, its affiliates, subsidiaries, and parent company, and PG&E's directors, officers, agents, and employees with respect to liability arising out of or connected with the Work performed by or for the Customer. (ISO Form CG2010 or equivalent is preferred.) In the event the Commercial General Liability policy includes a "blanket endorsement by contract," the following language added to the certificate of insurance will satisfy PG&E's additional insured requirement: "PG&E, its affiliates, subsidiaries, and parent company, and PG&E's directors, officers, agents, and employees with respect to liability arising out of the work performed by or for the Customer are additional insureds under a blanket endorsement."; b) be endorsed to specify that the Customer's insurance is primary and that any insurance or self-insurance maintained by PG&E shall not contribute with it.

D. Documentation Requirements

Customer shall have all insurance in place before beginning any Work. Upon request, Customer shall furnish PG&E
with certificates of insurance, declaration pages and endorsements (collectively, "Documentation") of all required
insurance. Documentation shall be signed and submitted by a person authorized by that insurer to issue certificates
of insurance and endorsements on its behalf.

2. The insurer shall deliver notification to PG&E in accordance with the policy provisions if any of the above-described

policies are cancelled before the stated expiration date.

PG&E may inspect the original policies in Sections A or B or require copies at any time. Customer/Owner may redact non-essential exposure information from copies.

The minimum liability insurance requirements established in this Contract are not a representation by PG&E that
the insurance limits are sufficient, nor do these requirements in any way limit Customer's liability under this Contract.

Upon request, Customer shall furnish PG&E the same evidence of insurance for its Subcontractors as PG&E requires of Customer.

Dispute Resolution: After attempting in good faith to resolve a dispute, a party may request mediation by written notice to the other Party. The mediation shall be conducted by a mutually-agreeable mediator with appropriate experience. All negotiations and any mediation conducted pursuant to this provision are confidential and shall be treated as compromise and settlement negotiations, to which Section 1119 of the California Evidence Code shall apply, and Section 1119 is incorporated herein by reference.

No Partnership: This Contract shall not be construed as creating a partnership, joint venture, agency relationship, franchise, or association, nor shall this Contract render PG&E and Customer liable as partners, co-ventures, or principals.

Enforceability: If any of the provisions, or application of any of the provisions, of this Contract are held to be illegal or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, PG&E and Customer shall negotiate an equitable adjustment in the provisions of this Contract with a view toward effectuating the purpose of this Contract. The illegality or invalidity of any of the provisions, or application of any of the provisions, of this Contract will not affect the legality or enforceability of the remaining provisions or application of any of the provisions of the Contract.

Integration: This Contract, including all items incorporated herein by reference, constitutes the entire agreement and understanding between the parties as to the subject matter of the Contract. It supersedes all prior or contemporaneous agreements, commitments, representations, writings, and discussions between parties, whether oral or written, express or implied, that relate in any way to the subject matter of this Contract. This Contract has been induced by no representations, statements, or agreements other than those expressed herein. Neither party shall be bound by any prior or contemporaneous obligations, conditions, warranties, or representations with respect to the subject matter of this Contract.

Appendix A

PG&E EV FLEET PROGRAM PARTICIPANT DATA REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

EV Fleet program participants are required to provide site, equipment, and utilization data for at least 5 years from the time chargers are operational. Sites are required to install chargers with Application Program Interface (API) communication capability.

Below are the data and metrics that may be collected by PG&E through the API. PG&E will contact EVSPs after EVSEs are activated to initiate API testing. Upon activation, Customer must give consent to their EVSP to provide API data to PG&E and its agents and representatives.

Customer agrees to receive and respond to customer surveys throughout the project lifecycle including post-installation, upon request of PG&E or an associated party.

Off-road vehicles: Sites with off-road vehicles are excluded from API requirements but <u>must</u> install a separate meter that is dedicated for EV charging. In addition, due to the need for PG&E to report charger usage data to the CPUC, no form of generation or distributed generation (including solar and battery storage) may be installed onto this meter panel until five years after the date of project activation.

Pre-construction: These EV charging equipment safety requirements must be specified in procurement documents:

- 1. Charging equipment must be certified by a Nationally Recognized Testing Lab (NRTL).
- Infrastructure must comply with applicable safety performance requirements associated with the type of TE infrastructure being installed.
 - For light-duty vehicles, compliance with the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) J-1772 Standard for Level 1 or Level 2 charging. Compliance with CHAdeMO and CCS for DC fast charging would be appropriate evidence of compliance with this requirement.
 - For other types of TE infrastructure, including any non-standardized EVSE, the following basic connector safety measures will be required:
 - A passing EVSE safety performance evaluation report performed by a Nationally Recognized Testing Lab (NRTL);
 - When not connected, the vehicle inlet and the EVSE connector must be designed to prevent direct contact with any live components;
 - The vehicle inlet and EVSE connector shall be free of sharp edges and potentially injurious protrusions;
 - The coupler between the vehicle and the EVSE should avoid or mitigate any potentially hazardous conditions such as fires, electrical shock to users, or other personal injuries.
- Infrastructure and its planned installation must comply with California Electrical Code Article 625.1
- Infrastructure and its planned installation must comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), 42
 U.S.C. § 12101 et seq., and California Building Code Chapter 11B, ² if applicable, per the AHJ where the
 EVSE will be installed, unless the appropriate waiver is obtained from local authorities.

² California Electrical Code Article 625 covers Electric Vehicle Charging System safety and standards as installed in place. California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Article 625.

³ California Building Code Chapter 2 includes definition associated with electric vehicle charging stations. CBC Chapter 11B defines requirements for 'Accessibility to Public Buildings, Public Accommodations, Commercial Buildings, and Public Housing.'

- Outdoor-mounted EVSE must be rated to be installed for outdoor use.
- For utility infrastructure work on the customer side of the meter, contractors must provide proof of EVITP Certification prior to construction.
- Contractors must provide the utility proof of a full site assessment, including the appropriate load calculations to ensure existing infrastructure can accommodate additional EV load, or that appropriate infrastructure upgrades will be completed.

During Construction:

- All utility infrastructure work on the customer side of the meter not performed by employees of the IOUs shall be performed by fully licensed electricians. For commercial installations, all electrical contractors should hold a valid C-10 contractor's license.
- 2. Installations will be designed per Article 625 of the California Electrical Code.

Operational Safety:

- Overcurrent protection associated with utility transformers and distribution circuits that feed power to the charging stations.
- Overcurrent protection in the meter pedestal/circuit breaker panel that feeds each of the charging stations.
- Bollard equipment protection installed where appropriate as defined by utility design standards and AHJ requirements.
- Concrete parking stops to protect equipment where appropriate as defined by utility design standards and AHJ requirements.


WHY ARE YOU RECEIVING THIS GUIDANCE DOCUMENT?

As part of PG&E's EV Fleet program, customers may be responsible for the construction and maintenance of their EV supply infrastructure, or Behind the Meter (BTM) infrastructure. This document is given to all EV Fleet applicants.

HOW TO USE THIS DOCUMENT

As you read this document, please consider your organization's ability to execute on the work required to electrify its fleet, including constructing and maintaining BTM infrastructure.

We encourage customers to reach out to PG&E's EV Fleet team at any time for further clarification and information.



QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER BEFORE YOU SIGN AN EV FLEET CONTRACT

1. Do I need a Professionally Licensed Electrical Engineer to design the BTM project?

Yes. In order to receive a permit from your local authority having jurisdiction (permits are required for this work) you will need a licensed electrical engineer to sign off on your drawings. Applicable Engineers/Electricians can be found on several websites including:

- Diamond Certified
- Angies List
- Better Business Bureau



2. What questions should I ask the contractor or electrician in order to be assured that they are suitable to get the job done?

Firstly, ensure that the contractor or electrician is familiar with <u>PG&E's Greenbook</u>¹, local jurisdiction guidelines about new construction, and the National Electric Code². In addition, we recommend you ask the contractor or electrician the following:

- Ask if they have completed electric vehicle projects
- Ask to see examples of completed work
- Ask for references
- Ask if they are familiar with PG&E's Greenbook, local jurisdiction or have completed projects involving the PG&E service planning group

3. How will I know if the price quoted by the contractor or electrician is accurate?

- Obtain multiple quotes in order to complete a comprehensive comparison.
- For an apples-to-apples comparison from electrical contractors, a construction drawing provided by a Licensed Professional Engineer along with a Request for Proposal (RFP) should be part of the bidding process.
- Check the following:
 - o Does the proposal include the full scope of work required by the EV Fleet program: all BTM infrastructure including the switchgear and foundation, conduit/wiring from the meter panel to the charging location, and installation and commissioning of chargers?
 - Does the proposal itemize and include materials, labor, permitting (if applicable), inspection, and commissioning?
 - Does the proposal include correct equipment specifications and switchgear sizing?

4. Do I need to submit the BTM design to my PG&E Project Manager?

Yes. Submitting the BTM design to your PG&E Project Manager for engineering technical review is required.

5. Does my BTM construction need to be completed prior to PG&E's To-the-Meter (TTM) scope of construction?

Yes. For PG&E to fully evaluate the scope, size, and cost of its TTM work, you need to first complete the BTM construction. Please contact your PG&E Project Manager regarding any questions, concerns, or delays.

6. How much can I expect to pay for the BTM?

BTM costs can vary depending on site characteristics, so please work with your contractor or electrician for a cost-effective solution for your site. Generally, we see that costs range from about \$20k-\$30k per charger before incentives are issued.

Factors that may impact the cost to construct your BTM:

 Project size – Projects with higher charger counts tend to cost more overall but are cheaper per charger. Conversely, sites with only a handful of chargers may be less expensive but cost more per charger.

¹ The Electric and Gas Service Requirements (i.e., Greenbook) is a guide to Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) requirements and policies for establishing electric and gas service to new or remodeled applicant installations.

² The National Electrical Code is a regionally adoptable standard for the safe installation of electrical wiring and equipment in the United States.



- The location of your chargers Chargers that are located far from the PG&E meter will require more
 excavation and materials to run the electrical service, which will generally cost more money.
- The location of your site Sites that are remotely located may pay higher rates because the
 contractor's people and equipment will have to travel further to get there. Additionally, sites in the Bay
 Area may see higher construction costs as well due to the high cost of labor in that region.


Please remember that as part of the EV Fleet program, you may receive a monetary incentive per vehicle to offset the cost of your BTM construction.


7. Does my contractor or electrician need to also purchase and install my chargers?

This is optional and up to your discretion. You may purchase the chargers, or your contractor or electrician may purchase the chargers on your behalf. If you prefer your contractor or electrician to purchase the chargers, ask your contractor/electrician if they have experience doing so to ensure you are working with an experienced contractor/electrician in the electric vehicle space.

8. What else do I need to know?

- Permits and Easements Program participants should check if they have the necessary permits and easements required to start construction.
- Changes to the design Your design engineer or contractor may suggest that you make changes to
 your project scope or location after a contract has already been signed with the EV Fleet Program. We
 strongly discourage any changes to the contract, but they may be considered on a case-by-case basis.
 The program may also ask you to pay for any costs incurred as the result of the change. Please keep in
 mind that your eligibility for the program was determined based on the contracted scope, and any
 changes may affect your eligibility or the level of support you can receive.

EL TEJON UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

(SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST SERVICES)

This Independent Contractor Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into on September 11, 2025, by and between:

Contractor: Kristin Ericsson, a licensed Speech-Language Pathologist with a principal place of business at 7600 Pack Saddle Court, Bakersfield, California ("Contractor"), and

Client: El Tejon Unified School District, a public school district or educational entity with a principal place of business at 4337 Lebec Road, Lebec, California ("Client").

Recitals

WHEREAS, Client operates a school or educational program and requires speech-language pathology services for students;

WHEREAS, Contractor is a licensed Speech-Language Pathologist in the State of California, qualified to provide such services and supervise a Speech-Language Pathology Assistant (SLPA);

WHEREAS, Contractor agrees to provide services as an independent contractor, not as an employee, in accordance with California law, including but not limited to Assembly Bill 5 (AB 5) and the California Business and Professions Code;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein, the parties agree as follows:

Services

- 1.1 Scope of Services. Contractor shall provide the following services ("Services") to Client:
 - Conduct speech-language evaluations and assessments for students as assigned by Client.
 - Develop and implement individualized treatment plans for students with speech, language, and communication needs.
 - Provide direct therapy services to students in accordance with their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) or other plans.

- Supervise and direct the activities of a Speech-Language Pathology Assistant (SLPA), ensuring compliance with California Business and Professions Code § 2538.1 et seq. and California Code of Regulations, Title 16, § 1399.170 et seq.
- Maintain accurate and timely documentation, including progress notes, treatment plans, and reports, as required by Client and applicable state and federal laws.
- · Attend IEP meetings, consultations, or other meetings as requested by Client.
- Provide professional consultation to Client's staff regarding speech and language services.
- 1.2 Location. Services shall primarily be performed at El Tejon Elementary School, or other locations as mutually agreed upon. Services may include teletherapy if approved by Client and compliant with California law.
- 1.3 Schedule. Contractor shall perform Services on a mutually agreed schedule, with an estimated 5 hours per week, subject to adjustment based on student needs and Client's requirements. Contractor has the discretion to determine the specific times and methods for performing Services, provided they meet Client's deadlines and quality standards.

2. Compensation

2.1 Fees. Client shall pay Contractor at the rate of \$125 per hour OR \$10,000 per school year for Services rendered. Payment shall be based on actual hours worked or services provided, as documented in Contractor's invoices.

2.2 Travel Expenses.

- Mileage: Client shall reimburse Contractor for mileage incurred while traveling between Client's designated school sites or other required locations at the current Internal Revenue Service (IRS) standard mileage rate for business travel \$0.67 per mile. Contractor shall provide a mileage log with each invoice.
- Travel Time: Client shall compensate Contractor for travel time between school sites or other required locations at a rate of \$62.50 per hour OR 50% of the regular hourly rate, provided travel occurs during normal business hours and is pre-approved by Client. Travel time to and from Contractor's home to the first or from the last work location of the day is not compensable.

- Other Expenses: Client shall reimburse Contractor for pre-approved, reasonable, and necessary travel-related expenses (e.g., parking, tolls) upon submission of receipts.
- 2.3 Invoicing and Payment. Contractor shall submit detailed invoices to Client monthly, including hours worked, services provided, mileage logs, travel time, and any approved expenses. Client shall pay invoices within 30 days of receipt via check made payable to Kristin Ericsson. Late payments may incur interest at the maximum rate permitted under California law.
- 2.4 Taxes. Contractor is responsible for all federal, state, and local taxes, including self-employment taxes, arising from compensation under this Agreement. Client shall not withhold taxes or provide employee benefits. Contractor shall provide Client with a completed IRS Form W-9.
- Independent Contractor Status
- 3.1 Relationship. Contractor is an independent contractor, not an employee, agent, or partner of Client. This Agreement satisfies the requirements of California's Assembly Bill 5 (AB 5) and the "ABC" test under California Labor Code § 2775, as Contractor.
 - Is free from Client's control and direction over the manner and means of performing Services, subject to Client's right to specify desired results;
 - Performs professional services requiring a California Speech-Language Pathology license, which are outside Client's usual course of business as an educational institution;
 - Is customarily engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, or business as a Speech-Language Pathologist.
- 3.2 No Employee Benefits. Contractor is not entitled to Client's employee benefits, including but not limited to health insurance, workers' compensation, unemployment insurance, or retirement plans.
- 3.3 Control. Contractor retains discretion over the methods and means of performing Services, including the use of Contractor's own equipment, tools, and materials, unless otherwise specified by Client.
- 4. SLPA Supervision

- 4.1 Supervisory Responsibilities. Contractor shall supervise the SLPA in accordance with California Business and Professions Code § 2538.1 and California Code of Regulations, Title 16, § 1399.170 et seq., including:
 - Providing direct and indirect supervision as required (e.g., at least 2 hours of direct supervision per week for full-time SLPAs and ongoing indirect supervision).
 - Reviewing and approving SLPA documentation, treatment plans, and progress notes.
 - Ensuring SLPA services are within the scope of their license and Client's requirements.
- 4.2 Liability for SLPA. Contractor shall ensure the SLPA's services meet professional standards and comply with applicable laws. Contractor is not responsible for SLPA's employment status or benefits, which remain the responsibility of Client or the SLPA, as applicable.

Licenses and Compliance

- 5.1 Licensure. Contractor warrants that they hold a valid California Speech-Language Pathology license issued by the Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology and Hearing Aid Dispensers Board and shall maintain such licensure throughout the term of this Agreement. Contractor shall provide proof of licensure upon request.
- 5.2 Compliance with Laws. Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, including but not limited to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), California Education Code, Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), and Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).
- 5.3 Background Checks. Contractor shall comply with California Education Code § 45125.1, including fingerprinting and criminal background checks through the California Department of Justice, if required by Client. Proof of clearance shall be provided to Client prior to commencing Services.

6. Confidentiality

6.1 Confidential Information. Contractor shall maintain the confidentiality of all student records, personal information, and Client proprietary information in accordance with HIPAA, FERPA, and California law. Contractor shall not disclose such information except as required to perform Services or as mandated by law.

6.2 Return of Records. Upon termination of this Agreement, Contractor shall return or destroy all confidential information, as directed by Client, in compliance with applicable laws.

7. Insurance

- 7.1 Contractor's Insurance. Contractor shall maintain, at their own expense:
 - Professional liability insurance with minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate.
 - General liability insurance with minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 per occurrence.
 - Proof of insurance shall be provided to Client prior to commencing Services as requested.
- 7.2 Client's Insurance. Client shall maintain its own general liability and other insurance as required by law.

8. Term and Termination

- 8.1 Term. The initial term of this Agreement shall be September 11, 2025 to June 30, 2026. This Agreement shall continue in force after the termination date by automatically rolling over for successive terms of one year, up to a maximum of three years total; provided, however, that any party may terminate this Agreement upon 30 days' written notice.
- 8.2 Termination for Convenience. Either party may terminate this Agreement with 30 days' written notice.
- 8.3 Termination for Cause. Either party may terminate this Agreement immediately upon written notice if the other party breaches a material term of this Agreement and fails to cure such breach within 10 days of notice, or if Contractor's license is suspended or revoked.
- 8.4 Effect of Termination. Upon termination, Client shall pay Contractor for all Services rendered and approved expenses incurred up to the termination date. Contractor shall deliver all completed work and return Client property.

Indemnification

- 9.1 Contractor's Indemnity. Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless Client, its officers, employees, and agents from any claims, damages, or liabilities arising from Contractor's negligence, willful misconduct, or breach of this Agreement.
- 9.2 Client's Indemnity. Client shall indemnify and hold harmless Contractor from any claims, damages, or liabilities arising from Client's negligence, willful misconduct, or breach of this Agreement.

10. Dispute Resolution

- 10.1 Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California, without regard to conflict of law principles.
- 10.2 Mediation. Any disputes arising under this Agreement shall first be submitted to mediation in Kern County, California, before a mutually agreed-upon mediator. Each party shall bear its own costs of mediation.
- 10.3 Arbitration. If mediation fails, disputes shall be resolved through binding arbitration in Kern County, California, under the rules of the American Arbitration Association. The arbitrator's decision shall be final and enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction.

11. Miscellaneous

- 11.1 Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the parties and supersedes all prior agreements or understandings, written or oral.
- 11.2 Amendments. This Agreement may only be amended in writing signed by both parties.
- 11.3 Assignment. Contractor may not assign this Agreement without Client's prior written consent. Client may assign this Agreement to a successor entity with notice to Contractor.
- 11.4 Notices. All notices under this Agreement shall be in writing and delivered to the addresses listed above via certified mail or email with confirmation of receipt.
- 11.5 Severability. If any provision of this Agreement is found to be invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect.

11.6 Compliance with AB 5. The parties acknowledge that this Agreement is structured to comply with California Labor Code § 2775 et seq. (AB 5) and that Contractor meets the criteria for an independent contractor under California law.

This educator will be responsible for designing and implementing a dynamic arts curriculum that emphasizes digital art, sculpting, and media. The position reflects El Tejon Unified's commitment to using Proposition 28 resources as intended: to expand access, build program sustainability, and provide students with high-quality, standards-based arts education that nurtures creativity, critical thinking, and engagement.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN EL TEJON UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND TELEHEALTHDOCS MEDICAL CORPORATION (TELEHEALTH BASED PRIMARY CARE/SPECIALITY CARE CONSULTATION)

This Agreement for professional services ("Agreement") is effective as of October 1, 2025 (the "Effective Date"), by and between two parties, Telehealthdocs Medical Corporation ("THD"), a California Professional Corporation in good standing, headquartered at 1215 Truxtun Avenue, Suite 100, Bakersfield, California, 93301, P.O. Box 68, Bakersfield, California, 93302, and the El Tejon Unified School District "ETUSD"), a California local educational agency, 4337 Lebec Rd, Lebec, California, 93243.

The purpose of this Agreement is the provision of primary care and specialty care consultation services to students who are enrolled in ETUSD, their families and children who may not be enrolled but nevertheless reside within ETUSD's geographical boundaries. Each entity identified above is referred to individually as a "party" and collectively referred to as the "parties." Children and families being served are not parties to this Agreement.

This Agreement is not binding on ETUSD until duly presented to and approved by the ETUSD governing board and signed by its Superintendent or designees.

RECITAS

- A. THD engages physicians and other licensed practitioners and healthcare professionals, such as nurse practitioners duly licensed in various states, including the state of California, who are qualified and experienced in providing telehealth based primary care and specialty care.
- B. THD also provides non-clinical/non-medical services such as telehealth technology, technology training, and technology support services necessary to provide medical consultation visits using interactive secure audio/video technology.
- C. ETUSD is a public-school district within the state of California and desires to engage THD to provide telehealth-based services to its students and, in the sole discretion of ETUSD, their families and, in addition to the sole discretion of ETUSD, other children and their families who may reside within ETUSD's geographical boundaries.
- D. The parties anticipate that telehealth-based health services will improve healthcare access, as well as reduce illness-caused absences from school, improve academic performance, and improve the overall wellbeing of the school-age community.
- E. Services that are the subject matter of this Agreement may be provided either at a school or medical office or medical facility.
- F. This Agreement outlines the responsibilities of both parties in relation to the setup, operation, and evaluation of the Telehealth Program at designated schools within ETUSD.

- G. As this Agreement is a contract for expert professional services and advice, it is exempt from public bidding pursuant to Government Code section 53060.
- H. As this Agreement is for services which cannot be performed satisfactorily by a ETUSD employee due to the highly specialized nature of the expert knowledge and experience needed, it is a services contract authorized by Education Code section 45103.1.

NOW, THEREFORE, and in consideration of the Recitals above and the mutual covenants and conditions contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

- Recitals. The above Recitals are hereby incorporated into this Agreement as terms.
- Duration. This Agreement is effective on October 1, 2025, and remains in effect for four (4) calendar years, provided however, either party may terminate this Agreement early at any time, with or without cause, upon ninety (90) calendar days' advance notice, provided in writing to the other party.

Either party may terminate this Agreement for cause upon material breach by the other party provided such material breach continues uncured for thirty (30) days after receipt by the breaching party of written notice from the other party specifying such breach. The notice of breach under this section shall specify with reasonable particularity the nature and extent of the breach for which complaint has been made and explain how the alleged breach may be cured.

Either party may terminate this Agreement immediately by written notice to the other party upon the occurrence of any of the following events: (i) the other party is listed by a federal agency as being debarred, excluded, terminated, or otherwise ineligible for federal healthcare program participation; (ii) the other party discontinues operations for at least fifteen (15) days or loses its required licensure or accreditation; (iii) the other party files a petition in bankruptcy or makes an assignment for the benefit of creditors; (iv) if any involuntary petition in bankruptcy or petition for an arrangement pursuant to any bankruptcy laws is filed against the other party; or (v) if ETUSD does not have adequate connectivity necessary to effectuate this Agreement.

 Services Provided. THD agrees to provide the telehealth platform, training for school personnel, support services, and licensed medical professionals to conduct virtual health consultations ("Services").

THD warrants that affiliated personnel providing the Services are fully qualified and competent to provide the services called for by this Agreement. THD warrants that affiliated personnel providing telehealth and related services pursuant to this Agreement are licensed and have any required permits as may be necessary to provide the services called for by this Agreement.

THD shall at all times render the Services in accordance with: (i) professional standards of care; (ii) applicable statutes and regulations; (iii) ETUSD's written policies; and (iv) any protocols developed by the parties.

The services contemplated by this Agreement may not be provided to any individual student without THD first obtaining informed parental or guardian consent, in writing, and voluntarily given.

THD and its physicians or other healthcare professionals shall use their independent medical and professional judgment when performing professional telehealth consultation services. Neither THD nor

ETUSD shall have nor exercise any control over the professional judgment and medical decision-making of the physicians or other healthcare professionals.

THD shall exercise reasonable care so that no physician or other healthcare professional providing the Services under this Agreement: (i) is a "sanctioned person" under any federal or state program or law; (ii) has been listed in the current List of Excluded Individuals and Entities by the Office of Inspector General for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services; (iii) has been listed on the General Services Administration's List of Parties Excluded from Federal Programs; (iv) has been listed on the U.S. Department of Treasury, Office of Foreign Assets Control's Specially Designated Nationals and Blocked Persons List; or (v) has been convicted of a criminal offense related to health care.

4. <u>Billing</u>. Except to the extent inconsistent with federal or state law, THD and its physicians or other healthcare professionals shall have the sole right, as between the parties, to bill and collect for the Services from THD contracted health plans. THD will bill and collect from ETUSD for all other parties at the 2025 Medi-Cal new TRI rate (CPT 99203).

THD will charge ETUSD a fee of \$125 per hour for training and technical assistance as indicated in sections Training and Support, Quality Control and Improvement, and Reporting and Documentation that is provided to ETUSD staff. Additionally, THD medical providers will make themselves available for consultation, school training, and technical assistance during appointment slots that are unfilled, or cancelled, which will be billed at the training and technical assistance rate. ETUSD will be responsible for 2 appointment slots a day.

The maximum payable under this Agreement will not exceed \$60,000 over one (1) academic school year, July 1 to June 30 of each year. ETUSD will provide THD a spreadsheet service log with details, a month per tab, indicating which dates to provide service. This monthly service log will be attached to the monthly invoice.

5. <u>Insurance and Indemnification</u>. THD agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless ETUSD, its governing board, individual board members, officers, agents, employees, subcontractors, consultants, volunteers, and other representatives from and against any and all claims, demands, costs, expenses of whatever nature including court costs and attorneys' fees arising out of/or resulting from or arising under this Agreement. It is understood that such indemnity shall survive termination of this Agreement.

THD shall obtain, pay for, and maintain in effect during the life of this Agreement the following policies of insurance issued by an insurance company rated not less than "A-;V" in Best Insurance Rating Guide and admitted to transact insurance business in California: (1) commercial general liability insurance (including contractual, products, and completed operations coverages, bodily injury, and property damage liability) with single combined limits not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 in the aggregate per annum; (2) commercial automobile liability insurance with combined single limits of liability not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 in the aggregate per annum; (3) professional liability insurance (errors and omissions) with a limit of liability not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 in the aggregate per annum; and (4) workers' compensation insurance as required under state law. Each policy shall contain an endorsement naming ETUSD and its governing board, individual board members, officers, agents, employees, subcontractors, consultants, volunteers, and other representatives as additional insureds insofar as this Agreement is concerned, and provide that written notice shall be given to ETUSD at least 30 days prior to cancellation or material change in the form of the policy or reduction in coverage. THD shall furnish ETUSD with a certificate of insurance containing the endorsements required under this section, and ETUSD shall have the right to

inspect THD's original insurance policies upon request. All endorsements shall be received, and approved by ETUSD before Services are provided.

Upon notification of receipt of a notice of cancellation, change, or reduction in coverage, THD shall immediately file with ETUSD a certified copy of the required new or renewal policy and certificates for such policy. Nothing in this section concerning minimum insurance requirements shall reduce THD's liability or obligations under the indemnification provisions of this Agreement.

Deductibles and self-insured retentions may not exceed \$10,000.

Failure to always maintain the required insurance while this Agreement is in effect shall be a material breach, ETUSD at its sole option respectively may immediately terminate this Agreement because of said breach.

No payments shall be made until such time as THD has fully complied with all the aforementioned insurance related requirements.

ETUSD agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless THD, its Board of Trustees, officers, agents, and employees from and against any and all claims, demands, costs, expenses of whatever nature, including court costs and attorneys' fees directly and solely arising out of/or resulting from breach of default of the Agreement. It is understood and agreed that such indemnification shall survive termination of this Agreement.

6. Nondiscrimination. THD agrees to not discriminate against, nor deny to any student, services because of actual or perceived sex, sexual orientation, gender, ethnic group identification, race, ancestry, national origin, religion, color, or mental or physical disability, or age, or on the basis of a person's association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics, in any program or activity.

Roles and Responsibilities.

ETUSD will:

Infrastructure:

- Identify and prepare suitable private spaces in each participating school for telehealth sessions, equipped with necessary technology and comfort for students.
- Provide the necessary equipment such as computers, high-speed internet access, webcams, microphones, and any additional medical devices required for assessments (e.g., blood pressure monitors, thermometers) as needed.
- Ensure that all the technology used is compatible with THD's telehealth platform and complies
 with data security standards.
- Formation of the patient chart with the demographics, including but not limited to name, address, contact phone number, pharmacy, and insurance information.
- Completion of the patient intake form and consent form and any additional documentation needed to be uploaded onto THD's electronic medical record system.
- · Communications with THD staff and/or Provider on patient workflow via THD's Google Chat.

Personnel and Training:

- Designate a school nurse or trained staff member responsible for assisting students during telehealth sessions, if permissible.
- Organize and coordinate training sessions for designated staff with THD to ensure they are
 proficient in using the telehealth platform, including scheduling, student preparation, and basic
 troubleshooting.
- Designate a staff member to coordinate and schedule the patient on THD's electronic medical record system.
- Provide continuous professional development opportunities for staff to stay current with telehealth practices and procedures.

Parental Involvement:

- Develop and distribute informative materials about the telehealth program to parents and guardians.
- · Contact the parent or guardian to be involved in the medical consultation.
- Manage and maintain the process for obtaining and storing parental consent for student participation in the program.

Student Management:

- Coordinate with teachers and administrators to manage student scheduling for telehealth appointments without compromising educational time.
- Implement a system for immediate assistance for students experiencing acute health issues during school hours.

Compliance and Privacy:

- Ensure that students consent for telehealth services is obtained in compliance with applicable laws and regulations.
- Maintain compliance with FERPA, HIPAA, and state-specific privacy regulations concerning student health data.
- Develop and implement privacy protocols for students during telehealth sessions.

THD will:

Telehealth Platform:

Provide the telehealth platform tailored for the needs of the school environment, ensuring ease of
use, reliability, and compliance with healthcare regulations.

Medical Staff and Services:

 Provide access to a network of licensed healthcare professionals trained and experienced in urgent care and in delivering telehealth services. Coordinate with ETUSD to ensure availability of healthcare professionals in accordance with the school schedule and appointment requirements.

Training and Support:

- Conduct initial and periodic training for ETUSD designated staff members on the use of the telehealth platform, including patient information entry, session management, and basic technical troubleshooting.
- Provide to ETUSD staff assistance in recognizing health issues that can be managed through telehealth and those that require in-person care.

Quality Control and Improvement:

- Regularly review telehealth sessions for quality assurance and adherence to clinical protocols.
- Implement a feedback mechanism for both ETUSD staff and parents to improve service delivery and address any concerns.

Reporting and Documentation:

- Ensure that all telehealth visits are properly documented while maintaining privacy and security.
- Provide ETUSD with reports on program utilization, outcomes, and patient satisfaction, when requested.

Legal and Regulatory Compliance:

- Ensure that the services provided comply with all applicable healthcare regulations, including state telehealth laws and professional licensing requirements.
- Keep ETUSD informed of any changes in healthcare regulations that may affect the telehealth services provided.
- 8. HIPAA Compliance. The health records of THD patients which are prepared and maintained in connection with providing the Services hereunder are the property of THD. THD agrees to comply with all applicable federal and state laws and regulations relating to the maintenance, uses, and disclosures of protected health information (including any heightened requirements for mental health records) including, without limitation, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, as codified at 42 U.S.C. § 1320, et. seq. ("HIPAA"), as amended by the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, as incorporated in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, and any current and future regulations promulgated thereunder, including those published at 45 C.F.R. Parts 160, 162, and 164, all collectively referred to herein as "HIPAA Requirements." To the extent required by the HIPAA Requirements, THD shall obtain authorization and consent from the patients and/or patients' parents or legal guardians to use or disclose the patients' protected health information.
- 9. <u>Independent Contractors</u>. Nothing under this Agreement is intended, nor shall be construed, to create a partnership, employer-employee relationship, or joint venture between the parties. None of the parties (nor their respective agents or employees) shall have any authority to bind another party without such party's express written consent. Each party shall be solely responsible for reporting, withholding, and paying all taxes and other sums due to its employees or other individuals providing the

Services who may be affiliated with the party. Likewise, each party shall be solely responsible to provide and pay for all workers' compensation insurance for any employed individuals providing services on its behalf. THD may engage subcontractors to perform certain of their obligations under this Agreement, provided that no such subcontractor shall relieve THD of its respective obligations under this Agreement.

- 10. Access to Books and Records. To the extent applicable until the expiration of four (4) years after the furnishing of Services hereunder, the parties shall make available to the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services, the Comptroller General of the United States, or their duly authorized representatives, and corresponding state officials such books, documents, and records necessary to certify the nature and extent of the cost of the Services. If any Services are performed by way of subcontract with another organization and the value or cost of such subcontracted Services is ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) or more over a twelve (12) month period, such subcontract shall contain, and the respective party shall enforce, a clause to the same effect as this Section. The availability of the parties' books, documents, and records shall be subject at all times to all applicable legal requirements, including without limitation, such criteria and procedures for seeking and obtaining access.
- 11. <u>Publicity</u>. None of the parties will use for publicity, promotion, or otherwise any logo, name, trade name, service mark, or trademark of the other party or the name of any employee or agent of the other party, without that party's prior, written, express consent. Notwithstanding the foregoing, THD may publicly identify ETUSD as a user of the Services, and ETUSD may publicly identify THD as a provider of the Services. The parties may publicly announce they have entered into this Agreement.
- 12. Entire Agreement; Amendment. This Agreement sets forth the entire agreement between the parties with regard to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous oral or written agreements entered into between the parties.
- 13. Governing Law. The terms and conditions of this Agreement, as well as all disputes arising under or relating to this Agreement, shall be governed by California law, specifically excluding its choice-of-law principles. The exclusive forum and venue for the foregoing is the state court of Kern County, California.
- 14. <u>Assignment.</u> No party may assign or transfer this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other parties, such consent not to be unreasonably withheld. Any unpermitted attempt to assign all or part of this Agreement shall be null and void ab initio.
- 15. Federal Requirements. ETUSD may utilize federal funds for its payment pursuant to this Agreement. Each party to this Agreement agrees to be subject to any state or federal accounting requirements and will fully cooperate with any state or federal audit requirements. All records associated with this Agreement shall be maintained for no less than five (5) years.
- 16. Non-appropriation of Funds. Each payment obligation of ETUSD created by this Agreement is conditioned upon the availability of funds that are appropriated or allocated for the payment of services or products. If such funds are not allocated and available, this Agreement may be terminated by ETUSD at the end of the period for which funds are available. ETUSD shall notify THD at the earliest possible time before such termination.
- 17. Notices; Agency Administrator. Every notice, approval, consent, or other communication authorized or required by this Agreement shall not be effective unless same shall be in writing and sent via hand delivery or overnight delivery (with a receipt), directed to the other party at its

address provided below or such other address as either party may designate by notice from time to time, in accordance herewith:

- 18. Non-Exclusive Provider of Services. THD understands and agrees that it may not be the exclusive provider of the Services. ETUSD may retain other or additional medical professionals and related business entities for the same or similar purposes.
- 19. <u>Child Abuse Reporting Requirements</u>. THD warrants that its personnel are informed of the obligation to report child abuse and child neglect under California law including, but not limited to, Penal Code section 11164, and following, and have signed statements as set forth in Penal Code section 11166.5 to the effect that they have knowledge of the provisions of Penal Code section 11166 (reporting duty and time) and will comply with those provisions.
- 20. No Gifts or Contingent Fees. It is the policy of ETUSD to not accept gifts, gratuities, or favors of any kind or of any value whatsoever from vendors. THD warrants that it, nor any of its directors, employees, officers, or agents, nor any of their respective subsidiaries or affiliates, has taken, is currently taking, or will take any action in furtherance of an offer, payment, promise, gifts, or anything else of value, directly or indirectly, to anyone to improperly influence or otherwise secure any improper advantage in procuring business in relation to the Agreement.

THD further warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide THD employee, to solicit or secure this Agreement, and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any person, company, corporation, individual or firm, other than a bona fide employee working solely for THD, any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or any other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Agreement.

For the breach or violation of these provisions, ETUSD shall have the right to terminate this Agreement without liability.

- 21. Conflict of Interest. The parties to this Agreement have read and are aware of the provisions of section 1090, and following, and 87100, and following, of the Government Code relating to conflict of interest of public officers and employees. Each of the parties represent that it is aware of no financial or economic interest of any officer or employee of ETUSD relating to this Agreement. It is further understood that if such a financial interest does exist at the inception of this Agreement, ETUSD may immediately terminate this Agreement by giving written notice. The parties shall comply with the terms of Government Code section 87100, and following, during the term of this Agreement.
- Severability. The invalidity or unenforceability of any term or provision of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or unenforceability of any other term(s) or provision(s).

- Waiver. No waiver, including any waiver of breach, shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the parties.
- Recitals/Captions. The Recitals are incorporated into this Agreement, captions are used solely for convenience.
- 25. Force Majeure. Each party shall be excused from delays in performing its obligations if resulting from causes beyond the commercially reasonable control of the party, including default of vendors, acts of God, governmental actions, fire, flood, epidemic, and embargoes.
- 26. No Third-Party Beneficiaries. Nothing in this Agreement is intended, nor shall be deemed, to confer any benefits on any third party including, without limitation, any students, children, ETUSD families, or THD patients nor shall such person or entity have any right to seek, enforce, or recover any right or remedy with respect hereto. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by an agency or political subdivision of the state of California to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of this Agreement.
- 27. Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, all of which together shall constitute only one agreement. If any signature is delivered by facsimile or email or is signed in any electronic format, such signature shall create a valid and binding obligation with the same force and effect as if such signature were handwritten.
- 28. Attorney's Fees. Except as provided in the mutual indemnification section of this Agreement, each party shall be responsible for its own attorney's fees and costs incurred as a result of any action or proceeding under this Agreement.

Policy 6141.2: Recognition Of Religious Beliefs And Customs

Original Adopted Date: 12/01/1988 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

The Governing Board recognizes that students' education would be incomplete without an understanding of the role of religion in society. As appropriate for a particular course, teachers may objectively discuss the influences of various religions, using religious works and symbols to illustrate their relationship with culture, literature, or the arts. The Board expects that such instruction will identify principles common to all religions and foster respect for the diversity of religions and customs in the world and be consistent with the adopted instructional materials and state standards, as applicable.

In order to respect each student's individual right to freedom of religious practice, religious indoctrination is forbidden in public schools. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that instruction about religion does not promote or denigrate the beliefs or customs of any particular religion or sect, nor that a preference be shown for one religious viewpoint over another. Teachers and other district staff shall be highly sensitive to their obligation not to interfere with the religious development of any student in whatever tradition the student embraces, and treat all religions and religious convictions, including nonbelief, with fairness and respect.

Staff shall not endorse, encourage, or solicit religious or anti-religious expression or activities among students during class time.

Staff shall not coerce students in prayer or other religious activities as part of their official duties. However, staff are not prohibited, when acting in their private capacity, from encouraging students' participation in personal prayer or other religious activity. Additionally, staff shall not prohibit or discourage any student from praying or otherwise expressing the student's religious belief so long as this does not disrupt the classroom or other district-sponsored activity.

Students may express their beliefs about religion in their homework, artwork, and other class work if the expression is germane to the assignment. Such work shall be judged by ordinary academic standards, relevance, and other legitimate pedagogical objectives.

While teaching about religious holidays is a permissible part of the educational program, celebrating religious holidays is not allowed in the district. District-sponsored programs shall not be, nor have the effect of being, religiously oriented or a religious celebration. School and classroom decorations may express seasonal themes that are not religious in nature. The use of religious symbols that are part of a religious holiday is permitted as a teaching aid or resource provided that such symbols are displayed as an example of cultural and religious heritage of the holiday and temporary in nature.

Classroom methods in instruction about religion shall not include religious role-playing activities or simulated religious devotional acts.

Music, art, literature or drama programs having religious themes are permitted as part of the curriculum for district-sponsored activities and programs if presented in an objective manner and as a traditional part of cultural and religious heritage.

District schools shall not prohibit religious activities if the same or similar non-religious activities are permitted.

When required by law, the district shall notify parents/guardians that they may, via written request, opt their students out of instruction on the basis of their religious beliefs as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. Students whose parents/guardians opt them out of such instruction may be offered an alternative activity of similar educational value. Additionally, a student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction on the grounds that the student was opted out of such instruction.

Regulation 6141.2: Recognition Of Religious Beliefs And Customs

Original Adopted Date: 05/01/1985 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure the following for the recognition of religious beliefs and customs in district schools:

- 1. The approach to religion is academic and not devotional
- 2. The goal is for student awareness of religion in historical and contemporary societies
- 3. The students may not be pressed to accept any one religion
- 4. The school may include the study of religion as part of the history-social science curriculum, but the practice of religions may not be sponsored
- 5. The students may be exposed to and educated about a diversity of religious views and beliefs, but a particular view or belief may not be imposed, nor may any one religion be promoted or denigrated

Staff shall make every effort to schedule one-time events, such as examinations, district-sponsored trips, special laboratories, picture-taking days, and class parties, to minimize conflicts with major religious holidays of all faiths such that no one faith is disproportionately impacted.

Programs and Exhibits

When district programs and exhibits are in any way related to instruction about religion or religious holidays, the following guidelines shall be observed:

- 1. The principal or designee shall ensure that district-sponsored programs are presented in an objective manner, consistent with the accompanying Board policy
- 2. The principal or designee shall be kept informed of the program's development
- 3. Program or exhibit planners shall take into consideration the diverse religious faiths represented in the community, student body, and staff

Opt-Outs

When a parent/guardian submits a written request to opt the parent's/guardian's student out of instruction based on religious beliefs, customs, or practices, the request shall include the following:

- 1. The specific instructional content of which the student should be opted out
- 2. The specific religious belief(s), custom(s), and/or practice(s) with which the specific instructional content substantially interferes
- 3. How the specific instructional content substantially interferes with the specific religious belief(s), custom(s), and/or practice(s), including any grade level or individual student characteristics relevant to the opt-out request

As necessary, the Superintendent or designee may work with district legal counsel to evaluate each opt-out request and determine whether it shall be granted.

Policy 6142.1: Sexual Health And HIV/AIDS Prevention Instruction

Original Adopted Date: 07/01/2008 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

The Governing Board desires to provide a well-planned, integrated sequence of medically accurate and inclusive instruction in comprehensive sexual health and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention.

The district shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their students' education on these subjects and to impart values to their children regarding human sexuality.

As specified in the accompanying administrative regulation, the district shall strive to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect them from risks presented by sexually transmitted infections, unintended pregnancy, sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse, and human trafficking; to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors; to understand sexuality as a normal part of human development; and to develop healthy attitudes and behaviors concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family. (Education Code 51930-51939)

Each student in grades 7-12 shall receive comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education at least once in junior high or middle school and at least once in high school unless the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) opt the student out of such instruction as specified in "Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out" in the accompanying administrative regulation. (Education Code 51934)

General Criteria for Instruction and Materials

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education and the associated materials: (Education Code 51930, 51933)

- 1. Are age appropriate
- 2. Are medically accurate and objective
- 3. Are aligned with and support the following purposes:
 - a. To provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect their sexual and reproductive health from HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and from unintended pregnancy
 - b. To provide students with the knowledge and skills they need to develop healthy attitudes concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family
 - c. To promote understanding of sexuality as a normal part of human development
 - d. To ensure students receive integrated, comprehensive, accurate, and unbiased sexual health and HIV prevention education and provide educators with clear tools and guidance to accomplish that end
 - e. To provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors
- 4. Are appropriate for use with English learners, students with disabilities, and students of all races, genders, sexual orientations, and ethnic and cultural backgrounds
- 5. Are available on an equal basis to a student who is an English learner, consistent with the existing curriculum and alternative options for an English learner as otherwise provided in the Education Code
- 6. Are accessible to students with disabilities, including, but not limited to, the provision of a modified curriculum, materials, and instruction in alternative formats and auxiliary aids
- 7. Do not reflect or promote bias against any person in protected categories of discrimination pursuant to Education Code 220

- 8. Affirmatively recognize that people have different sexual orientations and, when discussing or providing examples of relationships and couples, shall be inclusive of same-sex relationships
- 9. Teach students about gender, gender expression, and gender identity, and explore the harm of negative gender stereotypes
- 10. Encourage students to communicate with their parents/guardians and other trusted adults about human sexuality and provide the knowledge and skills necessary to do so
- 11. Teach the value of and prepare students to have and maintain committed relationships such as marriage
- 12. Provide students with the knowledge and skills they need to form healthy relationships that are based on mutual respect and affection and are free from violence, coercion, harassment, and intimidation
- 13. Provide students with the knowledge and skills for making and implementing healthy decisions about sexuality, including communication and refusal skills to assist students in overcoming peer pressure and using effective decision-making skills to avoid high-risk activities
- 14. Do not teach or promote religious doctrine

Additionally, the district's comprehensive sexual health education program shall include information on the affirmative consent standard. Affirmative consent is defined as affirmative, conscious, and voluntary agreement to engage in sexual activity. Teachers delivering such instruction shall consult information related to sexual harassment and violence in the state health curriculum framework. (Education Code 51225.36, 67386)

The Superintendent or designee shall identify appropriate methods for informing parents/guardians about subjects related to the district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. The Superintendent or designee shall use such identified methods to inform parents/guardians of students in grades 6-12 about human trafficking prevention resources, as required pursuant to Education Code 49381.

Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out

At the beginning of each school year or at the time of a student's enrollment, parents/guardians shall be notified, in the manner specified in the accompanying administrative regulation, that they may request in writing to opt their students out of participating in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. Students so excused shall be given an alternative educational activity. Additionally, a student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian opts the student out of such instruction. (Education Code 51240, 51938, 51939)

Regulation 6142.1: Sexual Health And HIV/AIDS Prevention Instruction

Original Adopted Date: 07/01/2008 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

Status: ADOPTED

Definitions

Comprehensive sexual health education means education regarding human development and sexuality, including education on menstrual health, pregnancy, contraception, and sexually transmitted infections. (Education Code 51931)

HIV prevention education means instruction on the nature of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) and acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS), methods of transmission, strategies to reduce the risk of HIV infection, and social and public health issues related to HIV and AIDS. (Education Code 51931)

Age appropriate refers to topics, messages, and teaching methods suitable to particular ages or age groups of children and adolescents, based on developing cognitive, emotional, and behavioral capacity typical for the age or age group. (Education Code 51931)

Medically accurate means verified or supported by research conducted in compliance with scientific methods and published in peer-reviewed journals, where appropriate, and recognized as accurate and objective by professional organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant field, such as the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American Public Health Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists. (Education Code 51931)

Components of Sexual Health and HIV Prevention Education

In addition to complying with the criteria listed in "General Criteria for Instruction and Materials" in the accompanying Board policy, the district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education for students in grades 7-12 shall include all of the following: (Education Code 51934)

- 1. Information on the nature of HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and their effects on the human body
- 2. Information on the manner in which HIV and other sexually transmitted infections are and are not transmitted, including information on the relative risk of infection according to specific behaviors, including sexual behaviors and injection drug use
- 3. Information that abstinence from sexual activity and injection drug use is the only certain way to prevent HIV and other sexually transmitted infections, and that abstinence from sexual intercourse is the only certain way to prevent unintended pregnancy
 - The instruction shall provide information about the value of delaying sexual activity while also providing medically accurate information on other methods of preventing HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and pregnancy.
- 4. Information about the effectiveness and safety of all federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved methods that prevent or reduce the risk of contracting HIV and other sexually transmitted infections, including use of antiretroviral medication, consistent with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
- 5. Information about the effectiveness and safety of reducing the risk of HIV transmission as a result of injection drug use by decreasing needle use and needle sharing
- 6. Information about the treatment of HIV and other sexually transmitted infections, including how antiretroviral therapy can dramatically prolong the lives of many people living with HIV and reduce the likelihood of transmitting HIV to others
- 7. Discussion about social views on HIV and AIDS, including addressing unfounded stereotypes and myths regarding HIV and AIDS and people living with HIV

This instruction shall emphasize that successfully treated HIV-positive individuals have a normal life expectancy, all people are at some risk of contracting HIV, and testing is the only way to know if one is HIV-positive.

- 8. Information about local resources, how to access local resources, and students' legal rights to access local resources for sexual and reproductive health care such as testing and medical care for HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and pregnancy prevention and care, as well as local resources for assistance with sexual assault and intimate partner violence
- 9. Information about the effectiveness and safety of FDA-approved contraceptive methods in preventing pregnancy, including, but not limited to, emergency contraception

Instruction on pregnancy shall include an objective discussion of all legally available pregnancy outcomes, including, but not limited to:

- a. Parenting, adoption, and abortion
- b. Information on the law on surrendering physical custody of a minor child 72 hours of age or younger, pursuant to Health and Safety Code 1255.7 and Penal Code 271.5
- c. The importance of prenatal care
- 10. Information about sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse, and human trafficking, including:
 - a. Information on the prevalence and nature of human trafficking, strategies to reduce the risk of human trafficking, techniques to set healthy boundaries, and how to safely seek assistance if there is a suspicion of trafficking
 - b. Information on how social media and mobile device applications are used for human trafficking
- 11. Information about adolescent relationship abuse and intimate partner violence, including the early warning signs of each, and the resources available to students related to adolescent relationship abuse and intimate partner violence, including the National Domestic Violence Hotline and local domestic violence hotlines that provide confidential support services for students that have experienced domestic violence or stalking

The district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education shall include instruction regarding the potential risks and consequences of creating and sharing suggestive or sexually explicit materials through cell phones, social networking websites, computer networks, or other digital media. (Education Code 51934)

Professional Development

The district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education shall be provided by instructors trained in the appropriate courses who are knowledgeable of the most recent medically accurate research on human sexuality, healthy relationships, pregnancy, and HIV and other sexually transmitted infections. (Education Code 51931, 51934)

The Superintendent or designee shall cooperatively plan and conduct in-service training for all district personnel who provide HIV prevention education, through regional planning, joint powers agreements, or contract services. (Education Code 51935)

In developing and providing in-service training, the Superintendent or designee shall cooperate and collaborate with the teachers who provide HIV prevention education and with the California Department of Education (CDE). (Education Code 51935)

The district shall periodically conduct in-service training to enable district personnel to learn new developments in the scientific understanding of HIV. In-service training shall be voluntary for personnel who have demonstrated expertise or received in-service training from CDE or the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. (Education Code 51935)

The Superintendent or designee may expand HIV in-service training to cover the topic of comprehensive sexual health education in order for district personnel teaching comprehensive sexual health education to learn new developments in the scientific understanding of sexual health. (Education Code 51935)

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically provide continuing education that enables district personnel to learn about new developments in the understanding of abuse, including sexual abuse, and human trafficking, and current prevention efforts and methods. Such education may include early identification of abuse, including sexual abuse, and human trafficking of students and minors. (Education Code 51950)

Use of Consultants or Guest Speakers

The Superintendent or designee may contract with outside consultants or guest speakers, including those who have developed multilingual curricula or curricula accessible to persons with disabilities, to deliver comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education or to provide training for district personnel. All outside consultants and guest speakers shall have expertise in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education and knowledge of the most recent medically accurate research on the relevant topic(s) covered in the instruction. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any instruction provided by an outside speaker or consultant complies with Board policy, administrative regulation, and Education Code 51930-51939. (Education Code 51933, 51934, 51936)

Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out

At the beginning of each school year or at the time of a student's enrollment, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians about comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education, as well as research on student health behaviors and risks, planned for the coming year. The notice shall advise parents/guardians: (Education Code 48980, 51938)

- 1. That written and audiovisual educational materials to be used in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education are available for inspection
- 2. That parents/guardians have a right to opt their students out of comprehensive sexual health or HIV prevention education, or research on student health behaviors and risks, provided they submit their request in writing to the district
- 3. That parents/guardians have a right to request a copy of Education Code 51930-51939
- 4. Whether the comprehensive sexual health or HIV prevention education will be taught by district personnel or outside consultants and, if the district chooses to use outside consultants or guest speakers for this purpose, the following information:
 - a. The date of the instruction
 - b. The name of the organization or affiliation of each guest speaker
 - c. Information stating the right of the parent/guardian to request a copy of Education Code 51933, 51934, and 51938

If the arrangements for instruction by outside consultants or guest speakers are made after the beginning of the school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians by mail or another commonly used method of notification no fewer than 14 days before the instruction is given.

Except as required by law, the requirements of Education Code 51930-51939 pertaining to instructional content, teacher training, and parent/guardian notification and opt-out shall not apply to the following: (Education Code 51932)

- A description or illustration of human reproductive organs that may appear in a textbook, adopted pursuant to law, if the textbook does not include other elements of comprehensive sexual health or HIV prevention education as defined in Education Code 51931
- 2. Instruction, materials, presentations, or programming that discusses gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, discrimination, harassment, bullying, intimidation, relationships, or family and does not discuss human reproductive organs and their functions

Policy 6142.8: Comprehensive Health Education

Original Adopted Date: 11/01/2003 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

The Governing Board believes that health education should foster the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that students need in order to lead healthy lives and avoid high-risk behaviors, and that creating a safe, supportive, inclusive, and nonjudgmental environment is crucial to promoting healthy development for all students. The district's health education program shall be part of a coordinated approach to student health which recognizes that mental health and social connection are critical to overall health, well-being, and academic success; supports the physical, mental, and social well-being of students; reflects the importance of digital and media literacy; and is linked to district and community services and resources.

Goals for the district's health education program shall be designed to promote student wellness and shall include, but not be limited to, goals for nutrition promotion and education, physical activity, and other district-based activities that promote student well-being.

Any health education course offered to middle or high school students shall include instruction in mental health that meets the requirements of Education Code 51925-51926, and as specified in Administrative Regulation 6143 - Courses of Study.

The district shall provide a planned, sequential, research-based, and developmentally appropriate health education curriculum for students in grades kindergarten-12 that is aligned with the state's content standards and curriculum framework and integrated with other content areas of the district's curriculum. The Superintendent or designee shall determine the grade levels and subject areas in which health-related topics will be addressed, in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall involve school administrators, teachers, school nurses, health professionals representing various fields of health care, parents/guardians, community-based organizations, and other community members in the development, implementation, and evaluation of the district's health education program. Health and safety professionals may be invited to provide related instruction in the classroom, school assemblies, and other instructional settings.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as needed to ensure that health education teachers are knowledgeable about academic content standards, the state curriculum framework, and effective instructional methodologies.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide periodic reports to the Board regarding the implementation and effectiveness of the district's health education program, which may include, but not be limited to, a description of the district's program and the extent to which it is aligned with the state's content standards and curriculum framework, the amount of time allotted for health instruction at each grade level, student achievement of district standards for health education, and the manner in which the district's health education program supports the physical, mental, and social well-being of students.

Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out

Parents/guardians shall be notified that they may request in writing to opt their students out of participating in instruction and assessments, including anonymous and confidential tests, questionnaires, and surveys, as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. Students so excused shall be given an alternative educational activity. Additionally, a student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian opts the student out of such instruction. (Education Code 51240, 51900.6, 51938, 51939)

Regulation 6142.8: Comprehensive Health Education

Original Adopted Date: 11/01/2003 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

Content of Instruction

The district's health education program shall include instruction at the appropriate grade levels in the following content areas:

- 1. Alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs
- 2. Human growth, development, and sexual health
- 3. Injury prevention and safety

Instruction related to injury prevention and safety may include, but is not limited to, first aid, protective equipment such as helmets, violence prevention, topics related to bullying and harassment, emergency procedures, and Internet safety.

4. Mental, emotional, and social health

Health education courses offered to middle and/or high school students shall include mental health instruction that meets the requirements of Education Code 51925-51927, as specified in Administrative Regulation 6143 - Courses of Study.

- 5. Nutrition and physical activity
- 6. Personal and community health

Instruction in personal and community health may include, but is not limited to, oral health, personal hygiene, sun safety, vision and hearing protection, transmission of germs and communicable diseases, symptoms of common health problems and chronic diseases, and the effect of behavior on the environment.

Within each of the above content areas, instruction shall be designed to assist students in developing:

- 1. An understanding of essential concepts related to enhancing health
- 2. The ability to analyze internal and external influences that affect health
- 3. The ability to access and analyze health information, products, and services
- 4. The ability to use interpersonal communication skills, decision-making skills, and goal-setting skills to enhance health
- 5. The ability to practice behaviors that reduce risk and promote health
- 6. The ability to promote and support personal, family, and community health

High School Health Education

Whenever the Governing Board requires a course in health education for graduation from high school, the district's high school health education course(s) shall include instruction in:

1. Sexual harassment and violence, including, but not limited to, the affirmative consent standard as defined in Education Code 67386 (Education Code 51225.36)

When delivering such instruction, teachers shall consult information related to sexual harassment and violence in the Health Education Framework for California Public Schools. (Education Code 51225.36)

- 2. Compression-only cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), which is based on national evidence-based emergency cardiovascular care guidelines for the performance of compression-only CPR and includes instruction relative to the psychomotor skills necessary to perform compression-only CPR (Education Code 51225.6)
- 3. Starting with the 2026-27 school year, the dangers associated with fentanyl use (Education Code 51225.38)

Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out

At the beginning of each school year or at the time of a student's enrollment, parents/guardians shall be notified that they may request in writing to opt their students out of participating in the following:

- 1. Anonymous, voluntary, and confidential tests, questionnaires, and surveys containing age-appropriate questions about students' attitudes concerning or practices relating to sex (Education Code 51938, 51939)
- 2. Any instruction in health that conflicts with the student's religious training and beliefs, including personal moral convictions (Education Code 51240)
- 3. Any instruction in sexual abuse and/or sexual assault awareness and prevention (Education Code 51900.6
- 4. Any instruction in comprehensive sexual health and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention (Education Code 51938, 51939)
- 5. Any other instruction as permitted by law

Additionally, the district shall not administer any exam, survey, or questionnaire that contains questions about the student's or the student's family's personal beliefs or practices in sex, family life, morality, or religion unless the student's parent/guardian has given written permission. (Education Code 51513)

Involvement of Health Professionals

Health care professionals, health care service plans, health care providers, and other entities participating in a voluntary initiative with the district are prohibited from communicating about a product or service in a way that is intended to encourage persons to purchase or use the product or service. However, the following activities may be allowed: (Education Code 51890)

- 1. Health care or health education information provided in a brochure or pamphlet that contains the logo or name of a health care service plan or health care organization, if provided in coordination with the voluntary initiative
- 2. Outreach, application assistance, and enrollment activities relating to federal, state, or county-sponsored health care insurance programs if the activities are conducted in compliance with the statutory, regulatory, and programmatic guidelines applicable to those programs

Policy 6141.2: Recognition Of Religious Beliefs And Customs

Original Adopted Date: 12/01/1988 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

The Governing Board recognizes that students' education would be incomplete without an understanding of the role of religion in society. As appropriate for a particular course, teachers may objectively discuss the influences of various religions, using religious works and symbols to illustrate their relationship with culture, literature, or the arts. The Board expects that such instruction will identify principles common to all religions and foster respect for the diversity of religions and customs in the world and be consistent with the adopted instructional materials and state standards, as applicable.

In order to respect each student's individual right to freedom of religious practice, religious indoctrination is forbidden in public schools. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that instruction about religion does not promote or denigrate the beliefs or customs of any particular religion or sect, nor that a preference be shown for one religious viewpoint over another. Teachers and other district staff shall be highly sensitive to their obligation not to interfere with the religious development of any student in whatever tradition the student embraces, and treat all religions and religious convictions, including nonbelief, with fairness and respect.

Staff shall not endorse, encourage, or solicit religious or anti-religious expression or activities among students during class time.

Staff shall not coerce students in prayer or other religious activities as part of their official duties. However, staff are not prohibited, when acting in their private capacity, from encouraging students' participation in personal prayer or other religious activity. Additionally, staff shall not prohibit or discourage any student from praying or otherwise expressing the student's religious belief so long as this does not disrupt the classroom or other district-sponsored activity.

Students may express their beliefs about religion in their homework, artwork, and other class work if the expression is germane to the assignment. Such work shall be judged by ordinary academic standards, relevance, and other legitimate pedagogical objectives.

While teaching about religious holidays is a permissible part of the educational program, celebrating religious holidays is not allowed in the district. District-sponsored programs shall not be, nor have the effect of being, religiously oriented or a religious celebration. School and classroom decorations may express seasonal themes that are not religious in nature. The use of religious symbols that are part of a religious holiday is permitted as a teaching aid or resource provided that such symbols are displayed as an example of cultural and religious heritage of the holiday and temporary in nature.

Classroom methods in instruction about religion shall not include religious role-playing activities or simulated religious devotional acts.

Music, art, literature or drama programs having religious themes are permitted as part of the curriculum for district-sponsored activities and programs if presented in an objective manner and as a traditional part of cultural and religious heritage.

District schools shall not prohibit religious activities if the same or similar non-religious activities are permitted.

When required by law, the district shall notify parents/guardians that they may, via written request, opt their students out of instruction on the basis of their religious beliefs as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. Students whose parents/guardians opt them out of such instruction may be offered an alternative activity of similar educational value. Additionally, a student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction on the grounds that the student was opted out of such instruction.

Regulation 6141.2: Recognition Of Religious Beliefs And Customs

Original Adopted Date: 05/01/1985 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure the following for the recognition of religious beliefs and customs in district schools:

- 1. The approach to religion is academic and not devotional
- 2. The goal is for student awareness of religion in historical and contemporary societies
- 3. The students may not be pressed to accept any one religion
- 4. The school may include the study of religion as part of the history-social science curriculum, but the practice of religions may not be sponsored
- 5. The students may be exposed to and educated about a diversity of religious views and beliefs, but a particular view or belief may not be imposed, nor may any one religion be promoted or denigrated

Staff shall make every effort to schedule one-time events, such as examinations, district-sponsored trips, special laboratories, picture-taking days, and class parties, to minimize conflicts with major religious holidays of all faiths such that no one faith is disproportionately impacted.

Programs and Exhibits

When district programs and exhibits are in any way related to instruction about religion or religious holidays, the following guidelines shall be observed:

- 1. The principal or designee shall ensure that district-sponsored programs are presented in an objective manner, consistent with the accompanying Board policy
- 2. The principal or designee shall be kept informed of the program's development
- 3. Program or exhibit planners shall take into consideration the diverse religious faiths represented in the community, student body, and staff

Opt-Outs

When a parent/guardian submits a written request to opt the parent's/guardian's student out of instruction based on religious beliefs, customs, or practices, the request shall include the following:

- 1. The specific instructional content of which the student should be opted out
- 2. The specific religious belief(s), custom(s), and/or practice(s) with which the specific instructional content substantially interferes
- 3. How the specific instructional content substantially interferes with the specific religious belief(s), custom(s), and/or practice(s), including any grade level or individual student characteristics relevant to the opt-out request

As necessary, the Superintendent or designee may work with district legal counsel to evaluate each opt-out request and determine whether it shall be granted.

Policy 6142.1: Sexual Health And HIV/AIDS Prevention Instruction

Original Adopted Date: 07/01/2008 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

The Governing Board desires to provide a well-planned, integrated sequence of medically accurate and inclusive instruction in comprehensive sexual health and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention.

The district shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their students' education on these subjects and to impart values to their children regarding human sexuality.

As specified in the accompanying administrative regulation, the district shall strive to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect them from risks presented by sexually transmitted infections, unintended pregnancy, sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse, and human trafficking; to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors; to understand sexuality as a normal part of human development; and to develop healthy attitudes and behaviors concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family. (Education Code 51930-51939)

Each student in grades 7-12 shall receive comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education at least once in junior high or middle school and at least once in high school unless the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) opt the student out of such instruction as specified in "Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out" in the accompanying administrative regulation. (Education Code 51934)

General Criteria for Instruction and Materials

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education and the associated materials: (Education Code 51930, 51933)

- 1. Are age appropriate
- 2. Are medically accurate and objective
- 3. Are aligned with and support the following purposes:
 - a. To provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect their sexual and reproductive health from HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and from unintended pregnancy
 - b. To provide students with the knowledge and skills they need to develop healthy attitudes concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family
 - c. To promote understanding of sexuality as a normal part of human development
 - d. To ensure students receive integrated, comprehensive, accurate, and unbiased sexual health and HIV prevention education and provide educators with clear tools and guidance to accomplish that end
 - e. To provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors
- 4. Are appropriate for use with English learners, students with disabilities, and students of all races, genders, sexual orientations, and ethnic and cultural backgrounds
- 5. Are available on an equal basis to a student who is an English learner, consistent with the existing curriculum and alternative options for an English learner as otherwise provided in the Education Code
- 6. Are accessible to students with disabilities, including, but not limited to, the provision of a modified curriculum, materials, and instruction in alternative formats and auxiliary aids
- 7. Do not reflect or promote bias against any person in protected categories of discrimination pursuant to Education Code 220

- 8. Affirmatively recognize that people have different sexual orientations and, when discussing or providing examples of relationships and couples, shall be inclusive of same-sex relationships
- 9. Teach students about gender, gender expression, and gender identity, and explore the harm of negative gender stereotypes
- 10. Encourage students to communicate with their parents/guardians and other trusted adults about human sexuality and provide the knowledge and skills necessary to do so
- 11. Teach the value of and prepare students to have and maintain committed relationships such as marriage
- 12. Provide students with the knowledge and skills they need to form healthy relationships that are based on mutual respect and affection and are free from violence, coercion, harassment, and intimidation
- 13. Provide students with the knowledge and skills for making and implementing healthy decisions about sexuality, including communication and refusal skills to assist students in overcoming peer pressure and using effective decision-making skills to avoid high-risk activities
- 14. Do not teach or promote religious doctrine

Additionally, the district's comprehensive sexual health education program shall include information on the affirmative consent standard. Affirmative consent is defined as affirmative, conscious, and voluntary agreement to engage in sexual activity. Teachers delivering such instruction shall consult information related to sexual harassment and violence in the state health curriculum framework. (Education Code 51225.36, 67386)

The Superintendent or designee shall identify appropriate methods for informing parents/guardians about subjects related to the district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. The Superintendent or designee shall use such identified methods to inform parents/guardians of students in grades 6-12 about human trafficking prevention resources, as required pursuant to Education Code 49381.

Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out

At the beginning of each school year or at the time of a student's enrollment, parents/guardians shall be notified, in the manner specified in the accompanying administrative regulation, that they may request in writing to opt their students out of participating in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. Students so excused shall be given an alternative educational activity. Additionally, a student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian opts the student out of such instruction. (Education Code 51240, 51938, 51939)

Regulation 6142.1: Sexual Health And HIV/AIDS Prevention Instruction

Original Adopted Date: 07/01/2008 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

Definitions

Comprehensive sexual health education means education regarding human development and sexuality, including education on menstrual health, pregnancy, contraception, and sexually transmitted infections. (Education Code 51931)

HIV prevention education means instruction on the nature of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) and acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS), methods of transmission, strategies to reduce the risk of HIV infection, and social and public health issues related to HIV and AIDS. (Education Code 51931)

Age appropriate refers to topics, messages, and teaching methods suitable to particular ages or age groups of children and adolescents, based on developing cognitive, emotional, and behavioral capacity typical for the age or age group. (Education Code 51931)

Medically accurate means verified or supported by research conducted in compliance with scientific methods and published in peer-reviewed journals, where appropriate, and recognized as accurate and objective by professional organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant field, such as the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American Public Health Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists. (Education Code 51931)

Components of Sexual Health and HIV Prevention Education

In addition to complying with the criteria listed in "General Criteria for Instruction and Materials" in the accompanying Board policy, the district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education for students in grades 7-12 shall include all of the following: (Education Code 51934)

- 1. Information on the nature of HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and their effects on the human body
- 2. Information on the manner in which HIV and other sexually transmitted infections are and are not transmitted, including information on the relative risk of infection according to specific behaviors, including sexual behaviors and injection drug use
- 3. Information that abstinence from sexual activity and injection drug use is the only certain way to prevent HIV and other sexually transmitted infections, and that abstinence from sexual intercourse is the only certain way to prevent unintended pregnancy
 - The instruction shall provide information about the value of delaying sexual activity while also providing medically accurate information on other methods of preventing HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and pregnancy.
- 4. Information about the effectiveness and safety of all federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved methods that prevent or reduce the risk of contracting HIV and other sexually transmitted infections, including use of antiretroviral medication, consistent with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
- 5. Information about the effectiveness and safety of reducing the risk of HIV transmission as a result of injection drug use by decreasing needle use and needle sharing
- 6. Information about the treatment of HIV and other sexually transmitted infections, including how antiretroviral therapy can dramatically prolong the lives of many people living with HIV and reduce the likelihood of transmitting HIV to others
- 7. Discussion about social views on HIV and AIDS, including addressing unfounded stereotypes and myths regarding HIV and AIDS and people living with HIV

This instruction shall emphasize that successfully treated HIV-positive individuals have a normal life expectancy, all people are at some risk of contracting HIV, and testing is the only way to know if one is HIV-positive.

- 8. Information about local resources, how to access local resources, and students' legal rights to access local resources for sexual and reproductive health care such as testing and medical care for HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and pregnancy prevention and care, as well as local resources for assistance with sexual assault and intimate partner violence
- 9. Information about the effectiveness and safety of FDA-approved contraceptive methods in preventing pregnancy, including, but not limited to, emergency contraception

Instruction on pregnancy shall include an objective discussion of all legally available pregnancy outcomes, including, but not limited to:

- a. Parenting, adoption, and abortion
- b. Information on the law on surrendering physical custody of a minor child 72 hours of age or younger, pursuant to Health and Safety Code 1255.7 and Penal Code 271.5
- c. The importance of prenatal care
- 10. Information about sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse, and human trafficking, including:
 - a. Information on the prevalence and nature of human trafficking, strategies to reduce the risk of human trafficking, techniques to set healthy boundaries, and how to safely seek assistance if there is a suspicion of trafficking
 - b. Information on how social media and mobile device applications are used for human trafficking
- 11. Information about adolescent relationship abuse and intimate partner violence, including the early warning signs of each, and the resources available to students related to adolescent relationship abuse and intimate partner violence, including the National Domestic Violence Hotline and local domestic violence hotlines that provide confidential support services for students that have experienced domestic violence or stalking

The district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education shall include instruction regarding the potential risks and consequences of creating and sharing suggestive or sexually explicit materials through cell phones, social networking websites, computer networks, or other digital media. (Education Code 51934)

Professional Development

The district's comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education shall be provided by instructors trained in the appropriate courses who are knowledgeable of the most recent medically accurate research on human sexuality, healthy relationships, pregnancy, and HIV and other sexually transmitted infections. (Education Code 51931, 51934)

The Superintendent or designee shall cooperatively plan and conduct in-service training for all district personnel who provide HIV prevention education, through regional planning, joint powers agreements, or contract services. (Education Code 51935)

In developing and providing in-service training, the Superintendent or designee shall cooperate and collaborate with the teachers who provide HIV prevention education and with the California Department of Education (CDE). (Education Code 51935)

The district shall periodically conduct in-service training to enable district personnel to learn new developments in the scientific understanding of HIV. In-service training shall be voluntary for personnel who have demonstrated expertise or received in-service training from CDE or the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. (Education Code 51935)

The Superintendent or designee may expand HIV in-service training to cover the topic of comprehensive sexual health education in order for district personnel teaching comprehensive sexual health education to learn new developments in the scientific understanding of sexual health. (Education Code 51935)

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically provide continuing education that enables district personnel to learn about new developments in the understanding of abuse, including sexual abuse, and human trafficking, and current prevention efforts and methods. Such education may include early identification of abuse, including sexual abuse, and human trafficking of students and minors. (Education Code 51950)

Use of Consultants or Guest Speakers

The Superintendent or designee may contract with outside consultants or guest speakers, including those who have developed multilingual curricula or curricula accessible to persons with disabilities, to deliver comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education or to provide training for district personnel. All outside consultants and guest speakers shall have expertise in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education and knowledge of the most recent medically accurate research on the relevant topic(s) covered in the instruction. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any instruction provided by an outside speaker or consultant complies with Board policy, administrative regulation, and Education Code 51930-51939. (Education Code 51933, 51934, 51936)

Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out

At the beginning of each school year or at the time of a student's enrollment, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians about comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education, as well as research on student health behaviors and risks, planned for the coming year. The notice shall advise parents/guardians: (Education Code 48980, 51938)

- 1. That written and audiovisual educational materials to be used in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education are available for inspection
- 2. That parents/guardians have a right to opt their students out of comprehensive sexual health or HIV prevention education, or research on student health behaviors and risks, provided they submit their request in writing to the district
- 3. That parents/guardians have a right to request a copy of Education Code 51930-51939
- 4. Whether the comprehensive sexual health or HIV prevention education will be taught by district personnel or outside consultants and, if the district chooses to use outside consultants or guest speakers for this purpose, the following information:
 - a. The date of the instruction
 - b. The name of the organization or affiliation of each guest speaker
 - c. Information stating the right of the parent/guardian to request a copy of Education Code 51933, 51934, and 51938

If the arrangements for instruction by outside consultants or guest speakers are made after the beginning of the school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians by mail or another commonly used method of notification no fewer than 14 days before the instruction is given.

Except as required by law, the requirements of Education Code 51930-51939 pertaining to instructional content, teacher training, and parent/guardian notification and opt-out shall not apply to the following: (Education Code 51932)

- A description or illustration of human reproductive organs that may appear in a textbook, adopted pursuant to law, if the textbook does not include other elements of comprehensive sexual health or HIV prevention education as defined in Education Code 51931
- 2. Instruction, materials, presentations, or programming that discusses gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, discrimination, harassment, bullying, intimidation, relationships, or family and does not discuss human reproductive organs and their functions

Policy 6142.8: Comprehensive Health Education

Original Adopted Date: 11/01/2003 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

The Governing Board believes that health education should foster the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that students need in order to lead healthy lives and avoid high-risk behaviors, and that creating a safe, supportive, inclusive, and nonjudgmental environment is crucial to promoting healthy development for all students. The district's health education program shall be part of a coordinated approach to student health which recognizes that mental health and social connection are critical to overall health, well-being, and academic success; supports the physical, mental, and social well-being of students; reflects the importance of digital and media literacy; and is linked to district and community services and resources.

Goals for the district's health education program shall be designed to promote student wellness and shall include, but not be limited to, goals for nutrition promotion and education, physical activity, and other district-based activities that promote student well-being.

Any health education course offered to middle or high school students shall include instruction in mental health that meets the requirements of Education Code 51925-51926, and as specified in Administrative Regulation 6143 - Courses of Study.

The district shall provide a planned, sequential, research-based, and developmentally appropriate health education curriculum for students in grades kindergarten-12 that is aligned with the state's content standards and curriculum framework and integrated with other content areas of the district's curriculum. The Superintendent or designee shall determine the grade levels and subject areas in which health-related topics will be addressed, in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall involve school administrators, teachers, school nurses, health professionals representing various fields of health care, parents/guardians, community-based organizations, and other community members in the development, implementation, and evaluation of the district's health education program. Health and safety professionals may be invited to provide related instruction in the classroom, school assemblies, and other instructional settings.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as needed to ensure that health education teachers are knowledgeable about academic content standards, the state curriculum framework, and effective instructional methodologies.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide periodic reports to the Board regarding the implementation and effectiveness of the district's health education program, which may include, but not be limited to, a description of the district's program and the extent to which it is aligned with the state's content standards and curriculum framework, the amount of time allotted for health instruction at each grade level, student achievement of district standards for health education, and the manner in which the district's health education program supports the physical, mental, and social well-being of students.

Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out

Parents/guardians shall be notified that they may request in writing to opt their students out of participating in instruction and assessments, including anonymous and confidential tests, questionnaires, and surveys, as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. Students so excused shall be given an alternative educational activity. Additionally, a student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian opts the student out of such instruction. (Education Code 51240, 51900.6, 51938, 51939)

Regulation 6142.8: Comprehensive Health Education

Original Adopted Date: 11/01/2003 | Last Revised Date: 08/01/2025 | Last Reviewed Date: 08/01/2025

Content of Instruction

The district's health education program shall include instruction at the appropriate grade levels in the following content areas:

- 1. Alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs
- 2. Human growth, development, and sexual health
- 3. Injury prevention and safety

Instruction related to injury prevention and safety may include, but is not limited to, first aid, protective equipment such as helmets, violence prevention, topics related to bullying and harassment, emergency procedures, and Internet safety.

4. Mental, emotional, and social health

Health education courses offered to middle and/or high school students shall include mental health instruction that meets the requirements of Education Code 51925-51927, as specified in Administrative Regulation 6143 - Courses of Study.

- 5. Nutrition and physical activity
- 6. Personal and community health

Instruction in personal and community health may include, but is not limited to, oral health, personal hygiene, sun safety, vision and hearing protection, transmission of germs and communicable diseases, symptoms of common health problems and chronic diseases, and the effect of behavior on the environment.

Within each of the above content areas, instruction shall be designed to assist students in developing:

- 1. An understanding of essential concepts related to enhancing health
- 2. The ability to analyze internal and external influences that affect health
- 3. The ability to access and analyze health information, products, and services
- 4. The ability to use interpersonal communication skills, decision-making skills, and goal-setting skills to enhance health
- 5. The ability to practice behaviors that reduce risk and promote health
- 6. The ability to promote and support personal, family, and community health

High School Health Education

Whenever the Governing Board requires a course in health education for graduation from high school, the district's high school health education course(s) shall include instruction in:

1. Sexual harassment and violence, including, but not limited to, the affirmative consent standard as defined in Education Code 67386 (Education Code 51225.36)

When delivering such instruction, teachers shall consult information related to sexual harassment and violence in the Health Education Framework for California Public Schools. (Education Code 51225.36)

- 2. Compression-only cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), which is based on national evidence-based emergency cardiovascular care guidelines for the performance of compression-only CPR and includes instruction relative to the psychomotor skills necessary to perform compression-only CPR (Education Code 51225.6)
- 3. Starting with the 2026-27 school year, the dangers associated with fentanyl use (Education Code 51225.38)

Parent/Guardian Notification and Opt-Out

At the beginning of each school year or at the time of a student's enrollment, parents/guardians shall be notified that they may request in writing to opt their students out of participating in the following:

- 1. Anonymous, voluntary, and confidential tests, questionnaires, and surveys containing age-appropriate questions about students' attitudes concerning or practices relating to sex (Education Code 51938, 51939)
- 2. Any instruction in health that conflicts with the student's religious training and beliefs, including personal moral convictions (Education Code 51240)
- 3. Any instruction in sexual abuse and/or sexual assault awareness and prevention (Education Code 51900.6
- 4. Any instruction in comprehensive sexual health and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention (Education Code 51938, 51939)
- 5. Any other instruction as permitted by law

Additionally, the district shall not administer any exam, survey, or questionnaire that contains questions about the student's or the student's family's personal beliefs or practices in sex, family life, morality, or religion unless the student's parent/guardian has given written permission. (Education Code 51513)

Involvement of Health Professionals

Health care professionals, health care service plans, health care providers, and other entities participating in a voluntary initiative with the district are prohibited from communicating about a product or service in a way that is intended to encourage persons to purchase or use the product or service. However, the following activities may be allowed: (Education Code 51890)

- 1. Health care or health education information provided in a brochure or pamphlet that contains the logo or name of a health care service plan or health care organization, if provided in coordination with the voluntary initiative
- 2. Outreach, application assistance, and enrollment activities relating to federal, state, or county-sponsored health care insurance programs if the activities are conducted in compliance with the statutory, regulatory, and programmatic guidelines applicable to those programs

AGREEMENT BETWEEN KERN COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS DIVISION OF SPECIAL EDUCATION AND KERN COUNTY CONSORTIUM SELPA PARTICIPATING DISTRICTS 2025 - 2026

Recitals

- A. EL TEJON SCHOOL DISTRICT (hereinafter referred to as SCHOOL DISTRICT) is required by law to provide special education services to eligible district pupils and to be a member of a Special Education Local Plan Agency. Pursuant to law, SCHOOL DISTRICT is a participating district in the Kern County Consortium for Special Education (SELPA).
- The KCSOS Division of Special Education agrees to provide special education services to SELPA member district pupils.
- C. The purpose of this Agreement is to delineate the functions and responsibilities of the SCHOOL DISTRICT and KCSOS when the KCSOS Division of Special Education is a provider of special education services to SCHOOL DISTRICT's pupils.

Terms

By their authorized signatures, below, the parties mutually agree as follows:

- The initial term of this Agreement is July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2026. This Agreement shall renew annually as long as SCHOOL DISTRICT (the District) and KCSOS are participants in the SELPA and provided that this Agreement is consistent with the SELPA's Local Plan.
- KCSOS Division of Special Education agrees to conduct special education programs and classes for pupils legally eligible for those programs and services. Services will be consistent with each pupil's Individualized Education Program. Related services may also be provided by KCSOS when identified in the IEP.
- Part C to Part B Available Assessment Services: Should a District's pupil who is transitioning out of the Early Start (Part C) program require a Part C to Part B assessment and the District wishes to use the Assessment and Support Team available through KCSOS Division of Special Education, the District shall refer the pupil through the SELPA's Search and Serve Process – See Appendix B for details of the Part C to Part B Procedure.
- Funding
 - A. ADA Revenue

Districts will continue to receive all of the ADA revenue generated by "District" students educated in the KCSOS Special Education Programs. (There is no Revenue Limit Transfer to KCSOS in existence with the LCFF model.)

B. Program Allowance and Reimbursement

The District agrees to pay KCSOS on a "straight bill back" per pupil basis for programs and services provided to District's pupils by the Division of Special Education. Cost per pupil to the District shall be computed according to the formula

set forth in Appendix A - Program. This amount is due and payable in 10 equal transfers, beginning in September of each year.

C. Special Circumstances

If an IEP Team specifies additional and/or extraordinary services for a pupil covered by this Agreement, and if these services require an expenditure of funds significantly greater than normally required by other students in the program provided by KCSOS's Division of Special Education, a separate agreement between KCSOS and the District shall be drawn accordingly within ten (10) working days of the IEP Team meeting.

D. Part C to Part B Assessment or an Initial Preschool Assessment Funding

For the 2025-2026 school year, Districts will pay the KCSOS Division of Special Education \$4,250.00 for any Part C to Part B assessment or an initial preschool assessment.

A District will receive an invoice in July 2026 for the number of assessments that have been completed for their specific District.

E. Coordination of Curriculum

The parties agree that it is in the best interests of the pupils served under this Agreement to provide a coordinated system of curriculum development, implementation and monitoring, and they agree to cooperate in this regard.

The Kern County Superintendent of Schools (KCSOS) Division of Special Education's final billing costs shall reflect two separate program expenditure calculations representing the following programs and services:

- A. Special Day Class Severely Disabled/Low Incidence,
- B. Designated Instructional Services.

The final calculated net expenditure amount for each of the two program services shall be divided by the average of the total KCSOS Division of Special Education's pupil enrollment in these program services for the year. This produces a dollar cost per student for each of the two programs and services.

The dollar cost per student for each of the programs and services shall be multiplied by the number of students enrolled from each school district. The total cost per school district will be the sum of the program and service(s) costs (A & B above).

By May 31st of the preceding year, the KCSOS Division of Special Education will provide to each school district an estimate of the following year's program and service costs, which can be used for district budgeting purposes. These estimates will be the basis for the preliminary transfers from the district and will reflect the following:

- KCSOS Division of Special Education's budget for the bill back year
- District enrollment, which will be based on the preceding March 31st count with the following adjustments:
 - anticipated program transfer
 - exiting 8th grade students
 - 3. students matriculating into existing district programs
 - KCSOS estimate of entering kindergarteners.

After fiscal year end, a calculation of the final bill back amounts will be made using the net expenditures for the year and the final student participation counts. Final student participation counts reflect the average of the four-times-a-year student verification process; these verifications are based on quarters ending September, December, March and June. This final amount will be compared to each district's estimated amount transferred, and a correcting transfer will then be made to/from each district. This correction will be made as soon as possible after the closing of the KCSOS' books at each year end.

APPENDIX B - PART C TO PART B ASSESSMENT AND INITIAL PRESCHOOL ASSESSMENT FUNDING

Should a District's pupil who is transitioning out of the Early Start (Part C) Program require a Part C to Part B assessment, and initial preschool assessment, and the District wishes to use the Assessment and Support Team available through KCSOS Division of Special Education, the District shall refer the pupil through the SELPA's Search and Serve Process.

KCSOS Division of Special Education agrees to conduct Part C to Part B assessments or an initial preschool assessment using the appropriate personnel based on a pupil's suspected disability as noted in the referral. Assessments will be completed within the State-mandated timeline prior to the pupil's third birthday should the referral be received at least two (2) months prior to the birthday. Referrals received after that time will be approached on a case-by-case basis.

District Personnel will be responsible for facilitating the Individualized Education Program (I.E.P.) meetings held as the result of the Part C to Part B assessments or an initial preschool assessment. KCSOS Assessment and Support Team personnel will complete the paperwork appropriate to their portion of the Present Levels of Performance, any Proposed Goals & Objectives, any Accommodations/Modifications, and any other needs for an individual pupil. Should District Personnel not be available for the I.E.P., arrangements will be made in advance to insure the proper operation of the meeting and that the District's services are appropriately documented.

The KCSOS Director responsible for the Assessment and Support Team shall document referrals based on the District of Residence. A running total will be available to Districts throughout the school year.

- L. <u>Child Abuse Reporting Requirements</u>. Both parties warrant that they are informed of the obligation to report child abuse and child neglect under California law including, but not limited to Penal Code section 11164, and following, and have signed statements as set forth in Penal Code section 11166.5 to the effect that they have knowledge of the provisions of Penal Code section 11166 (reporting duty and time) and will comply with those provisions.

Memorandum of Understanding County Level Educational Services for K-6 Students El Tejon Unified School District

The Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office and the El Tejon Unified School District have enjoyed an excellent working relationship for decades. The School District has the need for an educational placement for those students in kindergarten and grades 1-6 who have been expelled, require an alternative to expulsion or are seriously at-risk of being expelled. The Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office operates an elementary community school, but receives inadequate funding from the State of California. The El Tejon Unified School District would like to have a county-level alternative education placement available for all three types of students listed above. Based on this background, the following agreement is established by the two agencies:

- Beginning on July 1, 2025 and continuing through the remainder of the 2026-2027 school year, the El Tejon Unified School District will pay to the Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office an amount equal to \$49.00 per student day of enrollment for any student who is a) enrolled in kindergarten or grades 1 through 6, b) expelled by the district board or referred by the district to the community school, and c) is enrolled in classroom instruction.
- Beginning on July 1, 2025 and continuing through the remainder of the 2026-2027 school year, the Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office will accept both expelled and district referred K-6 students from the School District.
- Following the conclusion of the contracted school year representatives of the School Districts and the Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office will meet, if necessary, to evaluate costs associated with operation of the program and establish a "per student day of enrollment" rate for the subsequent school year.
- 4. This agreement shall remain in effect through the 2026-2027 school year and charges associated with this agreement shall be billed at the conclusion of the school year. SUPERINTENDENT is authorized to transfer the amounts owing under this Agreement from the following DISTRICT Account Code 01-6500-0-7142.00-5001-9200-000-000-00000
